FIRST VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS

Monday, 21 December, 2020

1. The House met at 11.34 a.m. Mr Speaker read the Prayers.
2. The House recited the National Pledge
3. **Votes and Proceedings**
Mr Speaker announced that he had examined and approved the *Second Votes and Proceedings* of Thursday, 17 December, 2020.

The Votes and Proceedings was adopted by unanimous consent.

4. **Announcement**
Communication from Minister of Finance:
Mr Speaker read a communication from the Minister of Finance, Budget and National Planning, for 2020 Capital Component of the Police Trust Fund budget to be passed by the National Assembly.

The proposed Bill is to be committed to the Committee on Police Affairs for further legislative action.

5. **Matters of Urgent Public Importance (Standing Order Eight, Rule 4)**
 - (i) **Need to Investigate the ₦19.2 Billion Railway Rehabilitation Contract Awarded to Eser Contracting Industry Company Incorporated:**
Hon. Ndudi Godwin Elumelu (*Aniocha North/South/Oshimili North/South Federal Constituency*) introduced the matter and prayed the House to:

(a) consider and approve it as one of urgent public importance; and

(b) suspend Order Eight, Rule 4 (3) to allow debate on it forthwith.

Question that the matter be considered as one of urgent public importance — Agreed to.

Question that the House do suspend Order Eight, Rule 4 (3) to enable it debate the matter forthwith — Agreed to.

Need to Investigate the ₦19.2 Billion Railway Rehabilitation Contract Awarded to Eser Contracting Industry Company Incorporated.

The House:

Notes that Eser Contracting and Industry Company Incorporated was awarded the contract to rehabilitate the 463km Port Harcourt - Makurdi section of the eastern railway line for ₦19.2 billion in March 2011;

Also notes that the railway rehabilitation work was divided into three sections namely, 463km Port Harcourt- Makurdi track, 1016km Makurdi-kuru track and 640km kuru - Maiduguri track and the three sections were awarded to three different companies;

Aware that there are allegations that while carrying out due diligence on Eser contracting and industry company incorporated, it was discovered that the company was not in existence as it was not duly registered with the corporate affairs commission as required by the Procurement Act neither did it have the required tax clearance nor audited statement of account for the preceding three years and therefore had no legal capacity to do business in Nigeria;

Also aware that in the invitation to bid advert for the contract placed in the November-December 2010 edition of the Federal Tenders Journal, the certificate of incorporation was a major requirement listed as one of the criteria needed to bid for the job, but surprisingly the Railway Corporation, the Bureau for Public Procurement and the Presidency, all brushed aside this requirement in the consideration of Eser contracting and industry company incorporated for the job;

Worried that the Bureau for Public Procurement (BPP) which is charged with the responsibilities of preventing fraudulent and unfair procurement as well as applying administrative sanctions where necessary, failed in it's responsibility by issuing a Certificate of No Objection to clear the way for the Railway Corporation to award a job of such magnitude to a company without any legal status, upon which the then Minister of Transportation, Yusuf Suleiman relied on the certificate issued by the BPP to request for approval for the award of the contract from the Federal Executive Council led by President Good luck Jonathan;

Also worried that after the contract was awarded in March 2011, the promoters of Eser Contracting and Industry Company Incorporated, knowing that they have deceitfully gotten the contract devised a way to smoothen the irregularities by registering Eser West Africa Limited in June 2011, three months after the contract had been awarded and the new company continued dealing with present day government officials without any form of questioning on the sudden change of name;

Disturbed that the contract is now considered failed and abandoned and there are allegations that the government have gone far with plans to re-award the job to another company without certainties that anyone will be made accountable for the regulatory failures and corporate fraud that characterized the charade;

Also disturbed that if the consistent abuse of procurement laws and incessant corrupt practices by government agents are not put to check, it will continue to ridicule the fight against corruption as canvassed by Mr President thereby bringing the country to disrepute among sister nations;

Resolves to:

Set-up an *Ad-hoc* Committee to investigate these allegations and report back in four (4) weeks (Ndudi Godwin Elumelu — Aniocha North/South/Oshimili North/South Federal Constituency).

Debate.

Hon. Abdullahi Ibrahim Halims (Ankpa/Omala/Olamaboro Federal Constituency) introduced the matter and prayed the House to:

- (a) consider and approve it as one of urgent public importance; and
- (b) suspend Order Eight, Rule 4 (3) to allow debate on it forthwith.

Question that the matter be considered as one of urgent public importance — Agreed to.

Question that the House do suspend Order Eight, Rule 4 (3) to enable it debate the matter forthwith — Agreed to.

Need for the Federal Government to Release Dedicated/Special Fund for the Immediate Commencement of Local Production of Fire Arms and Ammunition Through the Partnership/Collaboration of Defence Industries Corporation of Nigeria (DICON), Kaduna, National Metallurgical Development Centre (NMDC), Jos for Deployment by the Security Agencies to Combat the Rising Wave of Terrorism and Insecurity in Nigeria:

The House:

Aware that the greatest challenge facing our dear country Nigeria, today is that of terrorism and the rising wave of insecurity in the land! an ugly trend with tremendous negative effects on the socio-economic trajectories of the nation, and calling for the parliament to rise to the occasion through innovative legislative inputs such as this to enable the Executive Arm of Government surmount the daunting challenge;

Also aware that efforts by the government of the Federal Republic of Nigeria to import arms and ammunitions from some western countries have met brick walls, hence this clarion call for the country to look inwards with a view to harnessing our abundant human and material resources to commence full local production of arms and ammunitions to meet our immediate needs as drive to local contents initiative;

Recalls that DICON, Kaduna through the local content initiative produced a military vehicle called Ezeugwu MRAP (mine resistance ambush protected) which was commissioned by Mr President sometimes ago, which is deployed in the battlefield in Borno State with confirmed efficacy and preference given to it by our soldiers compared to the imported version;

Notes that there is already an existing memorandum of understanding (MOU) between the two important agencies of government with the view to achieving this objective;

Also notes that the benefits accruable to our country through this initiative will be enormous and indeed unquantifiable, which include to boost research and promote self-reliance in the local production of armoury, weapons and other military equipment, conservation of foreign exchange, wealth creation and employment opportunities for our teeming youths, aid our security agencies to effectively combat crimes and criminality and many other benefits too numerous to mention;

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the Executive Arm of Government to:
 - (a) dedicate and release the sum of 3 billion Naira for the immediate take off of local production of firearms and ammunition through this partnership;
 - (b) set up a special team of professionals from the two agencies of government involved in the proposed partnership for the immediate take-off of the pilot project with the mandate to start production within one year;
- (iii) mandate the Committee on Defence to coordinate the agencies of government involved; and
- (iv) also mandate the Committee on Legislative Compliance to ensure compliance (*Hon. Abdullahi Ibrahim Ali — Ankpa/Omala/Olamaboro Federal Constituency*).

Debate.

Need to Verify Capital Projects Executed and Funds Repeated in Appropriation Acts From 2015 Till Date by Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs) of Government Across the Nation:

The House:

Notes that from inception of the present administration, monies were appropriated, for execution of key projects across the federation;

Also notes that some of the projects that monies were appropriated for, and releases made for execution have been repeated and duplicated in subsequent Budgets;

Concerned that MDAs keep repeating the same projects in their budgets even when funds for the execution of such projects have been released to them in previous budgets;

Also concerned that some of the MDAs do not return the unutilized funds to the Federation Account after the expiration of the Appropriation Act;

Resolves to:

Constitute an *Ad-hoc* Committee to verify and provide detailed report of all projects repeated in the Budgets from 2015 till date, funds released and repeated in subsequent Budgets; and report back within four (4) months (*Hon. Yusuf Adamu Gagdi — Kanke/Paskshin/Kanam Federal Constituency*).

(iv) **Arbitrary Increase in Transportation Fares During Festive Periods, Particularly Land Transport:**

Hon. Chinedu Emeka Martins (*Ahiazu/Ezeinihite Federal Constituency*) introduced the matter and prayed the House to:

- (a) consider and approve it as one of urgent public importance; and
- (b) suspend Order Eight, Rule 4 (3) to allow debate on it forthwith.

Question that the matter be considered as one of urgent public importance — Agreed to.

Question that the House do suspend Order Eight, Rule 4 (3) to enable it debate the matter forthwith — Agreed to.

Arbitrary Increase in Transportation Fares During Festive Periods, Particularly Land Transport:

The House:

Notes that the recent arbitrary hike in transport fares across the country, is becoming a tradition, with the most recent, where the obnoxious increment is hitting land transportation, thereby, compounding the hardship situation across the board, as the Yuletide draws near;

Also notes that the development is not far from what is obtainable in land transport, where commuters are decrying that the arbitrary hike in fares in some cases had reached almost 100 per cent, barely few days to Christmas and more as the days go by, a situation that is also viewed to be worsening the economic situation in the country;

Aware that the Yuletide is associated with lots of travelling, as the longest holiday season, which triggers a proportionate movement of people from one destination to the other, hence the understanding of the economic implications that snowballs to a marginal increase in fares due to forces of demand on the existing supply chain;

Also aware that such obnoxiously arbitrary increase, sometimes had nothing to do with the economic indices or the reality on ground, but a by-product of the greedy discretion of the Park managers, who decide the price depending on turnout of the day which is 'nothing short of gross insensitivity, occasioning economic sabotage;

Concerned that the trend is not only becoming too dangerous, but a total set back on the country's recuperating economy, especially when factors like the demons of unusual fuel scarcity that formally triggers hike in fares had been taken care of by the Government through the recent deregulation of the downstream sector of the Oil and Gas industry;

Also concerned that the unbaiting increase in fares during the Yuletide is becoming too traditional, thereby questioning the place of Government in such obviously inconsiderate moves, that has brought into focus the worst sides of humanity that does not care about the effect of arbitrariness that often leave many of the citizenry in untold hardship with the corresponding hunger or starvation, and in some cases, stranded;

Further concerned that well-meaning Nigerians are already viewing the situation as a gross exhibition of greed and monumental corruption on the part of the transporters who capitalize on the rush and harsh realities, to exploit and rip the people off their hard earned money that invariable put a question mark on the Country's drive for Fight Against Corruption;

Observes that some factors responsible for the ugly development are insufficient /inadequate attention to relevant sectors by relevant Government agencies, poor supervision as a result of lack of concern about the plight of the people across the board, insatiable crave for money at the detriment of others and so on;

Cognizant that the mission of the Federal Ministry of Transport is not only to perform the state management of Road, Rail, Inland Waterways, Sea and Air Transport, nationwide, but of the public service according to law, which is partly to regulate its application by the operators as it would be favorable to the entire citizenry;

Believes that it is the duty of Government to be alert to its responsibilities of monitoring such important sectors with the view to slap fines on any act of irresponsibility in the form of extortion or sabotage, or at best, embark on implementation of policies that may be aimed at breaking the chain of monopolistic tendencies of some of the greedy operators, as the Government cannot afford to watch from the sideline, while some greedy businessmen continue to engage in obnoxious exploitations that is targeted at ripping off the common man, whose only sin is the desire to travel home, in order to unite with family members as well as take care of some nagging family concerns;

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the Ministry of Transport, to put modalities in place to monitor the activities of Transport operators across the country, especially during the Yuletide, in order to curtail the obnoxious hike in fares, which must go with stipulated sanctions on erring operators, as deterrence to others;
- (ii) mandate the Committee on Transport to interface with relevant agencies in ensuring that such seasonal arbitrariness comes to an end (*Hon. Chinedu Emeka Martins — Ahiazu/Ezinihitte/Mbaise Federal Constituency*).

- (v) *Need to Investigate the Dredging Activities of Dangote Refinery and Lekki Port LFTZ Enterprises Limited in the Coastal Fishing Communities of Ibeju-Lekki, Lagos State:*
Hon. Balogun Adebayo Olusegun (*Ibeju-Lekki Federal Constituency*) introduced the matter and prayed the House to:
 - (a) consider and approve it as one of urgent public importance; and
 - (b) suspend Order Eight, Rule 4 (3) to allow debate on it forthwith.

Question that the matter be considered as one of urgent public importance — Agreed to.

Question that the House do suspend Order Eight, Rule 4 (3) to enable it debate the matter forthwith — Agreed to.

Need to Investigate the Dredging Activities of Dangote Refinery and Lekki Port LFTZ Enterprises Limited in the Coastal Fishing Communities of Ibeju Lekki, Lagos State;

The House:

Notes that Ibeju Lekki Local Government is the fastest growing economic hub of Nigeria due largely to the establishment of the Lekki Free Trade Zone, Lekki Deep Sea Port and the siting of Dangote Refinery and Dangote Greenfield Port and Quays;

Aware that Dangote Group and Lekki Port LFTZ have engaged in unprecedented dredging of the sea causing unquantifiable erosion of the seashore leading to destruction of building and fishing equipment and also making fishing almost impossible. This wanton dredging of the ocean has distorted the coastal ecosystem leading to massive loss of land, destruction of access roads and trees of economic value;

Also notes that communities like Iye, Idotun, Idasho, Okunraye, Lekki, Oshoroko and environs are seriously under threat of extinction if nothing is urgently done;

Informed that the Association of Fishing and Fishing Related Persons on behalf of the affected communities has written letters to the management of Dangote Group and the Lekki Free Trade Zone on the environmental danger of their dredging activities without any response;

Also informed that the Association has also written to the Federal Ministry of Environment, Federal Ministry of Petroleum Resources, Nigerian Maritime Administration and Safety Agency (NIMASA) and the Department for Petroleum Resources (DPR) to intervene in the issue and save their environment and source of livelihood;

Concerned that none of these Agencies of Government responded to their cry with the exception of the Department for Petroleum Resources (DPR) that sent a letter and pleaded with the fishing Communities to remain law abiding while they look into the issue;

Worried that the Association of Fishing and Fishing Related Persons and communities along the coast line of Ibeju Lekki Local Government have lost confidence in the system and are willing and ready to engage in self-help to protect their communities and source of livelihood sooner than imagined;

Also worried that if urgent steps are not taking to address this issue we may experience breakdown of law and order which may lead to wanton destruction of material and human resources as recently experienced during the EndSars protest;

Resolves to:

Mandate the Committee on Environment to visit the communities for an on the spot assessment of the situation and report back within four (4) weeks (*Hon. Adebayo Olusegun Balogun — Ibeju-Lekki Federal Constituency*).

(vi) **Need to Avert Further Loss of Lives Resulting from Boundary Crisis in Gunjuwa Local Government Area, Bauchi State and Dukku Local Government Area, Gombe State:**
Hon. Mansur Manu Soro (*Darazo/Ganjuwa Federal Constituency*) introduced the matter and prayed the House to:

- (a) consider and approve it as one of urgent public importance; and
- (b) suspend Order Eight, Rule 4 (3) to allow debate on it forthwith.

Question that the matter be considered as one of urgent public importance — Agreed to.

Question that the House do suspend Order Eight, Rule 4 (3) to enable it debate the matter forthwith — Agreed to.

Need to Avert Further Loss of Lives Resulting from Boundary Crisis in Gunjuwa Local Government Area, Bauchi State and Dukku Local Government Area, Gombe State:

The House:

Notes that two weeks ago, a violent clash occurred between the neighbouring communities of Buri-Buri in Gungura heart of Gunjuwa Local Government Area, Bauchi State and Dukku Local Government Area, Gombe State, and resulted in the death of 4 (four) persons;

Also notes that the conflicts was as a result of ownership tussle over a water body that lies between the two communities;

Concerned that if urgent measures are not put in place, more clash would occur, which could lead to the killing of more people;

Resolves to:

- (i) call on the National Boundary Commission to intervene and demarcate the boundary;
- (ii) call on the Federal Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Development to immediately move and construct an earth Dam for irrigation purposes in Buri-Buri village, Ganjuwa Local Government Area;
- (iii) urge the affected States of Bauchi and Gombe to embark on sensitization campaign and peace building process in the affected communities;
- (iv) urge the Gombe and Bauchi State Governments to compensate the victims in the two communities; and
- (v) mandate Committee on Special Duties to ensure compliance (*Hon. Mansur Manu Soro — Darazo/Ganjuwa Federal Constituency*).

Debate.

6. **Need to Investigate the Governing Lease of Federal Government-Owned Assets**
Motion made and Question proposed:

The House:

Notes the need to plug leakages and enhance government revenue;

Aware of the increasing dwindling revenues generation from oil, that the Federal Government of Nigeria is planning to sell off some of its assets and concession other assets to enable it raise funds for budget implementation;

Worried that issues bothering on lease of Federal Government assets may be compromised where there is no oversight;

Convinced that there is an urgent need to review all leases of Federal Government assets with a view to expunging all sale provisions and enacting new ones in line with the current state of affairs to be determined by the market forces;

Also convinced that this exercise would help the Federal Government recover lost revenues in the hands of few individuals reaping of the system;

Resolves to:

Set up an *Ad-hoc* Committee to review all related leasing and concession of Federal Government assets and report back within six (6) weeks (*Hon. Toby Okechukwu — Aninri/Awgu/Oji River Federal Constituency*).

Debate resumed.

By leave of the House, the Chairman, Committee on Rules and Business, briefed the House that the mandate of the Ad-hoc Committee to investigate Abandoned Federal Government Properties across the Federation, and that of the Committee on the Need to Investigate the Governing Lease of Federal Government-Owned Assets differ, the House could therefore go ahead to set up a new Ad-hoc Committee to investigate the matter, as requested for in the motion.

Motion made and Question proposed, "That the House do receive the Report of the Committee on Appropriations on a Bill for an Act to authorise the issue from the Consolidated Revenue Fund of the Federation the total sum of ₦13,588,027,886,175 (Thirteen Trillion, Five Hundred and Eighty-Eight Billion, Twenty-Seven Million, Eight Hundred and Eighty-Six Thousand, One Hundred and Seventy-Five Naira) only, of which ₦496,528,471,273 (Four Hundred and Ninety-Six Billion, Five Hundred and Twenty-Eight Million, Four Hundred and Seventy-One Thousand, Two Hundred and Seventy-Three Naira) only, is for Statutory Transfers, ₦3,324,380,000,000 (Three Trillion, Three Hundred and Twenty-Four Billion, Three Hundred and Eighty Million Naira) only, is for Debt Service, ₦5,641,970,060,680 (Five Trillion, Six Hundred and Forty-One Billion, Nine Hundred and Seventy Million, Sixty Thousand, Six Hundred and Eighty Naira) only, is for Recurrent (Non-Debt) Expenditure while the sum of ₦4,125,149,354,222 (Four Trillion, One Hundred and Twenty-Five Billion, One Hundred and Forty-Nine Million, Three Hundred and Fifty-Four Thousand, Two Hundred and Twenty-Two Naira) only, is for contribution to the Development Fund for Capital Expenditure for the year ending 31 December, 2021 (HB.1069)" (Hon. 8. **Amendment of the Standing Orders of the House of Representatives**

The House:

Notes that the Standing Orders of the House was, at the inception of the 9th House of Representatives, reviewed and additional Committees were created to position the House to carry out oversight of Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs) effectively;

Also notes that in the course of its operations, the need had arisen to create additional Committees in order for the House to discharge its Constitutional mandates;

Further notes the need for the provisions of the Standing Orders to be in conformity with extant laws regulating Legislative Houses;

Resolves to:

Amend the Standing Orders as follows:

- (a) Order One (1) *insert* the words "to be" before the word "conducted" in the shoulder note;
- (b) Order Two, Rule 1 (3) *delete* the comma after the words "Clerk to the National Assembly" and *insert* instead "and where not available the";
- (c) Order Six, Rule 1 (3) *insert* the words "or the Standing Orders of the House" immediately after the year "2017" therein;
- (d) (i) Order Eight, Rule 4 (2), *insert* the words "and not addressed immediately" after the words "to persist",
- (ii) introduce new Sub Rule 4 (5) thus: "(5) Any other matter shall be on notice only";

- (ii) The amount mentioned in subclause (i) of this section shall be appropriated to heads of expenditure as set out in the Schedule to this Bill.
- (iii) No part of the amount aforesaid shall be released from the Consolidated Revenue Fund of the Federation after the end of the year mentioned in subclause (i) of this section.

Committee Recommendation:

That the provisions in Clause 1 be retained (*Hon. Muktar Betara Aliyu — Biu/Bayo/Shani/Kwaya Kusar Federal Constituency*).

Question that Clause 1 stands part of the Bill — Agreed to.

Clause 2: Release of Funds from the Consolidated Revenue Fund.

All amounts appropriated under this Bill shall be released from the Consolidated Revenue Fund of the Federation only for the purpose specified in the Schedule to this Bill.

Committee Recommendation:

That the provision in Clause 2 be retained (*Hon. Muktar Betara Aliyu — Biu/Bayo/Shani/Kwaya Kusar Federal Constituency*).

Question that Clause 2 stands part of the Bill — Agreed to.

Clause 3: Virement.

In the event that the implementation of any of the projects intended to be undertaken under this Bill cannot be completed without virement, such virement shall only be effected with the prior approval of the National Assembly.

Committee Recommendation:

That the provision in Clause 3 be retained (*Hon. Muktar Betara Aliyu — Biu/Bayo/Shani/Kwaya Kusar Federal Constituency*).

Question that Clause 3 stands part of the Bill — Agreed to.

Clause 4: Corrigendum.

Any error in the Schedule to this Bill that may hinder the implementation of projects and programs in Ministries, Departments and Agencies may be corrected through a corrigendum issued by the National Assembly: provided that the total sum for the project or program is not affected.

Committee Recommendation:

That the provision in Clause 1 be retained (*Hon. Muktar Betara Aliyu — Biu/Bayo/Shani/Kwaya Kusar Federal Constituency*).

Question that Clause 4 stands part of the Bill — Agreed to.

Clause 5: Excess Revenue.

- (i) The Accountant-General of the Federation shall immediately upon the coming into force of this Bill maintain a separate record for the documentation of Revenue accruing to the Consolidated Revenue Fund in excess of oil price benchmark adopted in this Budget
- (ii) Such revenues as specified in Subclause (i) of this section refers to Revenues accruing from sales of government crude oil in excess of the approved benchmark price per barrel, the Petroleum Profit Tax and Royalty on Oil and Gas.

Committee Recommendation:

That the provisions in Clause 5 be retained (*Hon. Muktar Betara Allyu — Biu/Bayo/Shani/Kwaya Kusar Federal Constituency*).

Question that Clause 5 stands part of the Bill — Agreed to.

Clause 6: Authorization.

- (i) No funds shall be paid out of the monies arising from the record specified in Section 5 (1) except by an Act/approval of the National Assembly.
- (ii) The Accountant-General of the Federation shall forward to the National Assembly full details of funds released to the government Agencies immediately such funds are released.

Committee Recommendation:

That the provisions in Clause 6 be retained (*Hon. Muktar Betara Aliyu — Biu/Bayo/Shani/Kwaya Kusar Federal Constituency*).

Question that Clause 6 stands part of the Bill — Agreed to.

Clause 7: Information on Funds Releases.

The Minister of Finance shall ensure that funds appropriated under this Bill are released to the appropriate agencies and or organs of government as and when due, provided that no funds for any quarter of the fiscal year shall be deferred without prior waiver from the National Assembly.

Committee Recommendation:

That the provision in Clause 7 be retained (*Hon. Muktar Betara Aliyu — Biu/Bayo/Shani/Kwaya Kusar Federal Constituency*).

Question that Clause 7 stands part of the Bill — Agreed to.

Clause 8: Due Process Certification.

The department of government charged with the responsibility of certifying that due processes have been complied with in the processing of implementation of projects shall ensure that all processes of approval are completed within the specified period as provided for in the Public Procurement Act.

Committee Recommendation:

That the provision in Clause 8 be retained (*Hon. Muktar Betara Aliyu — Biu/Bayo/Shani/Kwaya Kusar Federal Constituency*).

Question that Clause 8 stands part of the Bill — Agreed to.

Clause 9: Information on Internally Generated Revenue, Domestic and Foreign Assistance.

All Accounting Officers of Ministries, Parastatals and Departments of Government who control heads of expenditures shall upon the coming into effect of this Bill furnish the National Assembly on quarterly basis with detailed information on —

- (a) the Internally Generated Revenue of the agency in any form; and
- (b) all foreign and domestic assistance received from any agency, person or organization in any form.

Committee Recommendation:

That the provisions in Clause 9 be retained (*Hon. Muktar Betara Aliyu — Biu/Bayo/Shani/Kwaya Kusar Federal Constituency*).

Question that Clause 9 stands part of the Bill — Agreed to.

Clause 10: Power of EFCC/NFIU to Utilise 10% of Revenue Generated from Penalties and Sanctions.

The Economic and Financial Crimes Commission (EFCC) and the Nigerian Financial Intelligent Unit (NFIU) are authorized to change and defray from all monies standing in credit to the units as revenues or penalties or sanctions at 10% for technical setup and operational cost at the units in this financial year.

Committee Recommendation:

That the provision in Clause 10 be retained (*Hon. Muktar Betara Aliyu — Biu/Bayo/Shani/Kwaya Kusr Federal Constituency*).

Question that Clause 10 stands part of the Bill — Agreed to.

Clause 11: Detailed Estimate.

The detailed estimates of expenditure are set out in the Second Schedule to this Bill.

Committee Recommendation:

That the provision in Clause 11 be retained (*Hon. Muktar Betara Aliyu — Biu/Bayo/Shani/Kwaya Kusr Federal Constituency*).

Question that Clause 11 stands part of the Bill — Agreed to.

Clause 12: Expiry Constitution, 1999.

In line with the provisions of section 318 of the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, this Bill expires after 12 months, starting from 1 day of January to 31 day of December, 2021 when assented to.

12. Remarks by Mr Speaker

Mr Speaker made the following remarks:

Protocols:

Good morning honourable colleagues. Thank you for being here this morning.

2. *Over the last two months, we have been occupied primarily with our efforts to complete our work on the 2021 Appropriation Bill in time to ensure the budget becomes law before the end of this year. We have worked with the Federal Government's Ministries, Departments, and Agencies to set priorities.*
3. *We reached out to stakeholders and citizen groups. We liaised with constituents to understand their expectations and reflect those expectations in our consideration of the Appropriation Bill.*
4. *I am glad to report that these efforts have been worthwhile. Today, we have passed the budget in the House of Representatives in good time to maintain the January to December budget cycle in line with the commitments we made when we resumed office.*
5. *The January to December budget cycle is necessary to ensure effective implementation of our annual budgets to meet our nation's development challenges. By our joint efforts and the grace of God, we will maintain this standard for every year we are in office, and leave a legacy for our successors to aspire to.*
6. *When we resumed in January of this year, the coronavirus was a novel development, still confined for the most part to China. We did not know that our economy will be upended in a few months, and our lives disrupted by a pandemic we did not anticipate and were not prepared for.*

7. *We did not foresee a world where citizens would be confined to their homes for months, unable to earn a living, denied the freedom to live full lives in the company of friends and colleagues, family and loved ones. Yet when the moment came, we did not shrink from it.*
8. *Within the limits of our brutal realities, with our options limited by a scarcity of resources, by dilapidated infrastructure and outdated laws, we acted to slow the spread of disease, to treat the sick, comfort the afflicted and provide for the most vulnerable of our nation's citizens.*
9. *The truth is, we have done better than many believed was possible, better than many nations, even the most advanced. Our economy has taken a big hit, but through partnership with the private sector, government has been able to prevent the nightmare scenarios that some predicted.*
10. *Members of the House, together and individually, made financial contributions to support welfare provisions for citizens. There is virtually no constituency in the country that did not feel the impact of efforts by their representatives. I commend you all, and I thank you most sincerely.*
11. *In an unprecedented single-day session, we passed the Emergency Economic Stimulus Bill to provide targeted economic relief in response to the emerging threat. We did this before the coronavirus breached our borders because we anticipated and sought to prevent the worst possible outcomes.*
12. *That legislation never became law. Yet the Bill's specific objectives have been implemented through executive action to defer mortgages, remove duties on medical imports, provide salary relief and related financial support for Small and Medium Scale Enterprises in the country.*
13. *Despite an extraordinary torrent of misinformation and political mischief, the House moved forward with landmark legislation to reform our nation's obsolete statutory framework for preventing and managing infectious diseases and pandemics so that we can be better prepared for the next time.*
14. *We worked with the Executive to address medical doctors and healthcare workers' welfare demands and resolve a labour dispute that would have resulted in strike actions and walkouts with devastating consequences for too many of our citizens, amid a raging and deadly pandemic.*
15. *Because of the House of Representatives, "Hazard Allowance" became part of the medical and pandemic lexicon. The intervention by the House elevated the welfare of healthcare workers to a ministerial issue and saw to it that these hazard allowances were provided for and paid.*
16. *We convened a Conference of Speakers of African Parliaments in a broad collaboration to renegotiate the terms of our national debts, and free up much-needed resources for development, whilst committing to a new regime of responsible administration of public resources.*
17. *We recognised that governance in a time of uncertainty required us to change the way we conduct legislative business. So, we reviewed and updated our Legislative Agenda to focus on critical priorities. And for the first time, we appointed a Committee to drive Monitoring and Implementation of our Agenda.*
18. *Notwithstanding these efforts, we cannot escape the hard truth that this has been a tough year of suffering for too many citizens, a year like none before it. If we learned nothing else, we learned that we have a limited window to address problems that have been a long time in the making.*
19. *This year we have seen that the structural inadequacies of our economy and healthcare systems, our internal security and justice architecture, have left us dangerously exposed to the risk of a complete and irreversible loss of faith in the Nigerian project by a large section of our citizenry.*

20. *Despite spirited government efforts, our economy is still overly reliant on the sale of crude oil. Vast swathes of potential in tourism and agriculture, manufacturing and technology, media and entertainment remain untapped due to insecurity, infrastructure deficits, policy and regulatory inconsistency.*
21. *The risks we face are not abstract. In the aftermath of the EndSars protests, we saw it in the flames that engulfed our cities. We saw it two weeks ago in Zambamari with the massacre of citizens farming for survival, and most recently in the abduction of young boys seeking to improve their lives through education in Kankara.*
22. *We commend the efforts of the security agencies, who working together, have secured the release of the Kankara boys and ensured their safe return to their families. We must recognise the evolving nature of the risks we face from insurgency and banditry and be prepared to adapt our efforts to overcome this danger.*
23. *The 9th House of Representatives will continue to address the security challenges that threaten our country. We have initiated and will continue efforts to reform the statutory framework for police accountability through the Police Service Commission (Reform) Bill, which has passed second reading.*
24. *We will continue to exercise our constitutional powers of oversight to demand more from the military and security services. Even as we make sure to provide the resources they need to train, equip and provide for the welfare of the men and women who bear arms on our nation's behalf and in our name.*
25. *The responsibility of undoing the damage of many years has fallen to us. We have a lot of work to do. We are each called to lead our nation toward the promised land, to restore the dignity of every man, woman and child who swears allegiance to our constitution and salutes our nation's flag.*
26. *We will improve Nigeria by building infrastructure that provides jobs, by protecting our people's lives and property, and repairing the relationship between citizens and the state. This is what we must do to restore faith in Nigeria's promise and prevent the risk of a destructive renegotiation of our nationhood.*
27. *Honourable colleagues, I do not speak to you today from a place of despair. I come to you with an abundance of hope and an unshakeable belief in the triumphant spirit of our nation. We are God's people - a country of diverse cultures united by our incomparable ability to bloom and thrive despite adversity.*
28. *If we determine not to be consumed by our differences, if we will come together in love and strength and faith to seek the common good, it won't be long before we attain and leave for our children the inheritance of a prosperous nation where peace and justice reign for all. This is the goal to which we must remain committed.*
29. *I want to at this time especially commend once more, the health workers doctors, nurses, laboratory technicians, care providers and all those who have every day of this year, led the fight against an unseen, yet deadly enemy in COVID-19. We recognise their commitment and honour their sacrifice.*
30. *I pay tribute to the men and women who bear arms in our name, who stand in the gap, risking their lives in our defence. Let us all carry in our hearts the memory of those who have paid the highest price in blood, in defence of our constitution and our democracy. May God bless and keep them all forever.*

31. *I remember also the ones we lost this year, our dearly beloved colleagues, friends, and family who reached for the heavens and touched the hand of God. We mourn them still but find comfort in the memory of their lives and the assurance of their peaceful repose.*

32. *The recent uptick in positive cases of Covid-19, is a clear and present danger that will only be defeated by strict adherence to the guidelines on masks, social distancing and personal hygiene. Please take this seriously. We are not out of the woods yet, and we cannot afford to act as if we are.*

33. *Honourable colleagues, I thank you all for your service this year in the House of Representatives. Our work is not nearly done. I urge you to use this recess opportunity to each give account of your service to the people whose hopes and dreams you represent in this honourable Chamber.*

34. *I encourage you to subject yourselves to their judgment and criticism. Accept their observations and encouragements so that when we return, we will work hard, work well, and work together to achieve the common goals of a peaceful nation, united in our shared prosperity.*

35. *I wish you all a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.*

36. *God bless you, and God bless our Federal Republic of Nigeria.*
