1. The Senate met at 10:53 a.m. The Deputy Senate President read Prayers.
2. **Votes and Proceedings:**

4. Privileges:

Rising on Rule 14, Senator Dino Melaye (*Kogi West*) drew the attention of the Senate to the adoption of the Conference Report on the Independent National Electoral Commission Act 2010 (Amendment) Bill, 2018 by the Senate on Wednesday, 14th February, 2018 and the insinuation by Senator Ovie A. Omo-Agege (*Delta Central*) through press conference, that the amendment to the Bill was targeted at President Muhammadu Buhari, GCFR. He described the statement as malicious, unfounded and aimed at smearing the reputation of the Senate as an Institution and impugned on his person, who worked so hard for the emergence of Mr. President. He urged the Senate to investigate the matter.

By leave of the Senate, matter referred to the Committee on Ethics, Privileges and Public Petitions.

5. Personal Explanation:

Rising on Rule 43, Senator Shehu Sani (*Kaduna Central*) drew the attention of the Senate to the demolition of property at No. 11, Sambo Road, Kaduna, led by the State Governor, Mallam Nasiru El-Rufai and armed security personnel at 4:30 a.m on 20th February, 2018. He informed the Senate that the property belong to Senator Suleiman Othman Hunkuyi (*Kaduna North*). He lamented that though we are under democracy, the Kaduna State Governor uses armed personnel to constantly perpetrate tyranny, terror and suppression of opposing political views with impunity. He urged the President, Commander-in-Chief of the Armed Forces of the Federation, to prevail on the Governor to desist from such acts of impunity that can throw the State into chaos and anarchy.

The Senate sympathised with Senator Suleiman Othman Hunkuyi, condemned the action and urged politicians to uphold the rule of law.

6. Personal Explanation:

Rising on Rule 43, Senator Isah H. Misau (*Bauchi Central*) drew the attention of the Senate to the Daily Trust Newspaper of Monday, 19th February, 2018, which invited Stakeholders to a Public Hearing on Federal College of Education, Dass (Establishment, etc.) Bill, 2018. He explained that his Senatorial District was unfairly treated when it comes to siting of Federal Institutions in Bauchi State. Justice and fairness demands that Federal Government Institutions should be fairly spread across the State. He urged the Senate to look into the matter.

By leave of the Senate, matter is referred to the Committee on Tertiary Institutions and TETFUND to advise the Senate. The Public Hearing should be suspended until the report is presented.

- (a) ***Re-committal of Public Procurement Act 2009 (Amendment) Bill, 2018:***

Motion made: That the Senate recalls that the Public Procurement Act 2009 (Amendment) Bill, 2018 was passed by the Senate on Thursday, 16th June, 2016 after the Third Reading:

aware that the Harmonized Bill was adopted by the Senate on Thursday, 27th July, 2017 and forwarded to the Clerk to the National Assembly for further legislative action;

notes that after critical examination of the Bill, the Legal Services Directorate observed that Clause 11(4) and (6) were in conflict:

- (i) Sub-clause (4) stipulates that the Clerk to the National Assembly shall chair the National Assembly Tenders Board; while
- (ii) Sub-clause (6) provides that the same Clerk shall be the Secretary of the National Assembly Board;

relying on order 1(b) of the Senate Standing Order 2015 as amended,

Accordingly resolved to:

refer the Public Procurement Act 2009 (Amendment) Bill, 2018 to the Conference Committee that considered the Bill for further legislative action (*Senate Leader*).

(b) *Urgent need to investigate Nigerian National Petroleum Corporation (NNPC)/Nigerian Agip Oil Company IPP Security Account:*

Motion made: That the Senate notes with serious concern the operation of an account by the Nigerian National Petroleum Corporation (NNPC)/Agip Oil Company;

observes that the account opened with the name- Nigerian National Petroleum Corporation (NNPC)/Nigerian Agip Oil Company IPP Security account with address NNPC Garki, Herbert Macaulay Way is domiciled in First Bank Nigeria Plc with account number 2006367288;

observes also that the opening balance was ₦31,704,807,979.2 with a closing balance of ₦34,423,738,086.4 as at 25th April, 2017;

aware that there has been lodgment and withdrawals since January, 2017;

observes that a lot of questions are begging for answers as regards this account-

- a. The objectives of the account?
- b. The Signatories to the Account?
- c. Is the account known to the Federal Government?
- d. What are the sources of the account's fund?

convinced that there is an urgent need to investigate the rationale behind the operation of this account.

Accordingly resolves to:

mandate the Committee on Public Accounts to carry out a holistic investigation into the operation of this account and report within four (4) weeks (*Senator Dino Melaye — Kogi West*).

Debate:

Proposed Resolution:

Question: That the Senate do mandate the Committee on Public Accounts to carry out a holistic investigation into the operation of this account and report within four (4) weeks —
Agreed to.

Resolved:

That the Senate do mandate the Committee on Public Accounts to carry out a holistic investigation into the operation of this account and report within four (4) weeks (S/Res/188/03/18).

(c) ***Urgent need to establish more Rehabilitation Centers across the country:***

Motion made: That the Senate notes with serious concern that drugs and substance abuse have become the order of the day in all parts of the country with the attendant negative consequences which include criminal activities such as armed robbery, rape etc;

worried that at least 50% of all addicts are likely to bear children with the same addictive traits in their offspring unless and until they undergo professional drugs cessation rehabilitation;

further worried that drugs and substances abuse affect intelligence which has gross negative effect in a person's development across physical interpersonal social daily life which retards his basic achievements and therefore devastating multiple effects on the society;

convinced that rehabilitation centres, if increased will be able to address quite a number of issues both in the short term and the long term including professional rehabilitation of drug addicts, diagnosis of children on childhood psychological disorders, personality functioning for adults, intelligence Quotient (I.Q) testing;

further convinced that increased in the number of these centres will go a long way to reduce drugs related issues such as, impairment of memory, judgment, irritability, paranoid, suicidal ideation (suggestions to commit suicide), agitation or aggressiveness among the youths; and

aware that the unemployed graduates who are holding certificates in psychiatry, public health and community health will be employed by these centres.

Accordingly resolves to:

- (i) urge the Federal Government through the Federal Ministry of Health to establish Rehabilitation Centre in each Local Government Area of the country; and
- (ii) mandate Committee on Health to ensure that the Federal Government gives the centres the needed attention when established (*Senator Jeremiah T. Useni — Plateau South*).

Debate:**Proposed Resolution(i):**

Question: That the Senate do urge the Federal Government through the Federal Ministry of Health to establish Rehabilitation Centre in each Local Government Area of the country.

Amendment Proposed:

Leave out Proposed Resolution (i) and *insert* the following instead thereof:

"That the Senate do urge the Federal Government through the Federal Ministry of Health in collaboration with National Drug Law Enforcement Agency (NDLEA) to establish Rehabilitation Centres in each State of the country" (*Senator Rabiu M. Musa — Kano Central*).

Question that the amendment be made, put and agreed to.

Proposed Resolution(ii):

Question: That the Senate do mandate Committee on Health to ensure that the federal Government gives the centres the needed attention when established — *Agreed to.*

Resolved:

That the Senate:

- (i) urge the Federal Government through the Federal Ministry of Health in collaboration with National Drug Law Enforcement Agency (NDLEA) to establish Rehabilitation Centres in each State of the country; and
- (ii) mandate Committee on Health to ensure that the Federal Government gives the centres the needed attention when established (S/Res/189/03/18).

(d) ***Urgent need to look into the killings that took place in Zurmi Local Government Area of Zamfara State:***

Motion made: That the Senate notes that cross border banditry has brought Nigeria's frail security system to the limelight having triggered an orgy of violence in Zamfara State which left 39 people dead in Zurmi Local Government Area on Wednesday, 14th February, 2018;

recalls that following a motion that I moved on the 23rd of November 2017 on the "Urgent need to look into the killings and arson that took place in Shinkafi L. G. A of Zamfara State" as a result of which the Senate suspended plenary to discuss the deterioration of Internal Security in Nigeria, which led to the recently concluded Security Summit;

regrets that despite the notice and warnings to the Law enforcement Agencies on the impending attack by the Zamfara State Government 24 hours before the attack no precaution was taken to avert the unfortunate event;

aware that Zamfara State Government has over the years taken a lot of measures to bring an end to the menace including but not limited to providing logistics to Security Agencies as well as engaging the bandits on dialogue with a promise of laying down their arms to be reintegrated back into the society;

also aware that the Federal Government since the last Shinkafi attack had deployed 1 Battalion of the Nigerian Army in the troubled area. In addition to the directives given by the President to security agencies to identify and bring the perpetrators to book;

concerned that Hundreds of lives have been lost to such attacks in the State over the last four years;

worried that the latest attacks have caused fears across the State, especially around rural communities who have had similar experiences in the past and are helpless; and

saddened that these security breaches are on the increase despite the huge resources being expended by the Federal and Zamfara State Governments.

Accordingly resolves to:

- (i) observe a minute Silence for the dead victims of these horrendous attacks;
- (ii) urge the Federal Government to direct the Nigerian Air Force to use air surveillance to identify the location of the armed bandits within the sparse forest and flush them out;
- (iii) urge the Federal Government to mount diplomatic pressure on Niger and Chad Republics to forestall criminals from using their territories to launch attack on Nigeria;
- (iv) urge Zamfara State Government to upgrade, recruit and generously fund State and Local vigilance teams with the aim of improving security in the affected areas; and

- (v) urge the National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) to immediately send relief materials to the affected area in Zurmi Local Government Area of Zamfara State (*Senator Tijjani Y. Kaura — Zamfara North*).

Debate:

Motion made: That the Senate do sit this day beyond the time appointed for the termination of the Sitting of the Senate (Rule 13) (*Senate Leader*).

Question: That the Senate do urge the Federal Government to direct the Nigerian Air Force to use air surveillance to identify the location of the armed bandits within the sparse forest and flush them out — *Agreed to.*

Proposed Resolution(iii):

Question: That the Senate do urge the Federal Government to mount diplomatic pressure on Niger and Chad Republics to forestall criminals from using their territories to launch attack on Nigeria — *Agreed to.*

Proposed Resolution(iv):

Question: That the Senate do urge Zamfara State Government to upgrade, recruit and generously fund State and Local vigilance teams with the aim of improving security in the affected areas — *Agreed to.*

That the Senate:

- (i) observe a minute Silence for the dead victims of these horrendous attacks;
- (ii) urge the Federal Government to direct the Nigerian Air Force to use air surveillance to identify the location of the armed bandits within the sparse forest and flush them out;

- (iii) urge the Federal Government to mount diplomatic pressure on Niger and Chad Republics to forestall criminals from using their territories to launch attack on Nigeria;
- (iv) urge Zamfara State Government to upgrade, recruit and generously fund State and Local vigilance teams with the aim of improving security in the affected areas;
- (v) urge the National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) to immediately send relief materials to the affected area in Zurmi Local Government Area of Zamfara State;
- (vi) *Ad hoc* Committee on the Review of Security Infrastructure of Nigeria to visit Zamfara State to determine the security situation and report to Senate; and
- (vii) urge the Federal Government to quickly establish Internally Displaced Persons Centres in safe areas in Zamfara State to accommodate the Internally Displaced Persons in the State (S/Res/190/03/18).

One minute silence accordingly observed in honour of the deceased.

(e) ***The revitalization of Primary Healthcare System across Nigeria:***

Motion made: That the Senate notes with worry the worsening state of the primary healthcare facilities across the country;

alarmed that Nigeria loses over 2300 children under the age of five and 145 women on daily basis due to poor state and inadequate number of primary healthcare facilities in the country, according to reports by World Health Organization and UNICEF;

alarmed further that less than 20 percent of the nation's rural population have access to primary healthcare facility, an initiative conceived fundamentally to take healthcare services to the doorsteps of the local communities, in so doing, addressing the immediate health needs of the people;

notes and as buttressed by Professor Eytayo Lambo, former Minister of Health that if the primary healthcare delivery system were functioning well with effective referral system, the primary healthcare system should be able to resolve the health problems of at least 70% of the people, compared to the less than 20% of the population that have access to it;

observes that between 2014 and 2015, the Federal Government spent well over ₦2 billion for the building of primary health centres across the country resulting in the award of 91 contracts but regrettably most of the healthcare centres have either been abandoned or locked without being used or worse still, lacking in equipment, drugs and relevant personnel;

notes that there is obvious disconnect between the relevant agencies of the Federal Government and those of the States and Local Councils where the primary healthcare centres are sited; and

worried that the federal government's agenda of ensuring adequate provision of primary healthcare facilities and services may run into a serious hitch, given the critical challenges enumerated above.

Accordingly resolves to:

- (i) urge the Federal Government to take immediate and concrete steps to ensure that all the health centres are functional and operating at full capacity;
- (ii) urge the relevant Federal Government agencies to build urgent linkages, cooperation and partnership with corresponding bodies at state and local council levels and also the community leaders where the primary healthcare facilities are located for the accomplishment of shared goals and enhanced results;

- (iii) urge the Federal Government to ensure that at least two primary health centres are established and functioning at full capacity in each political ward in the country as against one announced by the government; and
- (iv) mandate the Committee on Primary Healthcare and Communicable Diseases to monitor compliance and report to the Senate within six (6) weeks (*Senator Duro S. Faseyi — Ekiti North*)
