3. **Votes and Proceedings**

Mr Deputy Speaker read a communication from Hon. Herman Hembe (*Konshisha/Vandeikya Federal Constituency*) announcing his defection from the All Progressives Grand Alliance (APGA) to the All Progressives Congress (APC).
 - (ii) **Bereavement:**
Mr Deputy Speaker read a communication from Hon. Jiba Yohanna Micah (*Abuja Municipa/Bwari Federal Constituency*), announcing the demise of his wife, Mrs Christiana Jiba Micha on Friday, 4 December, 2020 after a brief illness.

A minute silence was observed in honour of the deceased.

6. **Matters of Urgent Public Importance (Standing Order Eight, Rule 4)**
- (i) ***Need to Suspend the Proposed Recapitalization of Insurance Companies, Insurance Intermediator and Other Players in the Insurance Sector, especially in View of the COVID-19 Pandemic and the Economic Recession:***
Hon. Benjamin Okezie Kalu (Bende Federal Constituency and 15 others) introduced the matter and prayed the House to:
- (a) consider and approve the matter as one of urgent public importance; and
 - (b) suspend Order Eight, Rule 4 (3) to allow debate on the matter forthwith.

Question that the matter be considered as one of urgent public importance — Agreed to.

Question that the House do suspend Order Eight, Rule 4 (3) to enable it debate the matter forthwith — Agreed to.

Need to Suspend the Proposed Recapitalisation of Insurance Companies, Insurance Intermediaries and Other Players in the Insurance Sector in View of the COVID-19 Pandemic and the Economic Recession:

The House:

Notes that the National Insurance Commission Act 1997 established the National Commission (NAICOM) as the primary regulator for the insurance sector;

Also notes that section 9 (1) and (4) of the Act empowers the NAICOM to prescribe the minimum paid-up share capital for insurance companies and intermediaries;

Recalls that the NAICOM vide circular No. NAICOM/DPR/CIR/25/2019 dated 20 May, 2019 effectively increased the minimum paid-up share capital for insurance and re-insurance companies for both new and existing companies effective from 31st December 2020 as follows:

Life insurance ₦2 billion to ₦8 billion,

General ₦3 billion to ₦10 billion,

Composite ₦5 billion to ₦18 billion,

Reinsurance ₦10 billion to ₦20 billion,

Aware that as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, the NAICOM vide another circular NAICOM DPR/CIR/25-04/2020 dated 3 June, 2020, the NAICOM introduced a two phased recapitalization programs of 50% and 60% minimum paid-up share capitals for insurance companies and re-insurance companies respectively, to be met by 31st December, 2020 with compliance deadline of 30 September, 2021.

Worried that in addition to the negative economic impact of the COVID-19 pandemic is also the official announcements that Nigeria is facing another economic recession with severe liquidity squeeze in both government and private sectors;

Conscious of the need for the Government through the regulators push more liquidity into the economy to stimulate economic activities, encourage spending, prevent job loss and support indigenous businesses, especially against the backdrop of the recent ENDSARS protest which has left insurance companies with tons of liabilities;

Also conscious of similar fiscal, monetary and regulatory policies adopted by most countries in the advent of recent economic realities to avert recapitalization and its negative impact on the fragile economy and insurance sector;

Regrets that the proposed program by the NAICOM will negatively impact the Nigeria economy and slow down the recovery process;

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the National Insurance Commission (NAICOM) to suspend the planned 31 December, 2020 mandatory deadline for the first phase of 50% - 60% of the minimum paid up share capital for insurance and reinsurance companies for a minimum of six months from January 2021 to cushion the effects of COVID-19 and other unforeseen circumstances on the insurance industry, and
- (ii) mandate the Committee on Insurance and Actuarial Matters to ensure compliance (Hon. Benjamin Okezie Kalu — Bende Federal Constituency and Fifteen Others).

Debate.

Agreed to.

Conscious of the need for the Government through the regulators push more liquidity into the economy to stimulate economic activities, encourage spending, prevent job loss and support indigenous businesses, especially against the backdrop of the recent ENDSARS protest which has left insurance companies with tons of liabilities;

Also conscious of similar fiscal, monetary and regulatory policies adopted by most countries in the advent of recent economic realities to avert recapitalization and its negative impact on the fragile economy and insurance sector;

Regretted that the proposed program by the NAICOM will negatively impact the Nigeria economy and slow down the recovery process;

Resolved to:

(i) urge the National Insurance Commission (NAICOM) to suspend the planned 31 December, 2020 mandatory deadline for the first phase of 50% - 60% of the minimum paid up share capital for insurance and reinsurance companies for a minimum of six months from January 2021 to cushion the effects of COVID-19 and other unforeseen circumstances on the insurance industry; and

(ii) mandate the Committee on Insurance and Actuarial Matters to ensure compliance (HR. 77/12/2020).

Also notes that a problem once identified is on the way of being solved. Therefore, it is only solved when positive and right actions are taken. One of such actions is the awareness of the problem with appropriate diagnosis. The awareness targets all stakeholders to have an inclusive and encompassing approach to resolution of the issues;

Aware that the solutions to the problem of building collapse and urban infrastructural failures in Nigeria include but not limited to adhering to, the standard construction procedures, engaging the relevant stakeholders in the building industry from both private and public sectors that can join hands in the crusade against shoddy workmanship, and advocate for standard construction;

Also aware that the Nigerian Institute of Building (NIOB) is leading the crusade among the relevant stakeholders, and the Institute is interested in promoting public safety in the development and maintenance of buildings in Nigeria;

Disturbed that the Nigerian Institute of Building (NIOB) has set March 13th of every year as the Builders' Day to remember the victims of the tragic incident of the five-storey building that collapsed on March 17, 2019, at No. 63, Massey Street in Lagos Island of Lagos State, leading to the death of over 20 people, who were mostly school children;

Cognizant that a renowned Legal Practitioner and Human Rights Activist, Mr Femi Falana (SAN) during the grand finale rally of the 2020 Builders' Day at Ndubuisi Kanu Park, Alausa, Lagos State in March 2020, offered to provide legal services to prosecute building collapse offenders in Nigeria;

Convinced that this hallowed chamber could give legislative support to the setting aside 13th March every year for the Commemoration of the Builder's Day in Nigeria, as this would raise national consciousness about construction of the buildings that will be in conformity with international best standard, thereby projecting our nation in good light in the comity of nations;

Resolves to:

- (i) mandate the Committees on Urban Development and Regional Planning, Housing, and Works to organise a Stakeholders meeting with relevant regulatory bodies and stakeholders in the building sector with the aim of finding a lasting solution to the menace of building collapse in Nigeria;
- (ii) urge the Federal Ministry of Works and Housing to work alongside the Nigerian Institute of Building (NIOB) and other regulatory bodies in the building industry in Nigeria with the purpose of solving the recurring problem of building collapse in the country (*Hon. Jimoh Abdulraheem Olajide — Lagos Mainland Federal Constituency*).

(iii) *Need to Rescue the People of Ayetoro Community in Ilaje Local Government Area (LGA), Ondo State from Perennial and Renewed Vigor of Sea Incursion in the Community:*
Hon. Kolade Victor Akinjo (Ilaje/Ese-Odo Federal Constituency) introduced the matter and prayed the House to:

- (a) consider and approve the matter as one of urgent public importance; and
- (b) suspend Order Eight, Rule 4 (3) to allow debate on the matter forthwith.

Question that the matter be considered as one of urgent public importance — Agreed to.

Question that the House do suspend Order Eight, Rule 4 (3) to enable it debate the matter forthwith — Agreed to.

Need to Rescue the People of Ayetoro Community in Ilaje Local Government Area (LGA), Ondo State from Perennial and Renewed Vigor of Sea Incursion in the Community:

The House:

Notes that Ayetoro Community, as part of the coastal oil-producing communities of Ilaje/Ese-Odo Federal Constituency of Ondo State in the last fifteen (15) years has been grappling with tempestuous oceanic surge which has incessantly led to the loss of many lives and destruction of properties in the region;

Also notes that Ayetoro community which was founded by a Christian movement in 1948 within a radius of 45 kilometres East of Lagos State and of the same distance west of Excravos river of Delta State is renowned for producing sea-going vessels, speedboats, well-trained captains and marine Engineers, carpentry and joinery experts. The community is also the first to generate electricity on its own in the entire Ondo province of the defunct western region;

Aware that Ayetoro community produces 60,000 barrels of crude oil per day as part of its contribution to the nation's oil production and the community is of great historical and tourism importance being the first to successfully practice communism in Nigeria;

Recalls the aftermath of the ecological disturbance experienced on Friday, May 8, 2020, drew the attention of the House to the excruciating pains of the people of Ayetoro and its neighbouring communities like Mese, Gbagira, Awoye and others in Ilaje Local Government Area of Ondo State where hundreds of houses and properties including schools and hospitals in these communities were destroyed by the ravaging sea incursion;

Cognizant that the ocean surge which usually happens during the rainy season between the months of April and October extemporaneously occurred again on 14 November, 2020 due largely to oil exploration and invidious opening of canals to the Atlantic ocean by oil companies operating in the region;

Also recalls that the Shoreline Protection Contracts awarded by the Niger Delta Development Commission (NDDC) in 2004 and 2009 was an effort to mitigate the plights of inhabitants of this ecologically ravaged community, but till today it still remains at zero performance level;

Concerned that with the prevailing ecological circumstances, the entire Ayetoro community with its rich historical antecedents would not only fade into oblivion, but the entire Ilaje coastline would be dangerous for habitation by the people;

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the Federal Ministry of Niger Delta, the Ecological Fund Office (EFO), the Niger Delta Development Commission (NDDC), the Nigeria Maritime Administration and Safety Agency (NIMASA) to immediately dispatch a team of experts to evaluate and develop immediate emergency remediation plan, in Ayetoro Community and other affiliated communities;
- (ii) urge the National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) to provide emergency relief materials to the victims of the surge;
- (iii) mandate the delegation of the House to visit the community on a fact finding mission so as to give a clearer view of the challenges of the people and commiserate with the victims of the ocean surge;
- (iv) urge the oil companies operating in the region to assist the communities to build up adequate infrastructure destroyed by the ocean surge; and
- (v) mandate the Committee on Legislative Compliance to ensure compliance (*Hon. Kolade Victor Akinjo — Ilaje/Ese-Odo Federal Constituency*).

Debate.

Agreed to.

The House:

Noted that Ayetoro Community, as part of the coastal oil-producing communities of Ilaje/Ese-Odo Federal Constituency of Ondo State in the last fifteen (15) years has been grappling with tempestuous oceanic surge which has incessantly led to the loss of many lives and destruction of properties in the region;

Recalled the aftermath of the ecological disturbance experienced on Friday, May 8, 2020, I drew the attention of the House to the excruciating pains of the people of Ayetoro and its neighbouring communities like Mese, Gbagira, Awoye and others in Ilaje Local Government Area of Ondo State where hundreds of houses and properties including schools and hospitals in these communities were destroyed by the ravaging sea incursion;

Cognizant that the ocean surge which usually happens during the rainy season between the months of April and October extemporaneously occurred again on 14 November, 2020 due largely to oil exploration and invidious opening of canals to the Atlantic ocean by oil companies operating in the region;

Also recalled that the Shoreline Protection Contracts awarded by the Niger Delta Development Commission (NDDC) in 2004 and 2009 was an effort to mitigate the plights of inhabitants of this ecologically ravaged community, but till today it still remains at zero performance level;

Concerned that with the prevailing ecological circumstances, the entire Ayetoro community with its rich historical antecedents would not only fade into oblivion, but the entire Ilaje coastline would be dangerous for habitation by the people;

Resolved to:

- (i) urge the Federal Ministry of Niger Delta, the Ecological Fund Office (EFO), the Niger Delta Development Commission (NDDC), the Nigeria Maritime, Administration and Safety Agency (NIMASA) to immediately dispatch a team of experts to evaluate and develop immediate emergency remediation plan in Ayetoro Community and other affiliated communities;
- (ii) urge the National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) to provide emergency relief materials to the victims of the surge;
- (iii) mandate the delegation of the House to visit the community on a fact finding mission so as to give a clearer view of the challenges of the people and commiserate with the victims of the ocean surge;
- (iv) urge the oil companies operating in the region to assist the communities to build up adequate infrastructure destroyed by the ocean surge; and
- (v) mandate the Committee on Legislative Compliance to ensure compliance (HR. 79/12/2020).

Motion made and Question proposed, "That a Bill for an Act to Amend the Pension Reform Act, 2014 to compel every licensed Pension Fund Administrator to have an operational office in at least one State in each of the Six (6) Geopolitical Zones of the Federation for easy access and effective service delivery, grant quicker access to more funds from the retirement savings account of pensioners after retirement while prescribing stiffer punishment for contravention of the Bill, to include accrual of Interest on Investment Returns to Employees' Retirement Savings Account by Fund Administrators and Custodians, introduce a mandatory Employment Injury Insurance cover and placing responsibility of paying the Pension Contribution of members of the Nigeria Police Force under the Contributory Pension Scheme of the Federal Government of Nigeria and to Provide for punctual funding of Employees Retirement Savings Account as first line charge by Employers in the Federal Republic of Nigeria and grant Employees unfettered access to their Retirement Savings Account; and for Related Matters (HB. 208, HB. 386, HB. 392, HB. 562 and HB. 620), and a Bill for an Act to Amend Sections 1 (c), 7 (2), 8 (1), 18, 24, and 99 of the Pension Reform Act, Cap. P50, Laws of the Federation of Nigeria, 2014 by Providing that a Pensioner shall receive at least 75% of his Retirement benefits immediately upon Retirement and Criminalize the undue delay in the payment of Pension; and for Related Matters (HB. 1008) be now consolidated (*Hon. Fulata Abubakar Hassan — Birniwa/Guri/Kiri-Kasamma Federal Constituency*).

Agreed to.

Alarmed at the absence of consultation with core stakeholders and beneficiaries before projects were proposed and implemented in the North-East Zone, thereby imposing a gap that undermines the impacts of such projects;

Perplexed that the sharing of 23 trillion Naira post COVID-19 Economic Stimulus for States, though appreciated, remains unfair in view of socio-economic challenges confronting the North East;

Also perplexed that funds allocated for afforestation and other Climate targeted projects in the North East and North West Zones of Nigeria are either unimplemented, partially implemented or poorly implemented;

Cognizant of the need for a thorough and deliberate planning as well as improved funding of infrastructural gaps in the North east due to the insurgency;

14. **Call for Rehabilitation and Construction of a Collapsed Bridge in Tungan-Madaki Community, Jiwa Ward of Abuja Municipal Area Council**
Motion made and Question proposed:

The House:

Notes the deplorable state and total collapse of the Tungan-Madaki Bridge linking the Jiwa community with other communities in Abuja Municipal Area Council of the Federal Capital Territory;

Also notes that the collapse of the bridge has resulted in cutting off of Tungan-Madaki from other communities in the Abuja Municipal Area Council (AMAC), bringing social and economic activities to a halt with pupils and students unable to attend school;

Aware that Tungan-Madaki is a large settlement that is in proximity to the Nnamdi Azikiwe International Airport, Abuja, and many Civil Servants, Airport Staff and Nigerians doing their legitimate businesses are residents in the community;

Concerned that the bridge, which was constructed more than 50 years ago as the only road to and from Tungan-Madaki Community, has degraded so much that it has become a death trap especially during rainy season;

Worried that agricultural produce often goes to waste in the course of transporting them to the market due to the collapse of the bridge, as indigenes of Tungan-Madaki are the highest producers and suppliers of tuber crops in the Federal Capital Territory;

Also worried that women and children in the surrounding villages of Tungan-Wakili, Tungan-Ashere, Tungan-Nasara, Tungan-Jiwa, Tungan-Kwasau and others cannot access basic health care, attend schools and the market for fear of being victims of flooding in the rainy season;

Disturbed that despite the persistent cries of the resident's communities around the area for remedial actions on the bridge, nothing has been done by successive Federal Capital Territory Administrations to ameliorate the situation, causing the people to undergo untold hardship;

Also disturbed that the continued abandonment of the Tungan-Madaki bridge, which serves as a link to Area Councils of the FCT, is inhibiting commuting and transportation of agricultural produce from the predominantly farming communities to the city center;

Cognizant that if urgent action is not taken, especially in view of the current economic realities, the people of the affected communities will continue to suffer economic hardship and threat to their lives and properties due to the perennial flooding ravaging the area;

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the ecological fund office to immediately deploy its technical team to access and repair the Tungan-Madaki bridge; and
- (ii) mandate the Committees on Federal Capital Territory, and FCT Area Councils and Ancillary Matters to liaise with the Federal Capital Territory Administration with a view to taking expedited action to rehabilitate and reconstruct the abandoned bridge (*Hon. Micah Yohanna Jiba — Abuja Municipal/Bwari Federal Constituency*).

15. Need to Reconstruct the Katsina-Ala-Abaji-Tordonga-Harga-Gawa-Takum Road

Notes that the Katsina-Ala-Abaji-Tordonga-Harga-Gawa-Takum road is a Trunk "A" Federal Road cutting across major towns in Benue State into Taraba State;

Aware that the road is the only route through the Katsina-Ala and Takum axis, covering a major farming population of Taraba and Benue States in Katsina-Ala, Ukum, Takum, Donga and Ussa Local Government Areas across the two States;

Also aware the Gawa-Takum section of the road covering about 16km along the Taraba axis was rehabilitated by the Federal Ministry of Works in 2015, leaving out the 53km Harga-Tor Donga-Abaji-Katsina-Ala axis of in Benue State;

Concerned that the partial rehabilitation of the road has not yielded much impact as commuters go through a lot of difficulty on the longer 53km section of the road which is in a state of total disrepair;

Also concerned that the road, which was constructed in the early 1980's by the Administration of Late President Shehu Shagari and had never been rehabilitated, has now collapsed and most parts nearly impassable;

Worried that due to the dilapidated condition of the road, criminal elements have taken advantage to unleash mayhem on the inhabitants of the surrounding areas and unsuspecting commuters;

Also worried that due to the prolonged activities of criminals in the area, farmers in Harga, Tor Donga, Sai, Abaji and Katsina-Ala have been displaced as their farms have been taken over by bandits;

Cognizant of the economic and social importance of the Katsina-Ala-Abaji-Tor Donga-Harga-Gawa-Takum Federal road to Taraba and Benue States;

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the Federal Ministry of Works and Housing to make provision for the reconstruction of the Katsina-Ala-Abaji-Torbonga-Harga axis of the road in the 2021 Supplementary Budget proposal;*
- (ii) also urge the Federal Ministry of Humanitarian Affairs, Disaster Management and Social Development to provide relief materials for the displaced populations in the affected communities along the road and ensure that they return to their homes;*
- (iii) mandate the Committees on Works, Appropriations, and Women Affairs and Social Development to ensure compliance (Hon. Richard Gbande — Katsina-Ala/Logo/Ukum Federal Constituency).*
