Hon. Gbillah Mark Terseer (*Gwer East/Gwer West Federal Constituency*) introduced the matter and prayed the House to:

- (b) suspend Order Eight, Rule 4 (3) to allow debate on the matter forthwith.

Question that the matter be considered as one of urgent public importance — Agreed to.

The Derogatory Statement by the Police Public Relations Officer (PRO) Against an Executive Governor of a State and the Seeming Unwillingness of the Inspector-General of Police to Recognize and Enforce a Constitutionally Enacted Law by the Legislative Arm of Government:

Also aware of media reports making the rounds that in his recent testimony before a Senate committee after the inability of the police to apprehend the killers of the innocent people in Benue State at the expiration of the 14-day ultimatum, the Inspector-General of Police allegedly blamed the recent killings in Benue on the enactment of the Open Grazing Prohibition Law by the Benue State House of Assembly and called for its suspension by the State Government;

Question that the matter be considered as one of urgent public importance — Agreed to.

Question that the House do suspend Order Eight, Rule 4 (3) to enable it debate the matter forthwith — Agreed to.

The Need to Curb in Political Activities in Kano State and Nigeria in General:

The House:

Notes the alarming rate of sponsorship of thuggery in Kano State and Nigeria at large in political rallies as well as other activities;

Also notes that the sponsorship of thuggery by some politicians in the country has created a wrong perception about the patriotism of Nigerian politicians and condemned this development in Nigeria;

Observes that this ugly incidence can lead to the breakdown of law and orders in the country as well as impede the political development and democracy in Nigeria;

Concerned that some politicians are responsible for arming the thugs and sponsoring of fetish items for protection to intimidate or assassinate their political opponents;

Worried that thuggery activity in Nigeria has created disharmony among the people of same community leading to loss of many innocent lives as well as well-meaning politicians in the country;

Disturbed that the Nigeria Police and other security personnel have turn a blind eye to this acts of terror being perpetrated in the open by the thugs in Kano and other parts of the country;

Resolves to:

- (i) invite the Inspector-General of Police (IGP) and Commissioner of Police, Kano State to appear before the Committee on Police Affairs to give account of the incidents in Kano State; and
- (ii) urge the IGP and Commissioner of Police, Kano State to provide measures to mitigate against thuggery in Kano State and other parts of the country (*Hon. Danburam Abubakar Nuhu — Kano Municipal Federal Constituency*).

Motion made and Question proposed:

The House:

Notes that the Committee on Information, National Orientation, Ethics and Values was discharged from the Referral of the above Bill on 18 January, 2018, pursuant to Order Seventeen, Rule 3 (g) of the Standing Orders of the House;

Also notes that on 25 January, 2018, the House, in the Committee of the Whole, considered the Report on a Bill for an Act to Amend the National Broadcasting Commission Act, 2018 (HB. 168) and adopted the Report on the recommendations of the Committee of the Whole;

Informed that the Committee on Information, National Orientation, Ethics and Values had conducted public hearing on the Bill on 6 December, 2016 in line with legislative practice and procedures but had not presented its Report to the House before it was discharged from the referral;

Also informed that the Report of the Committee with the aggregated opinions of the Players' and Stakeholders in the Industry is now ready;

Resolves to:

- (i) rescind the Resolution of 18 January, 2018 which discharged the Committee on Information, National Orientation, Ethics and Values of the referral of the Bill;
- (ii) also rescind the recommendation of the Committee of the Whole of 25 January, 2018 which adopted the Report on the Bill, and
- (iii) refer the Bill back to the Committee on Information, National Orientation, Ethics and Values for further legislative action (*Hon. Odebunmi Olusegun Dokun — Ogo-Oluwa/Surulere Federal Constituency*).

10. **Request for Extension of Referral Time to enable the "Ad-hoc Committee to Interface with the Federal Ministry of Petroleum Resources on the Review of the Price of Premium Motor Spirit (PMS) conclude work on its Assignment (HR. 218/2016)" (Referred: 29/11/2016)**

Motion made and Question proposed:

The House:

Recalls that on Wednesday, 7 December, 2016, the House constituted an *Ad-hoc* Committee to interface with the Federal Ministry of Petroleum Resources on the Review of the Price of Premium Motor Spirit (PMS);

Also recalls that the *Ad-hoc* Committee was mandated to interface with the Federal Ministry of Petroleum Resources on the review of the price of PMS and such other related matters and report back within eight (8) weeks for further legislative action;

Informed that the *Ad-hoc* Committee has carried out work on the referral and presented an Interim Report on Wednesday, 8 November, 2017 but owing to the sensitive nature of the assignment and the voluminous amount of data collected which are being carefully analyzed, the *Ad-hoc* Committee has not presented its final Report in accordance with Order Seventeen, Rule 3 (g) of the Standing Orders of the House:

Resolves to:

Grant the *Ad-hoc* Committee an extension of time of eight (8) weeks to enable it conclude the assignment and present its final Report for further legislative action (*Hon. Raphael Nnanna Igbokwe — Ahiazu Mbaise/Ngor Okpala Federal Constituency*).

Agreed to.

12. **Call for Environmental Audit of the Coastal Areas of Nigeria**

Motion made and Question proposed:

The House:

Notes that the Coastal Areas of Nigeria, most of which host the Oil and Gas industries that are sustaining the nation's economy, are integral parts of Nigeria as an entity;

Also notes that the assailability of the coastal areas owing to the devastating effects of exploration and exploitation of oil and gas and vagaries of nature is inevitable, hence the need for regular environmental audit and assessment of the coastal areas;

Cognizant that such routine environmental audit will create a sense of belonging for the host communities, thereby encouraging patriotism and a harmonious atmosphere within which effective exploration of oil and gas in the communities can take place, thus eliminating cases of sabotage, oil spillage, etc.;

Resolves to:

Mandate the Committees on Environment and Habitat, and Climate Change to interface with officials of the Ministry of Environment, the National Environmental Standards and Regulations Enforcement Agency, the National Oil Spill Detection and Response Agency, the Department of Climate Change and Multi-national Companies operating in the coastal areas of Nigeria on the environmental impact and the last detailed environmental audit carried out on the effects of their activities on the environment and report back within four (4) weeks for further legislative action (*Hon. Randolph Iwo Oruene Brown — Degema/Bonny Federal Constituency*).

Debate.

Agreed to.

The House:

Noted that the Coastal Areas of Nigeria, most of which host the Oil and Gas industries that are sustaining the nation's economy, are integral parts of Nigeria as an entity;

Also noted that the assailability of the coastal areas owing to the devastating effects of exploration and exploitation of oil and gas and vagaries of nature is inevitable, hence the need for regular environmental audit and assessment of the coastal areas;

13. Need to Conduct Demographic Survey of Police Officers and Create More Police Stations to Tackle the Current Security Challenges in the Country

Motion made and Question proposed:

The House:

Notes that Nigeria is currently facing enormous security challenges which are partly caused by the astronomical increase in the population of the country that is not matched with corresponding increase in the number of security personnel, thus making it difficult to effectively police the nation and guarantee citizens prompt access to security personnel;

Also notes that as a result of shortage of police and other security personnel, many criminal offences are being committed on a daily basis, especially in the rural areas, without the law enforcement agents being present to arrest the situation;

Further notes that owing to lack of review of data of police personnel, there is an appalling proliferation of fake police officers as evidenced in the arrests of dismissed police personnel still parading themselves as police officers while in police uniform and in possession of police accoutrements;

Recalls the report that the Inspector General of Police had, on 16 May 2017, stated that policemen would be deployed to their communities of origin in order to bridge the gap between the police and the populace and also enhance community policing;

Convinced that there is need for recruitment of additional police officers, creation of more police stations and out-posts at the urban and rural areas to match up with the current increase in the population of the nation;

Resolves to:

- (i) call on the Nigeria Police Force to create more police stations and out-posts in the urban and rural areas for a more effective and community-based policing to ensure the safety and welfare of the citizens; and
- (ii) mandate the Committee on Police Affairs to convene a stakeholders meeting, in collaboration with relevant interests, to identify the problems confronting the police and challenges of policing the nation with a view to proffering solutions to them in the interest of the nation (Hon. Jimoh Abdulraheem Olajide — Lagos Mainland Federal Constituency).

Debate.

Question that the amendment be made — Agreed to.
