Report of the Conference Committee:

7. **Reconsideration of Outstanding Bills from the Preceding Assembly:**
Hon. Abubakar Hassan Fulata:

- (i) Raw Materials Research and Development Council (Repeal and Enactment) Bill, 2019 (HB.47);
- (ii) Federal Polytechnic, Shendam, Plateau State (Establishment) Bill, 2019 (HB. 395);

The House:

Notes that pursuant to Order Twelve (12), Rule 16 of the Standing Orders of the House of Representatives, Bills passed by the preceding Assembly and forwarded to the Senate for concurrence for which no concurrence was made or negatived or passed by the Senate and forwarded to the House for which no concurrence was made or negatived or which were passed by the National Assembly and forwarded to the President for assent but for which assent or withholding thereof was not communicated before the end of the tenure of the Assembly, the House may resolve that such Bills, upon being re-gazetted or clean copies circulated, be re-considered in the Committee of the Whole without being commenced de-novo;

Also notes that the aforementioned Bills were passed by the preceding Assembly and forwarded to the President for assent but for which assent or withholding thereof was not communicated before the end of the tenure of the last Assembly;

Aware that the Bills were re-gazetted as HBs. 47, 395, 471, 472, 474, 503 and 535 respectively and read the first time;

Resolves to:

Commit the Bills to the Committee of the Whole for consideration.

8. **Need to Rehabilitate Roads Destroyed by heavy and Articulated Vehicles in Ajeromi/Ifelodun Federal Constituency of Lagos State:**
Hon. Kolawole Taiwo Musibau.

The House:

Notes the Federal Government cherished policy to construct modern day park in our nation's ports and the ongoing construction of park at Apapa wharf port, Lagos which is at its peak;

Aware that as a result of the construction work, many trailers, tankers and other articulated vehicles that have businesses at the port could no long park inside the port;

Also aware that the vehicles now park in various parts of Lagos state particularly in the adjoining local governments to the port, like Apapa/Iganmu, Lagos Island, Surulere, Lagos Mainland and Ajeromi/Ifelodun local governments;

Further aware that some of the vehicles park on top of bridges in those local government areas with the knowledge that large number of trailers, tankers and other articulated vehicles ply Kirikiri, Otto Wharf, Mba/Orege roads, Rashidi Afuwape and Apere streets in Ajegunle, Jeromi/Ifelodun Federal Constituency on daily basis;

Cognizant of the need for the Ajeromi/Ifelodun Federal Constituency to play the role of a good neighbor by accommodating the vehicles and supporting the Federal Government laudable initiative of constructing world Class Park at the port;

Again aware that the roads are not designed and constructed to carry such heavy vehicles as they have been destroyed and are now in terrible state of disrepair as a result of continuous plying and the continued indiscriminate parking of the trailers, tankers and trucks on the roads;

Also notes that the Federal Government had awarded the contract for reconstruction of the major road that links the port for easy access and motoring;

Disturbed that no road among the destroyed by the trailers, tankers and other articulated vehicles was included for the rehabilitation and re-construction.

Also disturbed that Federal Government did not deem it fit to compensate the local government's good gesture for accommodating those heavy vehicles meant for the port by constructing the roads destroyed by the heavy and articulated vehicles;

Concerned that if the roads are left in their state of despair, they will further deteriorate and compound the agony experienced by motorists and other road users in the area.

Resolves to:

- (i) also urge the Federal Government to compensate the Local Government by rehabilitating and re-constructing the affected roads at Kirikiri, Otto Wharf, Mba/Orege Roads, Rashidi Afuwapa and Apere Streets of Ajeromi/Ifelodun Federal Constituency of Lagos State
- (ii) also urge the Federal Ministry of Works and Housing to carry out comprehensive inspection and evaluation of the roads to ascertain the level of disrepair and deterioration with a view to rehabilitating and re - constructing them.

9. Need to Rescue Nanka, Okoh, Awgbu and Isulo Communities of Anambra State from Erosion Disaster:

Hon. Okwudili Ezenwanko.

The House:

Notes that over one thousand (1000) erosion sites have been identified in Anambra State and are located at Ubaha village, Nanka, Umudala village, Nanka (which extends to Okoh Community), Amaugo village, Awgbu, (linking Awgbu and Amaokpala Communities) and Obuluhu village, Isulo;

Aware that erosion disaster in the affected communities has cut off families from their ancestral homes and farmlands, especially the inhabitants of Ubaha and Umudala villages, Nanka, in the process, destroying basic infrastructure necessary for the economic wellbeing of residents of those communities;

Also aware that the erosion site at Amaugo village, Awgbu poses a threat to the newly constructed road linking Amawbia, through Awulu, Awgbu to Amaokpala and the erosion sites in the various communities expand each year, causing continuous topographic depreciation and displacing a great number of members of the affected communities

Concerned that the less privileged persons among those displaced by the erosion now resort to living lives of destitution and in constant fear over who might fall victim of the coming year's erosion disaster;

Also concerned that various government agencies charged with the responsibility of preventing and controlling erosion disasters are not living up to expectations and if urgent measures are not taken to control the erosion disaster, residents of the affected communities will continue to live in constant fear;

Resolves to:

- (i) Urge the Ecological Fund Office to prioritize tackling the erosion disaster in the affected communities;
- (ii) call on the National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) to urgently send relief materials to the victims to mitigate their sufferings;
- (iii) mandate the Committee on Environment to ensure compliance.

**10. Call for Rehabilitation of University College Hospital (UCH), Ibadan Comprehensive Health Centre at Okuku, Osun State:
Hon. Olalekan Rasheed Afolabi:**

The House:

Recalls that University College Hospital (UCH) Ibadan, the Teaching Hospital arm of University of Ibadan was set up in 1948 with the sole objective of training highly versatile professionals to meet the healthcare needs of Nigerians;

Notes that the University College Hospital built and operated two Comprehensive Health Centres, one in Okuku in December 1984 and the other in Sepeteri, in a bid to bring health care delivery to the people at the grass roots level;

Also notes that the centres provide medical, surgical, dental, pediatrics, obstetrics and gynecological services on outpatient and in-patient basis and also provides health awareness outreach services for communities within the geographical coverage of the facilities while also serving as centres for teaching health workers of all cadres and accepting referrals directly from the University College Hospital;

Aware that both Centres, at the time of their establishment, were in the old Oyo State, however while that at Sepeteri is still in Oyo State, the one at Okuku is now in Osun State which was created in August 1991 and is the headquarters of Odo-Otin Local Government Area;

Also aware that Okuku Health Care Centre is centrally located as the local government area has over seventeen towns and several villages and hamlets surrounding it and while it was functioning, the centre provides services for communities in the local government areas in Osun State as well as serving as a major emergency treatment centre for accident victims plying the highway connecting Osun State with Kwara State;

Cognizant that the comprehensive health centre at Okuku occupies an area of 84,735 hectares of land partly fenced and comprising the following:

- (i) A main "hospital" complex;
- (ii) Doctor's residence;
- (iii) Nurses' residence;
- (iv) Students' Hostel;

Concerned that since 2010 the health centre has been in a state of disrepair after it was handed over to Osun State Government on its request to the Hon. Minister of Health with an agreed clause for an upgrade of the centre, which has not been done, leaving the buildings and other structures dilapidated;

Informed that after several years of representation, the Government of Osun State eventually handed back the Health Centre to University College Hospital, Ibadan in 2018;

Observes that several panels of experts in various fields from the University College Hospital, Ibadan had visited the centre in 2012, 2015 and 2019 respectively to assess the extent of disrepair at the centre as a result of its abandonment and concluded that unless the Federal Government provides funds, it will be an uphill task for the University College Hospital (UCH), Ibadan to resuscitate and restore the health centre to its former level;

Cognizant of the need to remove barriers preventing access to health care services and protecting the poor and vulnerable segments of the population from the impoverishing effects of medical expenditures;

Resolves to:

- (i) call on the Federal Ministry of Health to make provisions in the 2020 budget estimates or any supplementary budget for the rehabilitation of University College Hospital(UCH) Ibadan Health Centre at Okuku, Osun State;
- (ii) mandate the Committees on Health Institutions and Health Care Services to ensure compliance and report back within six (6) weeks for further legislative action.

11. Need to Investigate the Allegations of Corruption in the National Universities Commission (NUC) during its Accreditation of Universities:

Hon. Sam Chinedu Onwuaso:

The House:

Notes that the National Universities Commission (NUC) accreditation system has been used, over the years, to maintain and monitor quality and high academic standards in Nigerian Universities and the NUC uses this process to evaluate academic programmes every five years;

Also notes that in the course of carrying out its mandate, the NUC Accreditation Teams undertake on the spot assessment of facilities, lecture halls, quality of academic content, laboratories among others to ensure that the universities meet up with the required standards to run such academic programmes in order to determine whether to revoke, withhold or grant accreditation;

Worried by allegations of intimidation and extortion of huge sums of money from universities in order for their programmes to be accredited;

Also worried that the alleged monetary demands for accreditation may have led to some universities increasing their tuition fees so as to be able to meet up with the demands of the NUC Accreditation teams;

Resolves to:

Mandate the Committee on Tertiary Education and Services to investigate the allegations and report back within six (6) weeks for further legislative action.

12. Need to Harmonise the Issuance and Sale of Emblems and Stickers on Commercial Vehicles throughout the Country:

Hon. Leke Abejide:

The House:

Notes the unregulated sale of emblems and stickers to motorists by government agents who create illegal road-blocks on state roads and federal highways to collect spurious tolls and levies, allegedly for the various tiers of governments and in the process extorting helpless motorists for the private pockets of the agents;

Also notes that the multiple permits, emblems and stickers being imposed on mobile adverts vehicles, company vehicles, commercial vehicles, trucks and other articulated vehicles as local government permits, States permits, National Joint Interstate permits, Regional permits, and so many others are vulnerable to abuse by the agents;

Worried that it has become virtually impossible for motorists to move freely from one local government area to another and from one state to another without meeting road blocks, where they are coerced to pay spurious taxes, levies or tolls that they may have paid to a local government council in another state;

Also worried that touts, claiming to be working for the Association of Local Governments of Nigeria (ALGON) have since joined in erecting road blocks where they generate huge amount of money for their private pockets and in the process, harassing and threatening violence, and on occasions, actually visiting violence on motorists who fail to pay the money;

Concerned that private businesses are suffering as they are being forced to operate under the most unfriendly business climate with the consequences of being held hostage should they refuse to comply;

Cognizant that section 2(2) of the Taxes and Levies Act, Laws of the Federation of Nigeria, 2004, prohibits the mounting of a road block in any part of the Federation for the purposes of collecting any tax or levy by any person, including a Tax Authority;

Acknowledges the need to assist Small and Medium Scale businesses by introducing new, acceptable, one-off and harmonized emblem to be issued across the States and the Federal Capital Territory (FCT), which is to serve as clearance after payment of all road taxes and fees related thereto, which will help curb illegal imposition of levies and fees by unauthorized persons and sanitize the Nigerian tax system;

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the Federal Ministry of Finance, Federal Inland Revenue Service (FIRS) and ALGON to design and ensure a one-off, unified and harmonized emblem and tickets across the States and the FCT, which is to serve as clearance after payment of all road taxes and levies;
- (ii) also urge the Inspector General of Police to arrest and prosecute illegal tax and revenue collectors as well as labour, trade union members, and touts impeding vehicular movements on state roads and federal highways across the country;
- (iii) mandate the Committees on Finance and Police Affairs to ensure implementation.

**13. Proliferation of Military Uniforms:
Hon. Bello Hassan Shinkafi:**

The House:

Aware of the proliferation of military uniforms which give rise to fake military personnel donning such uniforms to perpetrate criminal activities including kidnappings, robbery, cultism and most recently, electoral thuggery and violence;

Also aware that section 110 of the Penal Code forbids anyone, not being a person serving in any such as armed forces of Nigeria, from wearing the uniform or any part of the uniform any part such forces, or any dress having the appearance or bearing any of the regimental or other distinctive marks of such uniforms;

Equally aware that Section 111 of the same Code provides that any person who sells or gives any uniform, or part of a uniform, or any dress, badge or mark, as in Section 110 of this Code to any person who is not authorized to wear the same, is guilty of an offence and is liable to the penalties prescribed in the said section;

Notes that as part of efforts to revive the Cotton, Textile and Garment (CTG) Sector in Nigeria, President Muhammadu Buhari recently issued Executive Order 003 mandating all Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs) and the military impliedly, to source their textiles needs locally;

Concerned that while the recent pronouncement may be a form of boost to the textiles industry there is evidence of unauthorized tailoring outfits involved in the making of military uniforms, thereby contributing to the proliferation of those uniforms which are being made available to unauthorized persons, including criminals and thugs;

Believes that restricting the production of those uniforms to military and para military outfits themselves against the use of random tailors, may serve as a check to the recent incidents of proliferation of those outfits in the society;

Resolves to:

Mandate the Committees on Army, Navy, Air Force, Police Affairs and Interior to liaise with the Nigeria Army, Navy and Air force and other Security Agencies and para military forces towards customizing the making of uniforms for their personal to curb proliferation of those outfits and report back within six (6) weeks for further legislative action.

**14. Call on the Nigerian Immigration Service (NIS) to Commission and make Functional the Passport Office in Oyo Town:
Hon. Adeyemi Akeem Adeniyi:**

The House:

Notes that the Nigerian Immigration Service is the federal agency in charge of immigration processes and cross-border human movement into and out of Nigeria and has its headquarters in the Federal Capital Territory, Abuja, with offices in many other parts of Nigeria as may be necessitated for operational exigencies;

Also notes that around October 2018; the Service completed its office in Oyo Township ready for official commissioning;

Concerned that while the physical office structure is ready, working equipment to make the office functional for full operation is yet to be installed;

Also concerned that despite much entreaties and royal representation to the Comptroller General of the Nigeria Immigration Service, nothing has been done to commission the Office;

Resolves to:

Mandate the Committee on Interior to engage with the Comptroller General of the Nigeria Immigration Service with a view to facilitating the equipping of the Oyo Office of the Nigeria Immigration Service for commissioning and full operations.
