- (i) ***Request for Full Utilization and Engagement of the Services of the Nigerian Army in Nationwide Provision of Infrastructure and Particularly in the Physical Reconstruction and Provision of Security in the North-East Region:***

Hon. Mohammed Sani Zorro (Gumel/Maigatari/S/Tankar/Gagarawa Federal Constituency and 3 others) introduced the matter and prayed the House to:

- (a) consider and approve the matter as one of urgent public importance; and
- (b) suspend Order Eight, Rule 4 (3) to allow debate on the matter forthwith.

Question that the matter be considered as one of urgent public importance — Agreed to.

Question that the House do suspend Order Eight, Rule 4 (3) to enable it debate the matter forthwith — Agreed to.

Request for Full Utilization and Engagement of the Services of the Nigerian Army in Nation-wide Provision of Infrastructure and Particularly in the Physical Reconstruction and Provision of Security in the North-east Region

The House:

Aware of the huge potential of the Nigerian Armed Forces, especially the Army Corps of Engineers whose service if properly deployed could accelerate the provision of infrastructure nation-wide, particularly the North-East Region, as well as security at construction sites in areas destroyed by Boko Haram insurgents;

Conscious of the role that a peace-time Army usually plays, especially civil construction of bridges, roads, emergency hospitals, shelters, schools, barracks, police stations, town halls, etc., for which the Nigerian Army is well known;

Also aware that the yet-to-be inaugurated North East Development Commission (NEDC) would eventually spearhead the reconstruction and redevelopment activities of the North-East region, and would need to partner with security forces for the smooth execution of its civil works and other activities;

Convinced of the mass recruitment potential of skilled and semi-skilled young Nigerians that the policy may endanger if the services of the Army in civil construction activities were to be fully utilized, thus complementing the youth employment agendas of both the National Assembly and the Executive branch of government;

Also conscious that the services of the Army Corps of Engineers could be on Build, Maintain and Secure (BUMS) basis, in contrast to civilian contractors who build and often abandon projects without completion;

Also convinced that the patronage of the services of the Armed Forces could lead to self-sufficiency in their finances as is the case with the US and Egyptian Armies just to mention but a few, instead of over relying on budgetary appropriation(s) as is now the case for the Nigerian Armed Forces.

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the Federal Government to direct its relevant ministries, departments and agencies especially the Federal Ministry of Works, Power and Housing, FERMA, Federal Ministries of Agriculture, Health, Education, etc. to dedicate a substantial part of their annual budgetary appropriation for civil engineering contracts for award to the Nigerian Army based on competitive bidding, to assist in diversifying the Army's revenue base;
- (ii) also urge the Board of the NEDC when inaugurated, to partner with the Nigerian Army to deliver on civil construction works in the conflict zones of the region, on Build, Maintain and Secure (BUMS) basis;
- (iii) further urge the Senate to concur with this Motion in view of its significance and the positive impact it will bring to bear on the various sectors; and
- (iv) mandate the Committee on Legislative Compliance to ensure adequate compliance with all resolutions contained in the Motion (*Hon. Mohammed Sani Zorro — Gumel/Maigatari/S/Tankar/Gagarawa Federal Constituency and 3 Others*).

The Death of 26 Nigerian Girls aged 18 - 24 in the Mediterranean Sea

The House:

Notes with sadness the death of twenty-six (26) Nigerian girls in the Mediterranean sea while trying to cross from Libya to Italy on Sunday, 5 November, 2017;

Worried that the dead Nigerians were the only set of people allegedly murdered in a boat that was reportedly carrying over six hundred (600) passengers;

Further worried that the incident has generated serious global outrage and is being reported by foreign media;

Concerned that in recent times, this has been the fate of many trying to cross from Libya to Europe.

Resolves to:

Mandate the Committees on Foreign Affairs, and Human Rights, to look into the matter and liaise with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Libyan Embassy, to ascertain the cause of the death (*Hon. Femi Gbajabiamila — Surulere I Federal Constituency*).

12. **Need to Address the Decaying Infrastructural Facilities in Abuja**

Motion made and Question proposed;

The House:

Notes that the creation of Abuja as the Capital city of Nigeria arose as a vision of our past leaders to have a modern capital city built with modern infrastructural facilities that could compete favourably with capital cities of other advanced countries of the world:

Also notes that in realization of this noble vision, humongous amounts of funds have been spent by successive governments to construct Abuja with modern facilities like roads, road markings and signs, streets and traffic lights, state of the art buildings, electricity, water, trees, flowers and green areas, among others for decent living of the inhabitants of the Federal Capital City;

Further notes that over the years, on account of neglect in the maintenance of those facilities by relevant agencies as well the criminal activities of vandals, the infrastructural facilities in the capital city have seriously deteriorated;

Aware that the serene, beautiful and previously well illuminated Capital city of Abuja is fast losing its glory as most of the installed streets lightings and other infrastructural facilities are either no longer functional or have been damaged beyond repairs with most parts of the city now in darkness at night;

Concerned that the situation is now assuming a dangerous dimension as miscreants, hoodlums and other criminal elements capitalize on the situation to wreak havoc on unsuspecting inhabitants, leading to an upsurge in crimes at Abuja;

Cognizant of the need for intervention to address the problems in order to restore Abuja to the status of a modern city that was envisioned by its founding fathers;

Resolves to:

Mandate the Committees on Federal Capital Territory, and Federal Capital Territory Area Councils and Ancillary Matters to investigate the decay in infrastructural facilities in the FCT and its environs and make recommendations on how best the problems would be addressed, and report back within 4 weeks for further legislative action (*Hon. Nasiru Sule Garo — Gwarzo/Kabo Federal Constituency*).

Debate.

Amendment Proposed:

In the Prayer, *leave out* the words "Mandate the Committees on Federal Capital Territory, and Federal Capital Territory Area Councils and Ancillary Matters" and *insert* the following word "Set up an *Ad-hoc* Committee" (*Hon. Akpatason Peter Ohiozogh — Akoko-Edo Federal Constituency*).

Question that the amendment be made — Negatived

Main Question on the Motion — Agreed to.

The House:

13. **Need to Investigate Allegations of Illegal Recruitment of Workers at the Nigerian Communications Commission (NCC)**

Order read; deferred by leave of the House.

- (ii) mandate the Committee on Tertiary Education and Services to ensure implementation and report back within six (6) weeks for further legislative action (**HR. 155/2017**).

17. Call to Urgently Halt Retaking of Madagali Local Government Area in Adamawa State by Insurgents

Motion made and Question proposed;

The House:

Notes that Madagali Local Government Area is located on the fringe of the dreaded Sambisa forest which is the hub of activities of the Boko Haram insurgents;

Aware that Madagali Local Government Area was the first of the seven Local Government Areas in Adamawa State that were taken over by the insurgents in 2014;

Also aware that before the retreat of the insurgents, the Local Government suffered protracted occupation while its villages bordering Sambisa forest have never witnessed true peace since 2014;

Concerned about the increase in attacks by the insurgents on villages and towns of the Local Government Area, including Gulak the headquarters, leading to loss of many lives;

Recalls the attack of 6 November, 2017 during which the insurgents tried desperately to retake Gulak, but for the gallant efforts of the Nigerian Army that overpowered them;

Also concerned that if Madagali Local Government Area, which is the gateway to Adamawa State from Borno State falls into the hands of the insurgents as it happened in 2014, the relative peace being enjoyed by other local governments in the State, particularly Michika, Mubi North, Mubi South, Maiha, Hong and Gombi, etc. will be jeopardized, and the people would become traumatized and displaced as it happened in 2014, with the attendant humanitarian crisis;

Cognizant that if no concerted effort is made at this time to step up military campaigns and other proactive measures, the insurgents may reinforce in a bid to overrun the local government.

Resolves to:

- (i) commend the President and Commander in Chief of the Armed Forces for his efforts to restore peace in the North-East and urge the Federal Government to step up military campaigns in the Sambisa forest and its environs;
- (ii) also commend the Nigerian Army for its gallant efforts in preventing the insurgents from retaking Gulak town on November 6, 2017 and urge the Army and Air Force to urgently deploy more troops and equipment to Madagali Local Government Area to forestall the retaking of the area by the insurgents;
- (iii) observe one minute silence in honour of the soldiers and civilians who lost their lives in the recent attack in Gulak, Madagali Local Government Area, Adamawa State; and
- (iv) mandate the Committees on Defence, Army, and Air Force to ensure implementation and report back within four (4) weeks for further legislative action (*Hon. Adamu Kamale — Madagali/Michika Federal Constituency*).

Amendments Proposed

- (i) *Leave out* all the words in Prayer (ii) and *insert* as follows:
“also commend the Nigerian Army, specifically the Duty Commanders at Guluk during the incidence for their gallant efforts in preventing the insurgents from retaking Gulak town on November 6, 2017 and urge the Army and Air Force to urgently deploy more troops and equipment to Madagali Local Government Area to forestall the retaking of the area by the insurgents” (Hon. Lawal Abubakar — Yola North/Yola South/Gire Federal Constituency).

Question that the amendment be made — Agreed to.

- (ii) *Insert* a new Prayer (v) as follows:
“surveillance and intelligent gathering to be reinforced to curtail the re-gathering of the insurgents” (Hon. Muhammed Umar Jega — Aliero/Gwandu/Jega Federal Constituency).

Question that the amendment be made — Agreed to.

Question on the Motion as amended — Agreed to.

The House:

Noted that Madagali Local Government Area is located on the fringe of the dreaded Sambisa forest which is the hub of activities of the Boko Haram insurgents;

Aware that Madagali Local Government Area was the first of the seven Local Government Areas in Adamawa State that were taken over by the insurgents in 2014;

Also aware that before the retreat of the insurgents, the Local Government suffered protracted occupation while its villages bordering Sambisa forest have never witnessed true peace since 2014;

Concerned about the increase in attacks by the insurgents on villages and towns of the Local Government Area, including Gulak the headquarters, leading to loss of many lives;

Recalled the attack of 6 November, 2017 during which the insurgents tried desperately to retake Gulak, but for the gallant efforts of the Nigerian Army that overpowered them;

Also concerned that if Madagali Local Government Area, which is the gateway to Adamawa State from Borno State falls into the hands of the insurgents as it happened in 2014, the relative peace being enjoyed by other local governments in the State, particularly Michika, Mubi North, Mubi South, Maiha, Hong and Gombi, etc. will be jeopardized, and the people would become traumatized and displaced as it happened in 2014, with the attendant humanitarian crisis;

Cognizant that if no concerted effort is made at this time to step up military campaigns and other proactive measures, the insurgents may reinforce in a bid to overrun the local government.

Resolved to:

- (i) commend the President and Commander in Chief of the Armed Forces for his efforts to restore peace in the North-East and urge the Federal Government to step up military campaigns in the Sambisa forest and its environs;
- (ii) also commend the Nigerian Army, specifically the Duty Commanders at Guluk during the incidence for their gallant efforts in preventing the insurgents from retaking Gulak town on November 6, 2017 and urge the Army and Air Force to urgently deploy more troops and equipment to Madagali Local Government Area to forestall the retaking of the area by the insurgents;

- (iii) observe one minute silence in honour of the soldiers and civilians who lost their lives in the recent attack in Gulak, Madagali Local Government Area, Adamawa State;
- (iv) mandate the Committees on Defence, Army, and Air Force to ensure implementation and report back within four (4) weeks for further legislative action; and
- (v) surveillance and intelligent gathering to be reinforced to curtail the re-gathering of the insurgents (HR. 156/2017).

18. Consideration of Reports

That items 11 and 12 on the *Order Paper* be deferred to the next legislative day, pursuant to Order Eight, Rule 6 (3) (Hon. Orker-Jev Emmanuel Yisa — Buruku Federal Constituency).

19. Adjournment

That the House do adjourn till Tuesday, 14 November, 2017 at 11.00 a.m. (Hon. Femi Gbajabiamila — House Leader).
