BILLS

1. ***Consolidation of Bills:***

- (a) A Bill for an Act to Amend the Raw Materials Research and Development Council Act, Cap. R3, Laws of the Federation of Nigeria, 2004 to Provide for Reduction in the Membership of the Council and to Provide for the Payment of all Monies Received by the Council into the Federation Account in Accordance with Section 162 of the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, 1999 and for Related Matters (HBs. 650 and 948) (*Hon. Jerry Alagbaoso and Hon. Gyang Istifanus Dung*);

- (b) A Bill for an Act to Repeal the Raw Materials Research and Development Council Act, Cap. R3, Laws of the Federation of Nigeria, 2004 and to Re-enact the Raw Materials Research and Development Council Bill; and for Related Matters (HB. 1220) (*Leader*); and
- (c) A Bill for an Act to Amend the Raw Materials Research and Development Council Act, Cap. R3, Laws of the Federation of Nigeria, 2004 to Provide for the Payment of all Monies received by the Council into the Federation Account in accordance with Section 162 of the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria 1999; and for Related Matters (HB. 1283) (*Hon. Uchechuku G. Nnam-Obi*).
2. A Bill for an Act to Amend the Criminal Code Act, Cap. C38, Laws of the Federation of Nigeria, 2004 to criminalize any interference in the Duty and Authority of the Senate or the House of Representatives; and for Related Matters (HB. 1274) (*Hon. Ossai Nicholas Ossai*) - *Second Reading*.

A Bill for an Act to Establish FCT Directorate of Road Traffic and Motor Vehicle Administration Services (DRTMVAS) to be saddled with the Responsibility of Road Traffic Management and Motor Vehicle Administration Services within the Federal Capital Territory (FCT); and for Related Matters (HB. 1279) (*Hon. 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MOTIONS

5. **Urgent Need to Restore the Oron-Calabar Ferry Services:**
Hon. Nse Bassey Ekpenyong:

The House:

Notes with concern the abandonment of the ferry services plying the Oron-Calabar route in Akwa Ibom State;

Also notes that the ferry route, which was a nexus of inter-state commercial and tourist activities, has been paralyzed for more than sixteen years with attendant losses in revenues running into millions of Naira;

Aware that the delay and hardship being encountered in travelling from Oron to Calabar by road would have been made less cumbersome if the ferry services were still operational;

Cognizant that with the dwindling fortunes in the oil and gas sector, the revamping of the ferry services will assist immensely in improving the sources of revenues for the country;

Also aware that the traffic caused by heavy vehicular movements along the Calabar-Itu highway would be reduced drastically if the ferry services are restored, thereby saving the Road from further colossal damages;

Resolves to:

- (i) Mandate the Committee on Ports, Harbours and Waterways to investigate the causes of abandonment of the ferry services with a view to causing its restoration and report within four (4) weeks for further legislative action.

6. **Need to Educate and Encourage Herdsmen on the benefits of Ranching instead of the Proposed Cattle Colonies in every State of the Federation:**
Hon. Mohammed Ogoshi Onawo:

The House:

Notes the incessant clashes between herdsmen and farmers that have presented serious security challenges in Nigeria;

Aware that most of those clashes stem from the practice of herdsmen roaming in the wild across the length and breadth of the country in search of grazing pastures for their cattle and as a result, trespassing into, and damaging crops in farms;

Also aware that the grazing practice of the herdsmen is not only exposing them to danger as they fall prey to cattle rustlers and kidnappers, but also results in conflicts with farmers whose crops are trampled upon by the cattle;

Also notes the Federal Government's proposal to establish cattle colonies in every State in Nigeria to cater for the herdsmen and their cattle as a lasting solution to the continuous clashes which, in most cases, result in senseless and avoidable loss of lives and properties;

Concerned that the decision to establish cattle colonies in each State could be in violation of Section 42 of the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, 1999 (as amended) and the Land Use Act as those colonies will remain the exclusive reserve of the individual State governments and as such, would not guarantee total freedom to the herdsmen;

Observes that cattle rearing is not an exclusive reserve of the Fulanis as other tribes also engage in the business;

Determined to provide a lasting solution to the incessant conflicts between herdsmen and farm owners, hence modern breeding practices should be encouraged;

Convinced that ranching will offer longer lasting solution to the recurring conflicts between herdsmen and farmers, if the herdsmen would be fully sensitized and educated about the benefits of the program, as it would enable them assume full ownership of those ranches;

Resolves to:

- (i) Urge the Federal Government to consider a soft or subsidized loan scheme for herds owners to buy lands as a means of encouragement for them to ranch;
- (ii) Also urge the Federal Ministry of Agriculture and Natural Resources to liaise with State Ministries of Agriculture to speedily educate and encourage the herdsmen on the benefits of ranching;

- (iii) Mandate the Committee on Agriculture Production and Services to ensure implementation and report within eight (8) weeks for further legislative action.

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7. **Need to Apply the “No Work, No Pay” Rule on the Non-Academic Staff Unions of Public Universities as a Result of their Incessant Strike Actions Which Continuously Disrupt Academic Activities in Universities:**

Hon. Bode Ayorinde Hon. Francis Charles Uduyok:

The House:

Notes the ongoing strike action embarked upon by the various Unions in Nigerian Universities, namely the Academic Staff Union of Universities (NASU), Senior Staff Association of Nigerian Universities (SSANU), the National Association of Academic Technologists (NAAT) and the Joint Action Committee (JAC), over the non-implementation of earned allowances, despite the Agreement reached with the Federal Government;

Also notes that those Unions keep the administrative and technical work alive in the Universities in order for Nigerian students to achieve quality education;

Aware that besides non-payment of allowances, the Unions are also demanding that the Federal Government should upgrade technology equipment in the Universities as the provision of sustainable infrastructure development in the University as well as provide sustainable infrastructure;

Concerned that the strike has paralysed activities in the Universities as most of them are unable to conclude the 2016/2017 academic session, while others are yet to resume for the 2017/2018 session as well as rendering the academic calendar of public Universities unpredictable and unrealizable;

Cognizant that education must be given priority in the society in order not to endanger the future of the upcoming generation;

Concerned by the situation where strikes have to be continually embarked upon by the Unions in the education system in order for necessary payments to be made and infrastructure to be put in place;

Also aware that the non-academic staff who are supposed to be on strike still open the Accounts Offices to process their salaries which they have been receiving regularly despite not working while the students and the Government have been made to bear the brunt;

Further aware that section 43(1)(a) of the Trade Dispute Act, Cap T8, Laws of the Federation of Nigeria, 2004 recognizes the right of a worker to disengage from service where there is a breakdown of negotiation with his employer, but also provides a corresponding right of the employer to withhold the employee’s wages for the duration of withdrawal of service;

Resolves to:

- (i) Urge the Non-Academic Staff Unions of the Public Universities to resume work immediately;

- (ii) Further urge the Federal Ministries of Education, Labour, Employment and Productivity the National Universities Commission, (NUC), and the Accountant General of the Federation to apply the “No Work No Pay” rule with the effect from February, 2018 if the Non-Academic Staff Unions of the Public Universities refuse to resume work while they continue to negotiate for their perceived rights and privileges;

- (iii) Mandate the Committees on Tertiary Education and Services and Labour, Employment and Productivity to engage the relevant Ministries and Trade Unions with a view to finding lasting solution to the incessant strike actions in the Universities and report within six (6) weeks for further legislative action.

8. **Need to Control the Proliferation of Universities in Nigeria.**

Hon. Ayodele Oladimeji.

The House:

Notes that the strategic importance of university education to any nation cannot be over emphasized and Nigeria is no exception as they support innovation, broaden the scope of research which lead to new discoveries for industrialization and encourage growth, productivity and job creation;

Also notes that tertiary education is the platform for developing human capital for social, economic and technological transformation of any nation;

Observes that the National Universities Commission Act, Cap N81, Laws of the Federation of Nigeria, 2004 vests the Commission with powers to approve the establishment of new Universities and other degree awarding Institutions in the country;

Concerned about the exponential increase in the number of tertiary institutions, without corresponding increase in requisite modern facilities and currently there are 153 Universities in addition to over 240 applications for the establishment of a new universities currently pending at the National Universities Commission, (NUC);

Informed that no fewer than 1.8million graduates enter the labour market every year with hopes of getting jobs that are not available and employability of those graduates have been questioned rather than availability of jobs;

Also concerned that .no single Nigerian University could make the rank of the first 1,000 Universities in the world, going by the 2017 ranking universities system while Universities in African countries like South Africa, Egypt and Ghana made the list;

Further concerned that the learning environment is seriously compromised by over congested classrooms, overcrowded laboratories among others and mindful that if the resources being used in establishing new Universities are put into expanding and equipping the existing ones, in no distant time our Universities will rank among the best in the world;

Resolves to:

- (i) Urge the Federal Ministry of Education to consider initiating an amendment of Section 4 of the National Universities Commission Act, to accommodate **ONLINE COURSES** so as to reduce the number of students on Campuses making use of the limited facilities;

- (ii) Also urge the Federal Ministries of Budget and National Planning, the Federal Ministry of Education and the National Universities Commission (NUC) to consciously develop a planned growth in the number of Universities in consonance with the population, economic growth and development and manpower requirements of the country.

9. **Need for Adequate Funding of Research Institutes In Nigeria:**

Hon. Abdul Raheem Olajide Jimoh

Hon. Akinwunmi Nurudeen Olaitan.

The House:

Notes that research institutes in Nigeria have been under funded over the years by the Federal Government;

Recalls that on March 4, 2016, Research Experts under the aegis of Academic Staff Union of Research Institutions (ASURI) protested in Abuja over inadequate of government funding of the Research Institutes;

Aware that all the developed nations in the world are paying attention to research and training at various sectors ranging from science and technology to agriculture;

Also aware that the bulk of the researches being carried out at various Research Institutions in Nigeria are largely funded by interested individuals and Non- governmental Organizations (NGOs) from within and outside Nigeria, whereas the outcome of such research work are mostly kept in various institutions libraries and laboratories without their being used for developmental purposes;

Concerned that direct and indirect jobs can be created for the teeming unemployed youths by virtue of adequate funding of the Research Institutions in Nigeria by the Federal Government;

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the Federal Government to dedicate at last ten (10) percent of the total annual budget for research institutions in Nigeria;
- (ii) also urge the federal Government to set up a Task Force to monitor the utilisation of the funds;
- (iii) Mandate the Committees on Tertiary Education and Services, Science and Technology, Labour, Employment and Productivity, Agricultural Colleges and Institutions to organize a joint Session on funding Research Institutions in Nigeria;
