### ANALYSIS OF 2020 APPROPRIATION FOR THE NIGERIA POLICE FORCE

#### 1.0 BACKGROUND

This document provides an overview of the budgetary allocations to the Nigeria Police Force (NPF) for 2020. It highlights the total amount appropriated, amount allocated for overhead costs and capital expenditure. It also highlights some capital projects for the Police in the 2020 budget and other related budget lines. This document further compares police budgets over the last 5 years, including the percentage of police funding within the security budget and national budget during the same period.

This comes against the background of persistent complaints of inadequate funding for the Police over the years, resulting police inefficiency and escalating insecurity in the country. The Nigeria Police is responsible for the prevention and detection of crime, apprehension of offenders, preservation of law and order, and protection of life and property and yet, the amounts budgeted for the execution of its duties still begs the question of whether it is sufficient to cover this enormous task.

The National Assembly attempted to fix this problem in 2019 with the adoption of the Police Trust Fund Act, which established a special intervention fund for training and retraining of personnel of the Nigeria Police Force and for the provision of state of the art security equipment and other related facilities for the Police. The Fund is meant to benefit from a levy of 0.005% on the net profit of companies operating business in Nigeria; 0.5% of the total revenue accruing to the Federation Account; as well as proceeds from grants, aids, gifts, donations, and investment income.

The bill was passed by the National Assembly in April 2019 and signed into law by the President in June 2019, but its commencement remains pending with no Board in place to administer the Fund as at January 2020. Part of the information in this factsheet shows the projected amounts to be transferred to the Fund for the 2020 fiscal year.

At N403 billion, the 2020 budget for the Nigeria Police is the highest it has been allocated in the last 5 years in terms of amount, however the ratio of this amount to the total security budget is lower than it has been in the same period. In specific terms, the 2020 budget of N403 billion is 22.3% of the total security budget while the 2015 police budget of N321 billion was 32.5% of the total security budget. (See the tables and information presented for an analysis of these figures, as well as details of actual releases against budgeted amounts. This is particularly important because incomplete release of funds has been cited by the Police as a major challenge.)

While issues of lack of accountability on use police powers, poor public trust and inadequate oversight remain relevant, the argument on funding remains a perennial one even with a Trust Fund now in place. With the Fund having a 6 year lifespan beginning from the date of commencement of the Act, it is imperative that this issue is adequately addressed before its expiration.

#### 2.0 NPF 2020 BUDGETARY ALLOCATION

#### 2.1 TOTAL BUDGET

The total amount allocated to Police Formations and commands is **N403,709,451,000 (Four** *Hundred and Three Billion, Seven Hundren and Nine Million, Four Hundred and Fifty one Thousand Naira)*. This amount is broken down as follows:

From the figures, recurrent expenditure makes up 96.4% of the budget for police formations and command, while capital expenditure is 3.6%. This percentage is significantly low considering the huge capital investment required to upgrade the facilities and equipment of the Nigeria Police.

#### 2.2 SNAPSHOT OF INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS UNDER THE BUDGET

The bulk of the infrastructure budget for the Police relate to the construction/renovation of barracks, training institutions (including primary and secondary schools, police colleges and institutions), laboratories, equipment, police stations and commands. There are a total of 217 budget lines for capital projects in the budget, of those lines 204 are on-going, 11 are new projects and the status of 2 is unknown. By these numbers, 94% of projects for police formations and commands are on-going while 5% are new projects.



The 2020 budget also include allocations to the Police outside the budget for Police Formations and Commands. See table below for details.


