The Senate:

Notes with concern the exponential increase in the scourge of street begging and the nuisance it constitutes on the streets of major cities across the country;

Aware that though street begging is a global urban problem, the situation in Nigeria appears intractable and overwhelming as beggars are now found everywhere especially at motor parks, religious centres, road junctions, venues of ceremonies and other public places;

Observes that in the past beggars are persons with physical and mental challenges or grossly indigent, in recent times there appear to be a new trend of beggars in town, popularly known as corporate beggars who take advantage of the sympathy of the society for the less privilege to remain jobless and at times perpetrate crimes in the name of street begging;

Regrets that while for example the system that produced the *almajiris* is still very much in existence, its economic support tools have largely been discarded with the neglect of the government;

Acknowledges that street begging does not only affect the geographical and social structure of urban areas, it also portrays the country in a bad image to tourist and foreign visitors; and

Concerned that street begging is a worrisome socio-economic challenge, in addition to being a serious menace and liability on the Nigerian populace, as it takes a heavy toll on the lives of teenagers who either act as guide to beggars or even engage in the act themselves and therefore are out of school.

Accordingly resolves to:

- i. *Call* on the Federal Government to formulate policy that would integrate *almajiris* into the educational system thereby discouraging them from being used for street begging; and
- ii. *Call* on the Federal and State Governments to set up vocational training centres to provide beggars with alternative means of livelihood thereby making them useful to the society.

2. The need to ensure immediate commencement of the Oil and Gas Research Centre and Museum, Oloibiri, Bayelsa State – Nigeria's first oil field.

The Senate:

Notes that the first oil well in Nigeria was discovered in commercial quantity in Oloibiri in present day Bayelsa State by Shell Petroleum Development Company on 15th January, 1956 with a production capacity of 5,100 barrels per day;

Also notes that export of crude oil from the Oloibiri field started in 1958 and shortly after, crude oil became the main stay of the economy. Consequently, changing Nigeria's oil history have launched the country into the elite club of oil producers, astronomically increased her foreign exchange earnings;

Further notes that about 63 years after discovery, exploitation and production of crude oil, the Oloibiri oil field and surrounding host communities had suffered neglect and environmental degradation. Land, water and air was constantly polluted due to the activities of the oil companies. The inhabitants of the area had suffered and some even died from epidemics and terminal diseases due to oil spills and flaring of natural Gas in addition to damage of their source of livelihood;

Concerned that today, Oloibiri oil field (well) which is the first oil well in west Africa is now dried after several decades of production. Sadly, the field is covered with rust, weeds and marked with weather beaten sign board with inscription Oloibiri Well 1;

Observes that in other climes where crude oil was first found, notably, the Little Titusville in Pennsylvania United states of America, Manama, Bahrain in Asia, Government develops heritage Institutions such as oil Museum and Research Centres, Industrial parks etc;

Recalls that in recognition of the importance of the first oil field (well) and the need to develop the great foreign exchange earning tourism potentials of the area as well as improve the standard of living of inhabitants of the communities, the idea to build a national world class Museum of Oil and Gas was conceptualized, designed and foundation stone equally laid by President Shehu Shagari in 1983. The progress of the project was however halted no sooner than it commenced;

Disturbed that in the same vein, another foundation stone of the Museum was laid by Former president Olusegun Obasanjo in 2001 but still the area is a sad commentary of the Oil and Gas Industry in Nigeria. It shows no trace that it was the place where oil was first drilled and exported;

Disturbed further that much later, the Nigeria National Petroleum Corporation (NNPC) presented an Act to establish the National Oil and Gas Museum and Research Centre in Oloibiri and recommended the construction of the Museum and the Research Centre with clear budgetary allocation from the Federal Government under the control and management of the National Commission for Museum and Monuments. Again, no progress was made being a clear case of neglect and abandonment;

Worried that though the Federal Government removed the project from National Commission for Museum and Monuments and domiciled it with the Petroleum Technology Development Fund (PTDF) in 2011, the project still remains moribund; and

Further worried that the contract for the construction of the Oil and Gas Research Center and Museum as re-awarded by PTDF valued at about thirty-five billion naira (₦35.000.000.000) is yet to commence, leaving the inhabitants of the host communities with the negative memories of oil exploration and production.

Accordingly resolves to:

- i. *Commend* the Federal Government for the conceptualization, design and award of contract for the establishment of the Oil and Gas Research Centre and Museum in Oloibiri, the first oil field in Nigeria to promote tourism and improve the socio-economic wellbeing of the people;
 - ii. *Urge* the Federal Government to give priority attention to the development of heritage institutions such as the Oloibiri Oil and Gas Research Centre and Museum as a constant reminder and enrichment of the history of our socio-economic development;
 - iii. *Urge* the Federal Government to direct PTDF and the concerned contractors to mobilize to site, commence the immediate construction of the Oil and Gas Research Centre and Museum at Oloibiri; and
 - iv. *Direct* relevant Senate Committees to carry out intensive oversight on the implementation of this project.
3. The need for the Federal Government of Nigeria to utilize and Integrate Traditional Medicine into the National Health System to ensure affordable health care.

The Senate:

Notes that in low-income countries like Nigeria, a large percentage of the population have to pay for medicines for themselves, rendering medicines unaffordable for many. Therefore, many of the rural and urban poor turn to alternative forms of medicines, which in most cases are poorly regulated;

Aware that while there have been laudable schemes like the NHIS, improper implementation juxtaposed with the booming population means that large swathes of the population are without health cover and contribute to the over 70 percent of health expenditure financed by out-of-pocket payments, further impoverishing the poor and taking orthodox or conventional medicines out of their reach;

Also aware that save for Paracetamol and Folic Acid, both of which have a high availability of 74.31 percent, many Primary Health Care Centers have low availability of essential drugs like Azithromycin, Nifedipine, Dexamethasone and Misoprostol, among others. That since some herbal medicines have proven efficacious in the treatment of some diseases, a systematized integration of herbal and alternative medicines into the health system will go a long way into ameliorating the difficulties faced by many Nigerians in procuring drugs for their medical needs;

Convinced that following success stories of dual health systems in many Asian countries like South Korea, Malaysia, and especially China whose efforts in the research and development of complementary and alternative medicine produced Tu Youyou, the 2015 Nobel Laureate for the country. The Federal Ministry of Health should study and draw lessons on how to bridge the gap between orthodox and herbal medicines;

Conscious that despite the existence of Nigeria Natural Medicines Development Agency in Lagos, Nigeria and the National Institute for Pharmaceutical Research and Development founded in 1988 and 1992 respectively, there has been minimal progress in the development of Alternative Medicines. That the World Health Organization (WHO) through its Traditional Medicine Strategy of 2014-2023 has advocated integration of complementary and traditional medicine into the health system of most countries in the world; and

Convinced that the best way to address the problem of unaffordability of drugs in Nigeria is through effective regulation and the systematized integration of herbal and alternative medicines into health system by the Federal and State Ministries of Health.

Accordingly resolves to:

Call on the Federal Government of Nigeria to strengthen and standardize herbal medical practice to achieve integration of the practice into the health system.
