1. Committee on Appropriations:

Hon. Muktar Betara:

“That the House do receive the Report of the Committee on Appropriations on A Bill for an Act to amend the Appropriation Act, 2020 to authorise the issue from the Consolidated Revenue Fund of the Federation the total sum of ₦10,801,544,664,642 (Ten Trillion, Eight Hundred and One Billion, Five Hundred and Forty - Four Million, Six Hundred and Sixty-Four Thousand, Six Hundred and Forty-Two Naira) only, of which ₦422,775,979,362 (Four Hundred and Twenty-Two Billion, Seven Hundred and Seventy-Five Million, Nine Hundred and Seventy-Nine Thousand, Three Hundred Sixty-Two Naira) only, is for Statutory Transfers, ₦2,951,710,000,000 (Two Trillion, Nine Hundred and Fifty-One Billion, Seven Hundred and Ten Million Naira) only, is for Debt Service, ₦4,938,269,251,934 (Four Trillion, Nine Hundred and Thirty-Eight Billion, Two Hundred and Sixty-Nine Million, Two Hundred and Fifty-One Thousand, Nine Hundred and Thirty-Four Naira) only, is for Recurrent (Non-Debt) Expenditure while the sum of ₦2,488,789,433,344 (Two Trillion, Four Hundred and Eighty-Eight Billion, Seven Hundred and Eighty-Nine Million, Four Hundred and Thirty - Three Thousand, Three Hundred and Forty-Four Naira) only, is for contribution to the Development Fund for Capital Expenditure the year ending 31 December, 2020 (*Referred; 28/5/2020*).

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MOTIONS

5. Rescission of Recommendation (iii) in the Report of the *Ad-hoc* Committee on the \$10 Million (USD) Bribery Allegations Against the House of Representatives:

Hon. Abubakar Hassan Fulata:

The House:

Notes that the Report of the *Ad-hoc* Committee on the \$10 Million (USD) Bribery Allegations against the House of Representatives was adopted on Tuesday, 2 June, 2020;

Aware of additional information available to the House on the subject matter relating to recommendation (iii) as adopted;

Resolves to:

Rescind its decision on recommendations (iii) of the Report to “*Petition the National Judicial Commission (NJC) to investigate Justice Taiwo O. Taiwo and the circumstances surrounding the Order procured by Ikenga and CUPP*” to no longer part of the Report.

6. Need to Address the Ecological Challenges Occasioned by Erosion and Costal Encroachment in Twon Brass, Bayelsa State:

Hon. Israel Sunny-Goli:

The House:

Notes that almost all the communities in Brass/Nembe Constituency of Bayelsa State are coastal communities located on the fringes of the Atlantic Ocean and the River Nun;

Further notes that Twon Brass, the headquarters of Brass Local Government is home to one of the largest onshore crude oil terminal and a livewire of the nation’s economic wellbeing;

Aware that Twon Brass is the host to the Nigerian Agip Oil Company’s crude oil exporting terminal through which over 40 percent of the nation’s crude oil is exported on a daily basis and also host to the proposed \$12billion (dollars) Brass Liquefied Natural Gas plant;

Aware that coastal erosion affects about 60 percent of communities in Brass/Nembe Federal Constituency and is exacerbated by the rising sea levels and activities of oil servicing companies that operate along the waterways;

Concerned that huge landmass on the coastal lines is washed away every year in Twon Brass, this means that in the next 20 years, Twon Brass and other communities may become extinct;

Also concerned that a large swathe of Twon Brass community is being wiped off from the face of the earth leading to migration of many people away from their ancestral homes;

Disturbed that if not unattended to, the situation could lead to tension and inter-communal conflicts between sister communities that have lived together in peace and harmony, over the years;

Worried that critical infrastructures are being submerged along with ancestral homes, places of worship, jetties and other buildings of historical and ancestral symbolism;

Also worried that the Niger Delta Development Commission (NDDC) in December, 2012 pre-qualified Contractors for Construction of Jetty/Shore Protection in Twon Brass but up till this moment nothing has been done;

Further worried that the long and deliberate neglect of these communities by the Niger Delta Development Commission (NDDC) will lead to an inevitable degeneration and deplorable living conditions of the people;

Resolves to:

- (i) mandate the Committee on Niger Delta Development Commission to investigate the current status of the Pre-qualification of Contractors or the award of contract for the Construction of Jetty/Shore Protection in Twon Brass;

- (ii) call on the Niger Delta Development Commission (NDDC) to commence immediate dredging of the Twon Brass coastline to prevent the communities from avoidable extinction.

**7. Need to Come to the Aid of Communities in Buruku Local Government Area of Benue State Ravaged by Rainstorms:
Hon. Kpam Jimin Sokpo:**

The House:

Notes that Buruku is the Headquarters of Buruku Local Government Area in Benue State, located on the bank of River Katsina-Ala with an estimated population of over 300,000 residents was in the late hours of 31 May 2020 ravaged by a heavy rainstorm, destroying hundreds of homes, offices, hospitals, places of worship and business premises;

Further notes that the destroyed homes have remained the only place of comfort for the affected community who have been observing the restrictions and protocols put in place by the Presidential Task Force (PTF) and the Nigerian Centre for Disease Control (NCDC) to curb the spread of the novel Corona Virus (COVID-19) pandemic;

Informed that the affected community is now left at the mercy of adverse and inclement weather as the rains continue to threaten unabated;

Further informed that should such conditions continue without check, the affected communities will be in danger of contracting diseases and illnesses, and may pose a threat to the Government's efforts to stop the spread of COVID-19;

Resolves to:

- (i) Urge National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) to quickly make an assessment of the damage caused by the rainstorm of 31 May 2020 and provide relief materials to the affected families, places of worship and businesses to cushion the effect of the disaster;
- (ii) mandate the Committee on Emergency and Disaster Preparedness to ensure compliance.

BE IT ENACTED by the National Assembly of the Federal Republic of Nigeria as follows: –

1. Issue and Appropriation of ₦ 10,801,544,664,642 from the Consolidated Revenue Fund for 2020

- (i)* The Accountant-General of the Federation shall, when authorised to do so by Warrants signed by the Minister charged with responsibility for finance, pay out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of the Federation during the year ending on the 31st day of December 2020, the sums specified by the warrants, not exceeding in the aggregate ₦10,801,544,664,642 (Ten Trillion, Eight Hundred and One Billion, Five Hundred and Forty - Four Million, Six Hundred and Sixty-Four Thousand, Six Hundred and Forty-Two Naira);
- (ii)* the amount mentioned in subsection (1) of this section shall be appropriated to heads of expenditure as set out in the Schedule to this Act;
- (iii)* no part of the amount aforesaid shall be released from the Consolidated Revenue Fund of the Federation after the end of the year mentioned in subsection (1) of this section.

2. RELEASE OF FUNDS FROM THE CONSOLIDATED REVENUE FUND

All amounts appropriated under this Act shall be released from the Consolidated Revenue Fund of the Federation only for the purpose specified in the Schedule to this Act.

3. VIREMENT

In the event that the implementation of any of the projects intended to be undertaken under this Act cannot be completed without virement, such virement shall only be effected with the prior approval of the National Assembly.

4. CORRIGENDUM

Any error in the schedule to this Act that may hinder the implementation of projects and programs in Ministries, Departments and Agencies may be corrected through a corrigendum issued by the National Assembly: provided that the total sum for the project or program is not affected.

5. EXCESS REVENUE

- (i)* The Accountant-General of the Federation shall immediately upon the coming into force of this Bill maintain a separate record for the documentation of Revenue accruing to the Consolidated Revenue Fund in excess of oil price benchmark adopted in this Budget

- (ii) Such revenues as specified in Sub-section (1) of this section refers to Revenues accruing from sales of government crude oil in excess of the approved benchmark price per barrel, the Petroleum Profit Tax and Royalty on Oil and Gas

6. AUTHORIZATION

- (i) No funds shall be paid out of the monies arising from the record specified in Section 5 (1) except by an Act/approval of the National Assembly;
- (ii) The Accountant-General of the Federation shall forward to the National Assembly full details of funds released to the government Agencies immediately such funds are released.

7. INFORMATION ON FUNDS RELEASES

The Minister of Finance shall ensure that funds appropriated under this Act are released to the appropriate agencies and or organs of government as and when due, provided that no funds for any quarter of the fiscal year shall be deferred without prior waiver from the National Assembly.

8. DUE PROCESS CERTIFICATION

The department of government charged with the responsibility of certifying that due processes have been complied with in the processing of implementation of projects shall ensure that all processes of approval are completed within the specified period as provided for in the Public Procurement Act.

9. INFORMATION ON INTERNALLY GENERATED REVENUE, DOMESTIC AND FOREIGN ASSISTANCE

All Accounting Officers of Ministries, Parastatals and Departments of Government who control heads of expenditures shall upon the coming into effect of this Bill furnish the National Assembly on quarterly basis with detailed information on: -

- (a) the Internally Generated Revenue of the agency in any form; and
- (b) all foreign and domestic assistance received from any agency, person or organisation in any form.

10. POWER OF EFCC/NFIU TO UTILISE 10% OF REVENUE GENERATED FROM PENALTIES AND SANCTIONS

The Economic and Financial Crimes Commission (EFCC) and the Nigerian Financial Intelligent Unit (NFIU) are authorised to change and defray from all monies standing in credit to the units as revenues or penalties or sanctions at 10% for technical setup and operational cost at the units in this financial year.

11. DETAILED ESTIMATE

The detailed estimates of expenditure are set out in the Second Schedule to this Bill.

12. EXPIRY CONSTITUTION, 1999

In line with the provisions of section 318 of the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, this Bill expires after 12 months, starting from 1st day of January to 31st day of December, 2020 when assented to.

13. SHORT TITLE

This Bill may be cited as the Appropriation Act (Amendment) Bill, 2020.
