Need for the Federal Executive to Release to the National Judicial Council all Outstanding Amounts Approved for the Judiciary in the Appropriation Act, 2016:
Hon. Aminu Shehu Shagari (*Yabo/Shagari Federal Constituency*) introduced the matter and prayed the House to:

- (a) consider and approve the matter as one of urgent public importance; and
- (b) suspend Order Eight, Rule 4 (3) to allow debate on the matter forthwith.

Question that the matter be considered as one of urgent public importance — Agreed to.

Question that the House do suspend Order Eight, Rule 4 (3) to enable it debate the matter forthwith — Agreed to.

Need for the Federal Executive to Release to the National Judicial Council All Outstanding Amounts Approved for the Judiciary in the Appropriation Act, 2016:

The House:

Notes that a total sum of ₦70 billion was approved for the Judiciary in the Appropriation Act, 2016;

Also notes that by virtue of section 81 (3) of the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, 1999 (as amended) this sum is charged on the consolidated Revenue Fund of the Federation; and for that reason the release of this sum to the National Judicial Council should be given priority, subject to the provisions of the Constitution, over and above any other public expenditures;

Concerned that contrary to this clear intendment of the drafters of our Constitution, the Federal Executive picks and selects when to and how much to release to the National Judicial Council;

Also concerned that the National Judicial Council which is responsible for the disbursement of funds approved for the Judiciary which includes Federal and States Courts listed under section 6 of the Constitution, have not received any allocations for the months of November and December 2016;

Worried that the failure or refusal of the Federal Executive to release the budgetary allocation to the Judiciary as and when due is an infraction of section 81 (3) of the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, 1999 (as amended) which if persists may lead to the grounding of the entire Judiciary;

Also worried that any threat to the proper functioning of the Judiciary is equally a threat to National Peace and Security;

Resolves to:

- (i) condemn the failure or refusal of the Federal Executive to release funds approved for Judiciary as and when due;
- (ii) urge the President of the Federal Republic of Nigeria to direct the relevant Government Agencies to release to the National Judicial Council all outstanding funds approved for the Judiciary in the Appropriation Act, 2016, forthwith; and
- (iii) direct the Committees on Federal Judiciary, FCT Judiciary, and Finance to liaise with the relevant Federal Agencies to ensure compliance (*Hon. Aminu Shehu Shagari — Yabo/Shagari Federal Constituency*).

*Debate.**Agreed to.*

The House:

- (ii) urge the President of the Federal Republic of Nigeria to direct the relevant Government Agencies to release to the National Judicial Council all outstanding funds approved for the Judiciary in the Appropriation Act, 2016, forthwith; and
- (iii) direct the Committees on Federal Judiciary, FCT Judiciary, and Finance to liaise with the relevant Federal Agencies to ensure compliance (**HR. 19/2017**).

Motion made and Question proposed;

The House:

Notes that the Bill for an Act to Establish the Nigerian Peace Corps (NPC) to Empower, Develop and Provide Alternative Empowerment for the Youths, to Facilitate Peace, Community Service, Nation Building and for Other Related Matters was passed by both the Senate and the House of Representatives with differences;

Aware that a Conference Committee was constituted by both Chambers to harmonize the areas of differences in the Bill as passed;

Also aware that the Committee met in conference on Thursday, December 8, 2016 and harmonized the two versions of the Bill;

In view of the importance of the Bill in providing alternative empowerment for Nigerian youths and facilitating peace and community service;

Resolves to:

Receive and Adopt the Report of the Conference Committee on the Bill for an Act to Establish the Nigerian Peace Corps (NPC) to Empower, Develop and Provide Alternative Empowerment for the Youths and Facilitate Peace, Community Service, Nation Building and for Other Related Matters (Hon. Jagaba Adams Jagaba — Kachia/Kagarko Federal Constituency).

Agreed to.

16. **Reconsideration of Outstanding Bills from the Preceding Assembly (Standing Order Twelve, Rule 16)**
Passport (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act (Amendment) Bill, 2016 (HB. 638):

Order read; deferred by leave of the House.

17. **Devastating Landslides at Okoloba Community in Kolokuma/Opokuma LGA of Bayelsa State**
Motion made and Question proposed:

The House:

Notes that three devastating landslides occurred at Okoloba community on January 9, 2017 at the hours of 8.00 a.m., 1.00 p.m. and 6.00 p.m. respectively, destroying houses, farm produce and other properties worth millions of Naira;

Aware that farming is the only source of livelihood for the inhabitants of Okoloba community, given that oil pollution has made fishing business no longer attractive save for subsistence;

Observes that this is the third time over the years that the community would be experiencing landslides resulting in destruction of properties and farm produce of the people;

Concerned that if urgent steps are not taken to assist the people to alleviate their sufferings which was caused by landslides, there could be hunger and social crisis within the community;

Cognizant of the need to take measures to forestall a re-occurrence of the landslides and thus protect the community from being completely washed away;

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the Federal Ministry of Environment to, as a matter of urgency, include the construction of shore protection in Okoloba community in particular and other landslide-prone communities in the 2017 budget;
- (ii) call on the National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) to urgently provide relief materials for the affected victims; and
- (iii) mandate the Committees on Environment and Habitat, Appropriations, and Emergency and Disaster Preparedness to ensure implementation and report to the House within two (2) weeks for further legislative action (*Hon. Diri Douye — Yenagoa/Kolokuma/Opokuma Federal Constituency*).

Agreed to.

Motion referred to the Committees on Environment and Habitat, Appropriations, and Emergency and Disaster Preparedness, pursuant to Order Eight, Rule 9 (5).

18. **Need to Encourage the Establishment of Creche Facilities in Government Offices**
Motion made and Question proposed:

The House:

Notes that the importance of a mother's love and attention to a new born baby cannot be over emphasized and a plethora of scientific studies have confirmed this fact, including those which advocate that babies be fed only with breast milk for the first few months after delivery;

Also notes that no nation can strive to really develop if it fails to take into cognizance the importance of its female workforce and the physical/mental development of infants and children;

Informed that very few government agencies have made provisions for crèche facilities for babies in their offices which greatly hampers the ability of female staff who are nursing mothers to juggle both their professional and maternal responsibilities;

Cognizant of the need to correct this anomalous situation by ensuring that various Ministries, Departments and Agencies are directed to establish crèche facilities in their offices to enable nursing mothers in their workforce to take proper care of their newly born babies during the work period in order to avert the adverse impact of lack of attention to the newly born babies in their growth processes;

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the Executive Arm of the Federal Government to provide crèche facilities in all government buildings with a view to supporting nursing mothers in its employment and by so doing, set a proper example for the private sector employers to emulate; and
- (ii) mandate the Committee on Governmental Affairs to ensure implementation and report to the House within eight (8) weeks for further legislative action (*Hon. Sergious Oseasochie Ogun — Esan Northeast/Esan Southeast Federal Constituency*).

Agreed to.

19. **Need to Investigate the ₦100 Billion Naira (USD 625 Million Dollars) Released by the Central Bank of Nigeria for the Construction of Modern Mini Ranches across the Nation**
Motion made and Question proposed;

The House:

Notes the recurring conflicts, attacks and counter attacks and killings between herdsmen and local farmers all over the country in the last five years over the grazing of cattle and other ruminants on farmlands;

Aware of a Committee set up by the Federal Government in 2014 on Grazing Reserves under the Chairmanship of the former Governor of Benue State, Mr Gabriel Suswan which identified issues causing the conflicts between herdsmen and farmers to include struggle for land and water and uncontrolled influx of nomadic herdsmen, and thus noted that grazing reserves and cattle routes already gazetted had been encroached upon and such routes should be recovered and improved upon, taking into consideration present day realities;

Also aware that as a result of the above findings, the Committee recommended the release of ₦100 billion through the Central Bank of Nigeria as seed funding to all the States for the construction of ranches;

20. **Call on the Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN) to submit a Report on the Total amount Collected as Stamp Duty Charges in 2016**

Order read: deferred by leave of the House.

21. **Appeal for Intensification of Search and Unconditional Release of Teachers, Workers and Students Kidnapped from the Nigerian Turkish International College, Isheri, Ogun State**
Motion made and Question proposed;

The House:

Notes with shock the news that a group of armed men, at about 9:30 pm on January 13, 2017 broke into the premises of the Nigerian Turkish International College (NTIC) Isheri and kidnaped three female supervisors, a female cook, a Turkish female teacher and three students whom they took away through a very dangerous route and have held hostage ever since;

Worried that this unfortunate incident, happening barely few days after the resumption of schools from holidays, has left the parents, guardians, relatives and indeed the entire nation anguished, not to imagine the trauma that the kidnaped people must be suffering;

Concerned about the developing trend of the kidnaping of school children and their teachers given the recent incident of a similar action at the Lagos Model College, Epe about three months ago where gunmen kidnaped four students, the Vice Principal and a teacher;

Resolves to:

Ibrahim Ayokunle Isiaka — Ifo/Ewekoro Federal Constituency*).

Worried that this unfortunate incident, happening barely few days after the resumption of schools from holidays, has left the parents, guardians, relatives and indeed the entire nation anguished, not to imagine the trauma that the kidnaped people must be suffering;

Concerned about the developing trend of the kidnaping of school children and their teachers given the recent incident of a similar action at the Lagos Model College, Epe about three months ago where gunmen kidnaped four students, the Vice Principal and a teacher;
