**REQUEST FOR VIREMENT OF FUNDS FROM VARIOUS BUDGET LINES TO
FUND FEDERAL GOVERNMENT'S PRIORITY PROJECTS AND PROGRAMMES**

You will recall that the 2017 Appropriation Bill was signed into law on 12 June 2017. However, prior to the signing discussions and consultations were held between the Executive and the leadership of the National Assembly on some critical priority items for which adequate provisions had not been made in the 2017 Appropriation Act.

2. You would also recall that it was agreed that the Executive should submit a Virement Proposal to the National Assembly for your consideration. The purpose of this letter, therefore, is to forward the Virement Proposal.

3. The total amount of virement being proposed is N135,643,018,749, and the Ministries affected are as follows:

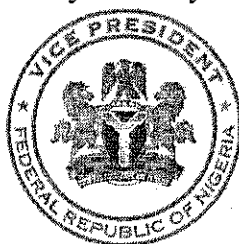
5. In the light of the above, I implore you to urgently consider this virement proposal in order to support our collective efforts to improve the well-being of our citizens.

THE FCT 2017 STATUTORY BUDGET PROPOSAL

I have the honour to seek Senate approval of the FCT 2017 Statutory Budget Proposal of the Federal Capital Territory Administration (FCTA) in line with section 121 of the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, 1999 (as amended).

2. As Your Excellency is aware, the Federal Capital Territory Administration (FCTA) runs two Budgets namely, National and the Statutory Budgets. The FCT component of the National Budget is funded directly by the Federal Government for the provision of District Infrastructural Development, Water Supply, Sewage Treatment and Infrastructural Development of the Satellite Towns of the Federal Capital Territory (FCT). The Statutory Budget on the other hand, is funded from the Statutory Allocation, Internally Generated Revenue (IGR) and other sources of funds accruable to the Federal Capital Territory (FCT).

3. It would be recalled that the sum of N30,397,122,872.00 (Thirty Billion, Three Hundred and Ninety Seven Million, One Hundred and Twenty Two Thousand, Eight Hundred and Seventy Two Naira) only was appropriated for FCT in the 2017 approved Federal Budget. The Statutory Budget is usually presented to the National Assembly after the passage of the Federal Budget in order to enable the FCTA capture essential capital projects that are often removed from the Federal Budget.

4. The FCTA has prepared the 2017 FCT Statutory Budget of the sum of N222,360,551,512.00 (Two Hundred and Twenty Two Billion, Three Hundred and Sixty Million, Five Hundred and Fifty One Thousand, Five Hundred and Twelve Naira) only, based on the 2017-2019 Medium Term Expenditure Framework (MTEF) and the key assumptions of the Federal Government for 2017 budget. The breakdown of the Budget is as follows:

5. In line with the Federal Government's emphasis on capital projects, the FCT budget ratio for Capital and Recurrent Expenditure is 57.79% and 42.21% respectfully. Considering the need to complete on-going projects, 93% of the capital expenditure proposal is dedicated for such projects, while 7% is for new projects mainly for the provision of access roads and social amenities.

6. The estimated revenue for the FCT 2017 Budget proposal is to accrue from the following main sources:

(i) Statutory Revenue Allocation (SRA)

The FCT share 1% out of the Federal Government Share from the Federation Account Allocation Committee, inclusive of VAT and Excess

(ii) Internally Generated Revenue (IGR)

The expected Internally Generated Revenue of the sum of N139,988,517,303.00 is to accrue from the major revenue generating agencies of the FCT which includes the Abuja Environmental Protection Board (AEPB), the FCT Internal Revenue Service (FCT-IRS), Water Board, Abuja Geographic Information System (AGIS) and the Directorate of Road Traffic Services. The enormous debts owed these agencies have also been identified and adequate enforcement will be made towards recovery of the outstanding debts.

7. I have taken the liberty of attaching the FCT 2017 Statutory Budget Proposal for ease of reference and consideration.

8. While looking forward to your kind approval of my request, please accept, Distinguished President of the Senate, the assurances of my highest esteem at all times.

He urged the Senate to look into the matter.

- (iv) Rising on Rule 41, Senator Dino Melaye (*Kogi West*) drew the attention of the Senate to a petition from his constituent, Lt. Col. Abdulfatai Mohammed (Rtd.), against the Nigerian Army, over unlawful retirement. He urged the Senate to look into the matter.

- (v) Rising on Rule 41, Senator Chukwuka G. He urged the Senate to look into the matter.

7. Matter of Urgent Public Importance:

Rising on Rule 42, Senator Rose O. Oko (*Cross River North*) drew the attention of the Senate to recent media discourse on Bakassi Peninsula indigenes. She stated that the International Court of Justice (ICJ) in 2002 ruling conceded the Bakassi Peninsula to the Republic of Cameroon. The ruling agreement Section 3(2) permits Nigerians to remain in their locations. The existing agreement has never been adhered to by Cameroon. She sought and obtained the leave of the Senate to present the matter.

Matter to stand over to the next Legislative Day [Rule 42(2)].

8. Personal Explanation:

Rising on Rule 43, Senator Ahmad I. Lawan (*Yobe North*) drew the attention of the Senate to a meeting he held with the Chairmen of Senate and House of Representatives Committees on Police Affairs; and the Inspector-General of Police specifically on the incessant kidnapping incidences along Abuja-Kaduna Express Way. He explained that it was made clear to the Inspector-General of Police that the situation was unacceptable and must be arrested immediately. He stated that the Inspector-General of Police informed them that there is a joint operation comprising Nigeria Police and Nigerian Army personnel dealing with the issue. The Inspector-General of Police further promised them that from Tuesday, 25th July, 2017 there will be another operation solely to be conducted by the Nigeria Police. He urged for the passage of Police Trust Fund Bill to generate more funds to the Police via private sector contributions.
