

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES FEDERAL REPUBLIC OF NIGERIA VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS

Tuesday, 16 February, 2021

- 1. The House met at 11.04 a.m. Mr Speaker read the Prayers.
- 2. The House recited the National Pledge
- 3. Votes and Proceedings

Mr Speaker announced that he had examined and approved the *Votes and Proceedings* of Wednesday, 10 February, 2021.

The Votes and Proceedings was adopted by unanimous consent.

4. Oaths of Allegiance and Membership

A Member-elect, Suleiman Aliyu Lere (Lere Federal Constituency) took and subscribed the Oaths of Allegiance and Membership as prescribed by law.

5. Announcement

Defection:

Mr Speaker read the following communications from:

- (i) Hon. Onth Onyeche Blessing (Ohimini/Otukpo Federal Constituency), announcing her defection from the All Progressives Grand Alliance (APGA) to the All Progressives Congress (APC); and
- (ii) Hon. Yakubu Shehu Abdullahi (*Bauchi Federal Constituency*), announcing his defection from the Peoples Redemption Party (PRP) to the All Progressives Congress (APC).
- 6. Remarks by the Speaker on the Shasha Crisis in Oyo State, and the Rising Spate of Inter-Ethnic Crises in the Country
 - 1. Last week, I spoke about the rising spate of insecurity and conflict across the country. Shortly after, and throughout the weekend, the warnings about the dangers we face manifested in Ibadan, Oyo State of Nigeria where an explosion of violence led to citizens' death and the loss of hard-earned property.

- 2. On behalf of the House, I commiserate with the families of those who lost their lives in this most unfortunate incident. And I commiserate too with the government and good people of Oyo State. I assure all Nigerians that the House of Representatives will work, within the powers available to us, to prevent reoccurrence of similar incidents across our country.
- 3. Honourable colleagues, the House of Representatives has neither command nor control of the country's security apparatus. We cannot act to deploy men and equipment to gather intelligence, enforce laws fairly, and take all other actions necessary to prevent breakdowns of law and order and the wanton violence that follows in its wake.
- 4. However, the House is a microcosm of our beloved country, and here in this chamber, we represent every tribe and region, creed and religion. And we owe a duty to the people we serve, to do the things we believe sincerely in our hearts can improve the circumstances of their lives.
- 5. Today, we serve that duty by calling on the Nigeria Police Force (NPF) to conduct a speedy and thorough investigation into the recent violence in Oyo State, to allow for prosecution and punishment of those who instigated and participated in the killings and destruction of property. The Committees on Police Affairs, and Justice are mandated to communicate the House's position to the Inspector General of Police.
- 6. His Excellency, President Muhammadu Buhari, GCFR has announced a Committee led by the National Security Adviser, Maj. Gen. Mohammed Babagana Monguno to hold peace and unity consultations across the country. The Committee will engage Governors, traditional rulers, religious leaders, security agencies, indigenous and settled groups across the States of the Federation to enact resolutions aimed at building an honourable peace in our land.
- 7. The House of Representatives aligns with this initiative, and we will constitute a working group to participate in these consultations. We will work together to examine the cultural, religious, and localised conflicts over land and history that are often at the root of internal security challenges and violent upheavals such as occurred in Oyo State last week and other parts of the country over the years.
- 8. Members will recall that on Wednesday, 10 February, 2021, Hon. Muraina Saubana Ajibola (Ibarapa Central/Ibarapa North Federal Constituency) sought to move a motion on the crisis in Ibarapa, Oyo State. The House is not unmindful of the level of the crisis and will do everything including calling on the Inspector-General of Police and other security agencies to do the needful to forestall the crisis in that State as we continue to address the nagging security challenges in the country.
- 9. Finally, I urge all of those who have large followership of people who listen to them and respect their voices, to be more circumspect about the information they share, the language they use, and the conversations they enable. The words we use about each other can have outsize consequences on our nation's peace and stability because words have the power to build and also to destroy.
- 10. And to political leaders, let me reiterate that we have a greater responsibility to keep the peace in our country. And to do that, we must first commit ourselves to the cause of equal justice and fair treatment for all. Only then, can we wage peace with resolve, secure in the knowledge that with peace, a more prosperous union is within reach.
- 11. God bless you all, and God bless the Federal Republic of Nigeria.

Also concerned that despite the huge loans to boost the economy, Nigeria still slipped into second recession in less than five years;

Need to Caution Against Inflammatory and Divisive Statements by Public Officers;

The House:

Notes the recent inflammatory and divisive statements allegedly credited to the Executive Governor of Bauchi State, His Excellency Bala Mohammed reportedly justifying illegal bearing of fire arms by herdsmen;

Also notes that the said statement has caused national outrage and condemnation by members of the public who believe the government is giving support to perpetrators of crime and carriers of prohibited fire arms;

Aware that the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, 1999 (as amended) and the Fire Arms Act forbid any individual from bearing AK47 rifle as classified fire arms except as approved by the Inspector General of Police (IGP);

Worried that the statement allegedly credited to the Governor of Bauchi State can lead to armed conflicts, as other groups such as farmers and defenseless citizens would equally consider bearing fire arms like AK47 rifle in defense of their lives and property;

Resolves to:

Debate.

Question that the Bill be now read a Second Time — Agreed to.

Bill read the Second Time.

Bill referred to the Committee on Agricultural Production and Services.

The House:

Noted that there is an increasingly disturbing security situation in and around Isuikwuato and Umunneochi Local Government Areas of Abia State which, unless urgent steps are taken, may degenerate to chaos and lawlessness:

Also noted that virtually all roads that lead to the Areas have been taken over by criminals, killer herdsmen and bandits who lay siege on the people of the Local Government Areas, maining, robbing, kidnapping, raping and killing people and travellers:

Informed that there has not been a single day in the last five months that there were no reported cases of abductions, robberies, theft or some form of criminality in and around the two Local Government Areas and those criminal elements are so audacious that they operate in broad day light and night time, mostly without any interference from security operatives:

Aware that victims of those murderous gangs range from poor peasant farmers, old and young people; travellers, traditional and political leaders, among others and a case in point is that of one Mr. Obiajulu Okafor who was kidnapped, together with his wife and driver, on 2 January, 2021, which forced his family to pay a ransom of twenty-two Million Naira (N22m) to secure their release;

Recalled that on 6 October, 2020, in two separate incidents, the Chairman (Transition Committee) of Isuikwuato Local Government Area and the member representing Isuikwuato Local Government Area in Abia State House of Assembly, were attacked on the same road and while the House Member was lucky to have escaped unharmed (with a bullet-ridden vehicle), the Transition Committee Chairman paid a ransom to regain his freedom from the kidnappers;

Worried that the people of Isuikwuato and Ummunneochi can no longer go to their farms or engage in other means of gaining livelihood for fear of being abducted, raped or killed by herdsmen and criminals who have taken over their farmlands and roadways;

Cognizant that unless urgent and drastic measures are taken to halt the tide and combat those criminal elements terrorizing the constituency, calamity may befall the areas as the people may tend to take the laws into their hands, which may lead to a state of anarchy;

Resolved to:

- urge the Inspector General of Police to prioritize the security of those Local Government *(i)* Areas and arrest the criminals terrorizing the constituency;
- also urge the various security agencies to collaborate for the purpose of ensuring a safe and (ii)conducive environment in the constituency;
- (iii) mandate the Committee on Police Affairs to ensure compliance (HR. 05/02/2021).
- 17. Need for the Independent National Electoral Commission to Review Upward the Number of State Constituencies in Oyo State

Motion made and Question proposed:

The House:

Notes that Section 112 of the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, 1999 (as amended) provides that the Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC) shall divide every State in the Federation into such number of State Constituencies as is equal to three or four times the number of Federal Constituencies within the State:

Also notes that Section 91 of the Constitution provides that the House of Assembly of a State shall consist of three or four times the number of seats the State has in the House of Representatives divided in a way to reflect, as far as possible, nearly equal population; provided that a House of Assembly of a State shall consist of not less than twenty-four and not more than forty members;

Further notes that Section 114 of the Constitution provides that INEC shall review the division of every State into constituencies at intervals of not less than ten years, and may alter such constituencies under the provisions of this section to such extent as it may consider desirable in the light of the review;

Aware that Oyo State currently has thirty-two (32) State Constituencies and fourteen (14) Federal Constituencies namely: Ona-Ara/Egbe&a, Iseyin/Kajola, lwajowa/Itesiwaju, Ibadan North-East/South-East, Lagelu/Akinyele, Ibarapa East/Ido, Ibadan North, Oluyole, Atisbo/Saki East/Saki West, Ibadan North-West/South-West, Ibarapa Central/Ibarapa North, Afijio/Atiba/Oyo East/Oyo West, Ogo-Oluwa/Surulere, Oluyole, Ogbomosho-North/South/Orire and Olorunsogo/Orelope/Irepo;

Believes that to comply with the provisions of the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, 1999, the number of State Constituencies in Oyo State should be 40, being the maximum threshold prescribed by the Constitution;

Concerned that since the inception of the present democratic dispensation on 29 May, 1999, INEC has failed to review the number of State Constituencies in Oyo State as prescribed by the Constitution which is the Supreme Law of the Federation and its provisions are binding on all authorities and persons in Nigeria;

Observes that the failure or refusal of INEC to comply with the provisions of the Constitution deprives the people of Oyo State of equitable and fair representation in the State House of Assembly;

Also aware that the discharge of this constitutional duty by INEC is subject to the consequential approval of the National Assembly, hence, the process should be commenced and concluded before the statutory period prescribed for the conduct of the next general election in Nigeria, which may hold in the first quarter of 2021;

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC) to commence the process of reviewing upward the number of State Constituencies in Oyo State by creating additional 8 State Constituencies to comply with the provisions of Sections 112 to 114 of the 1999 Constitution;
- (ii) mandate the Committee on Electoral Matters to ensure compliance and report back within six (6) weeks (Hon. Muraina Saubana Ajibola Ibarapa Centra/Ibarapa North Federal Constituency and 13 others).

Debate.

Amendment Proposed:

In Prayer (i), immediately after the words "Constituencies in", leave out the words "Oyo State", and insert the word "Nigeria" (Hon. Agunsoye Oluwarotimi Ojo — Kosofe Federal Constituency).

Ouestion that the amendment be made — Agreed to.

Question on the Motion as amended — Agreed to.

The House:

Noted that Section 112 of the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, 1999 (as amended) provides that the Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC) shall divide every State in the Federation into such number of State Constituencies as is equal to three or four times the number of Federal Constituencies within the State:

Also noted that Section 91 of the Constitution provides that the House of Assembly of a State shall consist of three or four times the number of seats the State has in the House of Representatives divided in a way to reflect, as far as possible, nearly equal population: provided that a House of Assembly of a State shall consist of not less than twenty-four and not more than forty members;

Further noted that Section 114 of the Constitution provides that INEC shall review the division of every State into constituencies at intervals of not less than ten years, and may alter such constituencies under the provisions of this section to such extent as it may consider desirable in the light of the review;

Aware that Oyo State currently has thirty-two (32) State Constituencies and fourteen (14) Federal Constituencies namely: Ona-Ara/Egbeda, Iseyin/Kajola, Iwajowa/Itesiwaju, Ibadan North-East/South-East, Lagelu/Akinyele, Ibarapa East/Ido, Ibadan North, Oluyole, Atisbo/Saki East/Saki West, Ibadan North-West/South-West, Ibarapa Central/Ibarapa North, Afijio/Atiba/Oyo East/Oyo West, Ogo-Oluwa/Surulere, Oluyole, Ogbomosho-North/South/Orire and Olorunsogo/Orelope/Irepo;

Believed that to comply with the provisions of the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, 1999, the number of State Constituencies in Oyo State should be 40, being the maximum threshold prescribed by the Constitution;

Concerned that since the inception of the present democratic dispensation on 29 May, 1999, INEC has failed to review the number of State Constituencies in Oyo State as prescribed by the Constitution which is the Supreme Law of the Federation and its provisions are binding on all authorities and persons in Nigeria;

Observed that the failure or refusal of INEC to comply with the provisions of the Constitution deprives the people of Oyo State of equitable and fair representation in the State House of Assembly;

Also aware that the discharge of this constitutional duty by INEC is subject to the consequential approval of the National Assembly, hence, the process should be commenced and concluded before the statutory period prescribed for the conduct of the next general election in Nigeria, which may hold in the first quarter of 2021;

Resolved to:

- (i) urge the Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC) to commence the process of reviewing upward the number of State Constituencies in Nigeria and particularly, by creating additional 8 State Constituencies in Oyo State to comply with the provisions of Sections 112 to 114 of the 1999 Constitution;
- (ii) mandate the Committee on Electoral Matters to ensure compliance and report back within six (6) weeks (HR. 06/02/2021).

Motion made and Question proposed, "That the House do set down items 9 - 10 on the Order Paper to another legislative day, pursuant to Order Eight, Rule 6 (3)" (Hon. Abubakar Hassan Fulata — Birniwa/Guri/Kiri-Kasamma Federal Constituency).
