(i) ***Need to Investigate the Alleged Expenditure of about \$16 Billion Dollars on the Power Sector Reform Programme from 1999 — 2007 without Commensurate Output:***

Hon. Sada Soli (*Jibia/Kaita Federal Constituency*) introduced the matter and prayed the House to consider and approve the matter as one of urgent public importance.

Deplorable Health Condition of Miss Aluko Bidemi Grace, Nigeria, Football Heroine:

The House:

Notes that in April 2019, Miss Aluko Bidemi Grace, a former football heroine, with the Nigerian Flamingos and Falconet was diagnosed of breast cancer at the University of Ibadan Teaching Hospital (UCH);

Also notes that she had undergone mastectomy, sererial chemotherapy and radiation treatments at whooping cost to her immediate family;

Worried that despite the treatment at the UCH, her condition had deteriorated rather than improve owing to inadequate health facilities at the UCH, as well as financial challenges.

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the Federal Ministry of Health to urgently undertake a holistic assessment of Miss Aluko Bidemi Grace's health condition with a view to providing adequate health care for her;

- (ii) urge the Ministry of Youths and Sport Development to provide comprehensive health insurance for all Nigerian Footballers under the National Health Insurance Scheme (NHIS) (*Hon. Ibrahim Kunle Olarewaju — Ido-Osi/Moba/Ilejemeje Federal Constituency*).

Need to Investigate the Circumstances of the Alleged Abscondment by Five Nigerian Soldiers of the Operation Harbin Kunama III with Large Amount of Cash:

The House:

Aware that the Nigeria Army in a press release signed by Col. Sagir Musa the acting director of Army Public Relations on the 15 July, 2019 titled, "RE: Nigerian Soldiers on escort duty abscond with billions of Naira";

Also aware that the press release stated that five personnel of "operation Harbin Kunama III" based in Sokoto were detailed on 11 July, 2019 at about 1500 hours (3 p.m.) to escort a VIP with a large amount of cash to kaduna, a distance of about 400 kilometers;

Worried that on arrival at the Nigeria Army Airstrip in Jaji the five personnel connived and allegedly disposed the VIP of the cash and absconded;

Also worried that the statement though admitting the incidence, refuted the exact amount carted away by the soldiers and also claimed ignorance of the exact amount, exonerating the 8 Division of the Nigeria Army and its GOC Major General H. O. Otiki;

Concerned that the statement said the incident was uncommon, embarrassing, obnoxious and painful. Only the VIP knows the total amount involved and can disclose it;

Cognizant that the Nigeria Army constituted a High Powered Committee to holistically, thoroughly and decisively investigate the sad incident for record and posterity; and report to all Nigeria Army formations and units and the general public for awareness and possible arrest of the culprits;

Notes that the five personnel all attached from the Infantry Corps Centre Jaji Are; CPL Gabriel Oluwaniyi, CPL Mohammed Aminu, LCPL Commander Haruna, LCPL Oluji Joshua and LCPL Hayatudeen;

Also notes that the circumstances surrounding the incidence are unclear, like why a large amount of cash will be transported by road and not using the banks, why would cash be moved from sokoto to Abuja via kaduna and not vice-versa. What is the source of the money, what is its purpose, who is this undisclosed very important personality (VIP) and who owns the money;

Worried that in these times of insecurity, banditry, kidnapping, insurgency and other crimes in the country it would be dangerous to leave this very grave incident unattended to and imminent to unravel the circumstances surrounding it;

Resolves to:

Set up an *Ad-hoc* Committee to investigate the circumstances surrounding the incident and report back within four (4) weeks (*Hon. Abubakar Hassan Nalarabe — Awe/Doma/Keana Federal Constituency*).

Need to Tackle the Assault and Rape of Student by Teachers at the FCT School of the Blind, Jabi:

The House:

Recalls that on Tuesday, 16 July, 2019, **Hon. Shina Abiola Peller** moved a motion on the floor of the House on the need to tackle the scourge of rape and other sexual offences against children in Nigeria;

Notes that less than 24 hours after the Resolution passed by the House on the rape of minors in this country, a worse form of rape and assault against blind girls was uncovered at the Federal Capital Territory School of the blind, Jabi District of the FCT;

Also notes that the FCT Administration officials who visited the school were shocked at the revelations made by the students and teachers over a blind teacher and one other visually impaired who regularly raped and assaulted girls at the school;

Concerned that a teacher in the school, one **Mr Ebenezer Olateju**, has since become infamous for leading the blind students into hotel rooms where he drugged them to sleep before raping them;

Aware that the school authority has confirmed six reported cases of rape by **Mr Ebenezer Olateju**;

Also aware that another blind teacher, **Mr Ilo Chukwuma**, was found to be notorious in fiddling with the breast and other sensitive parts of the blind girls' bodies;

Resolves to:

- (i) condemn in strong terms the rape of blind underage female students by their teachers at the FCT School of the blind, Jabi;

- (ii) urge the relevant department of the Nigeria Police Force to carry out a thorough investigation into this matter; and
- (iii) set up an *Ad-hoc* Committee to investigate the matter, make appropriate recommendations and report back (*Hon. Blessing Onyeche Onuh — Otukpo/Ohimini Federal Constituency*).

Debate.

Amendment Proposed:

Motion made and Question proposed:

The House:

Notes that on 28 May, 2019 the recommendations of the Committee on Public Petitions on the petition by Adindu M. Ohima Daniel on Behalf of 1,123 others against Micheno Multipurpose Co-operative Society on the Regulatory and Supervisory Lapses in the Activities of the Promoters of the Cooperative Society were considered and approved;

Also notes that the title of the report erroneously captured ₦30 million involving Micheno Multipurpose Co-operative Society and Adindu M. Ohima on behalf of 1,123 others;

Informed that the correct amount involved is ₦30 billion and not ₦30 million;

Resolves to:

Rescind its decision on the Petition by Adindu M. Ohima Daniel on Behalf of 1,123 others against Micheno Multipurpose Co-operative Society on the Regulatory and Supervisory Lapses in the Activities of the Promoters and commit same to the Committee of the Whole for reconsideration (Hon. Mohammed Tahir Monguno — Chief Whip).

Also notes that the aforementioned Bills were passed by the preceding Assembly and forwarded to the President for assent but for which assent or withholding thereof was not communicated before the end of the tenure of the last Assembly;

Resolves to:

- (ii) set up an *Ad-hoc* Committee to interface with relevant Agencies as well as visit Bama/Ngala/Kala Balge Areas of Borno State to ascertain the current humanitarian and infrastructural situation so as to proffer sustainable solutions to the crisis." (*Hon. Zainab Gimba — Bama/Ngala/Kala Balge Federal Constituency*).

Recalls that sometime in 2011, the Federal Government awarded a contract worth ₦6.9 billion to Kopek Nigeria Limited for the reconstruction of the road;

Aware that the Administration of President Muhammadu Buhari has paid about ₦2.5 billion to the contractor since 2017 and the contractor confirmed that as at 2018, the Federal Government was not owing the company;

Concerned that despite the full payment of the aforementioned sum to the contractor, the pace of work on the road is very slow and discouraging as asphalt overlay has stopped at Osunwoyin which is about 7 kilometers to Iwo in Osun State;

Informed that the road is not motorable between Iwo and Oyo, a situation that is adversely affecting inter-state transportation between Osun and Oyo States and is also hampering the movement of passengers and agricultural produce;

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the Federal Ministry of Power, Works and Housing to prevail on the contractor to complete the reconstruction of Gbongan-Iwo-Oyo road without further delay; and
- (ii) mandate the Committee on Works (when constituted) to interface with the Federal Ministry of Power, Works and Housing and Kopek Nig. Limited to determine the constraints in the completion of the project and report back within four (4) weeks for further legislative action (*Hon. Amobi Yinusa Akintola — Ayedire/Iwo/Ola-Oluwa Federal Constituency*).

Agreed to.

13. Menace of Gully Erosion in the South-East Geopolitical Zone

Motion made and Question proposed:

The House:

Notes that Nigeria, like other Sub-Saharan African countries, is beset by serious environmental degradation resulting, among others, in soil erosion which is mainly due to very intensive rainfall;

Also notes that the torrential rainfall in South-Eastern Nigeria, coupled with the soil texture, creates an enabling environment for catastrophic soil erosion in the region;

Concerned that the soil erosion through gradual and constant dissection and desecration of the natural landscape is now the greatest threat to the environmental settings of South-Eastern Nigeria.;

Informed that about 1.8% of the entire land area of South-Eastern Nigeria is occupied by gullies, and this is very alarming for an area that has the highest population density of more than 500 persons per km² in Nigeria;

Also informed that Njikoka/Dunukofia/Anaocha Federal Constituency of Anambra State is home to numerous gully erosion sites littering the length and breadth of the constituency;

Mindful of the fact that with increased human activities and other adverse environmental changes, the magnitude of the gully sites in the region will increase;

Cognizant that the consequence of the gully erosion menace is loss of land for agriculture and habitation, and loss of lives and property, destruction of roads and separation of communities;

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the Ministry of finance to give priority attention to erosion control projects in the 2020 Budget proposal;
- (ii) also urge the Federal Ministry of Environment and other relevant Agencies to take a holistic and systematic approach in containing the gully erosion menace, particularly in Njikoka/Dunukofi/Anaocha Federal Constituency of Anambra State and Southeast geopolitical zone in general (*Hon. Valentine Ayika — Njikoka/Dunukofi/Anaocha Federal Constituency*).

Agreed to.

15. Erosion Menace along Disina-Jama'Are River Bank in Shira Local Government Area of Bauchi State

Motion made and Question proposed:

The House:

Notes the loss of lives, properties and farmlands in the recent time as a result of persistent erosion along the Disina-Jama'are river bank that affects the people of Disina Town, Ajangara, Guddu, Kungo, Dango, Tsumba, Jalkatari, Malori, Gagidiba, Abarbawo Bakin Kogi, Abarbawo Kunshi, Agursa, Ganuwa and Majiyan Kaya Villages of Shira Local Government Area;

Also notes that the ugly trend started in 2004 and reached its peak in 2018 as a result of excessive rainfall, wherein properties and farmlands worth several millions of naira were destroyed;

Aware that the larger part of Disina district which is located along the bank of Disina-Jama'are River has had a protracted history of environmental challenges, partly due to flooding;

Acknowledges that the Hadejia/Jama'are River Basin Development Authority and the Bauchi State Government have, in the last 15 years, done so much to control the disaster;

Informed that some of the resultant effects of the disaster was the cutting-off of the 27 kilometre Beli-Gagidiba-Zubo Rural Road at Abarbawa Village and the constant disruption of electricity supply along the 15 kilometre Beli-Zubo National grid line;

Cognizant that if the situation is not given the desired attention, it will continue to adversely affect the socio-economic activities of Shira Local Government Area and beyond;

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the Federal Ministry of Power, Works and Housing to make a proposal in the 2020 Budget for construction of small dams along the DisinaJama'are River Bank for irrigation farming and to ameliorate the suffering of the affected communities;
- (ii) also urge the Department of Rural Development of the Federal Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Development to undertake repairs of the 27 kilometre Beli-Gagidiba-Zubo Rural road and replace the damaged electricity poles along the 15 kilometreBeli-Zubo national grid line;
- (iii) further urge the National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) to provide relief materials for the members of the communities;
- (iv) equally urge, the Office of the Secretary to the Government of the Federation (SGF) (Ecological Unit) to initiate a supplementary budget to include funds for commencement of work on the Disina-Jama'are River Bank and also make adequate provision in the 2020 budget estimates for the continuation/completion of the erosion work at the river bank;

- (v) request the Hadejia/Jama'are River Basin Development Authority to commence the dredging of Andiwa water point to ensure free flow of the river and avert the persistent flooding;
- (vi) mandate the Committee on Environment and Habitat to inspect the affected areas, proffer a long time solution and report back within four (4) weeks (*Hon. Kani Abubakar Faggo — Shira/Giade Federal Constituency*).

Agreed to.

16. Need to Reconstruct Rabah-Bakura Road to Address the Worsening Gully Erosion and Environmental Challenges facing Communities in Sokoto and Zamfara States

Motion made and Question proposed:

The House:

Notes that the Rabah-Bakura Road, which was constructed about 37 years ago, is an inter-state road traversing over 32 communities in Sokoto and Zamfara States and it is the only access road within the area for transportation of people and goods from Sokoto through to Zamfara State beyond;

Concerned about the deplorable state of the road due to over 20 years of neglect, which was worsened by recurrent flooding and gully erosion that has almost completely eroded the road and washed off adjoining houses;

Also concerned that the abandonment of the road has adversely affected the means of livelihood of the inhabitants of the communities;

Informed that the deplorable condition of the road has provided a safe haven for bandits, cattle rustlers and armed robbers to ravage the area and terrorize innocent citizens as security agents find it difficult to promptly respond to attacks due to the nature of the road;

Also informed that the perennial flooding and gully erosion have caused adverse environmental impact on the communities along the road including Rabah, Gubuwa, Kurya, Maikujera, Angamba, Kwargba, Rarah, Gandi, Dankarmawa, Badamwa and Lugu among other towns and villages, washing away houses and displacing over 1000 people;

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the Federal Ministry of Power, Works and Housing to make adequate provisions in the 2020 budget estimates for the reconstruction of the Rabah-Bakura Road and rehabilitation of houses washed away by flood and gully erosion;
- (ii) also urge the Ecological Fund Office to intervene and ensure the refill and embankment of the affected towns and villages to enable land reclamation and resettlement of those displaced by gully erosion;
- (iii) further urge the National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) to provide relief materials for the affected and displaced people;

- (iv) mandate the Committees on Works, Appropriations, Environment and Habitat and Emergency and Disaster Preparedness to ensure compliance (*Hon. Ibrahim Almustapha Aliyu — Wurno/Rabah Federal Constituency*).

Agreed to.

17. Need to Save the Multi-Million Naira Electrical Installations for Connection of Borgu/Agwara Federal Constituency

Motion made and Question proposed:

The House:

Recalls that Kainji Dam, which is Nigeria's first hydro power plant, was commissioned in 1968 to, among others, generate electricity for the country;

Notes that in spite of the fact that Borgu/Agwara Federal Constituency in Niger State hosts the Kainji Dam, only the towns of Wawa, Busa and Karabande which serve as headquarters of three wards in Borgu Local Government Area are connected to the National Grid while seventeen (17) wards, with a minimum of eighty communities in the Federal Constituency, are not connected;

Also notes that parts of Shagunu, Dugga, Papiri, Gallah, Kashini, Rofia, Adahe, Mago and Konkoso wards were provided with transformers and electrical fittings which had been fixed since 2003 but the wards have not been connected to the National Grid;

Cognizant that the huge amount of money spent in providing the electrical equipment and installations makes little or no meaning since the installations are frequently being vandalized while the communities remain in darkness despite the fact that 100 percent of the job had been done;

Concerned that the failure to provide electricity to the wards, especially those in the riverine areas exposes them to recurring hazards of boats capsizing resulting in loss of lives and flooding with severe destruction of farmlands, crops and death of animals;

Concerned that the failure to connect the wards to the National Grid has left the equipment vulnerable to being vandalized, thus making the Government of Niger State to spend huge sums of money to replace the vandalized equipment, as happened between 2018 - 2019 when the sum of ₦200 Million was spent to purchase new equipment to replace those that were vandalized;

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the Abuja Electricity Distribution Company (AEDC), the Transmission Company of Nigeria (TCN) and the National Electricity Regulatory Commission (NERC) to ensure the connection of Borgu/Agwara Federal Constituency to the National Grid, especially areas where electrical installations have been completed;
- (ii) also urge the AEDC and the TCN to provide relevant infrastructure that will facilitate the connection of the remaining areas which have not been provided with electrical installations ; and
- (iii) mandate the Committee on Power to ensure compliance (*Hon. Jafaru Mohammed — Borgu/Agwara Federal Constituency*).

Agreed to.

Also notes that the bridge, which was constructed in 1976 by Sterling Astaldy, an Italian construction company long overdue for rehabilitation as it poses a serious threat to commuters plying the route which can easily be deduced from the incessant accidents that occur along the route resulting in loss of lives and properties and the deteriorated part of the bridge has become a den for criminals who take cover under the bridge to terrorize the communities of Katsina-Ala Ugbema Junction, Ikowe, Ayua and Abwa;

Informed that Zaki-Biam, the largest yam market in Africa, which is estimated to dispatch, on a daily basis, over a thousand truckloads of yams may be cut off from business due to the sorry state of the bridge;

Resolves to:

- (i) call on the Federal Ministry of Power, Works and Housing and the Federal Roads Maintenance Agency (FERMA) to urgently rehabilitate the River Katsina-Ala bridge to avoid its complete collapse and also reconstruct the road from Wukari-Zaki-Biam-Katsina-Ala-Gboko-Aliade-Otukpo-9th Mile to ameliorate the suffering of commuters; and
- (ii) mandate the Committees on Works, and Legislative Compliance to ensure compliance (*Hon. Gbande Iorkyaan Richard — Katsina Ala/Logo/Ukum Federal Constituency*).

Cognizant that the DISCOs have prior knowledge of challenges (grid energy insufficiency and instability, tariff challenges and revenue shortfall, metering challenges, operational challenges, energy theft and network infrastructure challenges) facing PHCN before liquidation;

Worried that the electricity supply in terms of quality and coverage has remained very poor in Mushin and its environs despite the prior knowledge and huge budgeted amount enjoyed by DISCOs from the Federal Government;

Concerned that a sizeable part of Mushin I has being in total darkness for the past one year most especially Ilupeju Industrial Hub, one of the heartbeats of Lagos State economy is facing low electricity supply while those that enjoy epileptic supply of electricity are billed using guess-estimated bill;

Dismayed that the industrial hub of Lagos has turned shadow of itself as a result of the poor power electricity supply which has led to the collapsed of some industries and re-location of most of them to neighbouring countries like Ghana, Cote d'Ivoire, Togo thereby creating armies of unemployed youths;

Convinced that if the Federal Government could take a bold step by introducing Independent Power Producer (IPP)/Non-Utility Generator (NUG) as introduced in Onitsha Market in Enugu State and Sura Market in Lagos State respectively, these companies would be fully back in production;

Resolves to:

- (i) urge Nigeria Electricity Regulatory Commission (NERC) to assess the efficiency and effectiveness of DISCOs as stipulated in the responsibility of the Commission in order to ameliorate the sufferings of the people;
- (ii) also urge IKED to install Independent Power Producer (IPP)/Non-Utility Generator (NUG) in Ilupeju Industrial Hub as it is done in Sura Market in Lagos State and Onitsha Market in Enugu State respectively;
- (iii) further urge the IKED to overhaul/change outdated and non-functional equipment's to justify the billing giving to the people;
- (iv) mandate the Committee on Power to ensure compliance (*Hon. Alli Adeyemi Taofeek — Mushin I Federal Constituency*).

Also notes that the school, which accommodates little children, both boys and girls of between 5-6 years who are mostly defenseless and vulnerable, is being invaded regularly by cultists who abduct and molest the children;

Concerned that those children have special needs and cannot easily or freely communicate the abuses and other forms of ill treatment meted to them;

Aware that the Federal Ministry of Education had been intimated of the serious brutality and sodomy going on in the school and the Permanent Secretary led a delegation to the school which confirmed the incidents;

Also concerned that since concluding investigation into the matter by the Federal Ministry of Education, the Federal Capital Territory Administration and the Nigeria Police Force, no action has been taken on the matter;

Resolves to:

- (i) set up an *Ad-hoc* Committee to investigate the alleged molestation of pupils of the deaf and dumb school, to obtain first-hand information on the matter and also interface with the Federal Ministry of Education, the Federal Capital Territory Administration and the Nigeria Police Force on the outcome of their investigation into the matter;
- (ii) urge the Inspector-General of Police and the Commandant General of the Nigerian Security and Civil Defence Corps to provide adequate security in schools across the country to prevent such incidents from occurring or continuing to occur (*Hon. Mohammed Musa Pali — Alkeleri/Kirfi Federal Constituency*).

Debate.

Further notes that at independence Nigeria population was at 45.2 million according to available data from the National Bureau of Statistics, while Britain Population was 52.4 million, however, the current Nigeria population estimated at 200,980,215 Britain current population estimated to be 66,963,173, based on the United Nation estimation as at Sunday, 7 July, 2019, constituting a change of about 344.4% and 27.6% between 1960 and 2019 respectively;

Disturbed that Nigeria population is growing faster than its economy, with the current population growing rate, Nigeria GDP Per capital which was \$92.96 at independence currently stood at \$2,178, and as per world bank estimates makes it a poor country despite been African's largest economy, while that of Britain which was \$13,827 in 1960 is now \$42,986, and South Africa the second largest economy with a GDP per capital of \$433.94 in 1960, is now \$6,325, with that of Egypt the 3rd largest economy having a GDP of \$708 in 1960 currently stood at \$2,549, with over 80% of Nigerians still living below poverty level;

Aware that Nigeria is ranked 152nd among 188 nations in the global human development index of

the United Nation program, also in terms of GDP per capital at nominal values, Nigeria is ranked 131st by IMF, 128th by World Bank and 133rd by United Nation respectively;

Also aware that over the years in Nigeria, numerous brilliant policies have been formulated with population policy inclusive, but no apparent and significant development to show for that as evidenced by the fact that Nigeria has continued to remain in the category of the least developed country of the world;

Worried that development economists have for long argued that developing countries must control their population to achieve higher per capital income growth rate, improve the quality of life of citizens, transits to industrial age and that the GDP must expand at a higher rate to improve human development indexes;

Also worried that a further projection by the United Nation Development, Programme put Nigerian population in 2050 at over 400million, thereby placing it at a very precarious situation;

Observes that China and India have proved that the greatest wealth of a country is its people, by transiting from a poor agrarian economy to becoming the world second and seventh largest economy using their large pool of cheap labour to mass produce agricultural, mineral and consumer goods;

Concerned that according to the latest statistics, Nigeria has been adjudged as the country with the largest number of people living in extreme poverty, with half of her population living with less than \$1.90 a day with the population boom not abating;

Resolves to:

- (i) call on the Federal Government to come up with a conscious and a clear cut policy to check the rising and alarming rate of Nigeria Population;
- (ii) urge the Government to aggressively move and re-energize its family planning program;
- (iii) also call on the Federal Government to invest in Agriculture, technology, human development and policy that will change the course of our economic development;
- (iv) mandate the Committee on Population to ensure implementation (*Hon. Afolabi Rasheed Olalekan — Odo-Otin/Ifelodun/Boripe Federal Constituency*).

Debate.

Concerned that according to the latest statistics, Nigeria has been adjudged as the country with the largest number of people living in extreme poverty, with half of her population living with less than \$1.90 a day with the population boom not abating;

Resolved to:

- (i) call on the Federal Government to come up with a conscious and a clear cut policy to check the rising and alarming rate of Nigeria Population;
- (ii) also call on the Federal Government to invest in Agriculture, technology, human development and policy that will change the course of our economic development;
- (iii) mandate the Committee on Population to ensure implementation;
- (iv) urge the Federal Government to properly fund the National Population Commission to carry out population census as at and when due;
- (v) also urge the National Population Commission to make registration of births and deaths compulsory in the country;
- (vi) further urge the Federal Government through the Nigerian Population Commission to urgently conduct census;
- (vii) still urge the Federal Government to defend and protect the Nigerian borders as foreign infiltration is affecting the true figure of the nation's population;
- (viii) again urge the Federal, State and Local Governments to invest in agriculture; and
- (ix) urge the Federal Government to vigorously pursue the girl-child education across the country (**HR. 63/07/2019**).

26. Menace of Harassment and Extortion by Officers of the Nigerian Customs Service on the Highways

Motion made and Question proposed:

The House:

Notes the core mandate of the Nigerian Customs services is the collection of the import and excise duties and counting for the same and prevention and suppression of smuggling of goods which are on the prohibited list into the country;

Also notes the recurrent complaints by vehicle owners and car dealers over harassment and extortionist activities of customs personnel on highways across the country under the pretext that either some of the vehicles were smuggled into the country without the payment of accurate Tarff duties or levies at the time of clearing and then proceed to seize the vehicles even when evidence has been shown that the duties or levies were paid or that the vehicles were lawfully purchases or that they had underpaid the tariffs, duties or levies;

Again notes that in a bid to curb the activities of smugglers, the service posts its personnel on spots along the nation's highways where they routinely stop vehicles and trucks transporting goods to various parts of the country for searching to determine whether they were carrying any prohibited goods that had been smuggled into the country; and even for vehicles that may have been brought into the country illegally;

Further notes that in the cause of carrying out those searches along the highway, personnel and extortion by traders and motorists conveying goods and vehicles, and where they refuse to give into the demands of the customs personnel, the trucks conveying the goods or the vehicles are delayed for days and which exposes the victims to attacks by robbers and incurring avoidable losses;

Informed that following public outing on the extortionist activities of its personnel on the highways, the service set up federal operations units and task force points at a plethora of destinations across the country to monitor and curb illegal activities of its personnel posted on the highways to combat smuggling, but who were being alleged to have turn the opportunity into avenues to harass and extort people;

Concerned that even some officials posted to those operations units and task force points are being accused of participating in the high level intimidation and extortion, having abandoned their core functions;

Cognizant of the fact that it will be of an overarching public benefit to stamp out those extortionist activities of personnel of the customs service, or indeed remove those check points on the highways and take them to the nation's border crossing and airports, which are the proper point to mount check points;

Also informed that the ripple effects of this menace reflects on the economic development of the economy, as the traders are forced to sell their goods at exorbitant rate in order to cover all or some of the losses incurred, either from direct extortion by corrupt customs officials or losses incurred in a bid to escape extortion routes that have fewer checkpoints;

Resolve to:

- (i) urge the Nigeria customs service to ensure that it is only vehicles that their duties have been fully paid are cleared; and

- (ii) mandate the Committee on Customs and Excise to investigate the allegation of harassment of vehicles owners and cars dealers by customs personnel at the highways across the country and ensure that the perpetrators are punished and also cause the operations of the customs personnel to be restricted to the seaports, airports and land borders (*Hon. Okwudili Christopher E. — Orumba North/Orumba South Federal Constituency and 7 others*).

Debate.

- (iii) *Insert* Prayer (iii), as follows:
“Urge the Nigerian Customs Service to employed technology to give uptimal checks on goods and services in the country” (*Hon. Mwakwon Simon Davou — Barkin Ladi/Riyom Federal Constituency*).

Question that the amendment be made — Negatived.

Question on the Motion as amended — Negatived.
