Hon. Ahmed Dayyabu Safana:

MOTIONS

6. **Need to Establish Medical Clinics in all Nigerian Airports:**
Hon. Emeka Martins Chinedu:

The House:

Notes that according to a report by Ports Health Services Nigeria, five of the Country's International Airports, namely; Murtala Mohammed International Airport, Lagos, Port Harcourt International Airport, Omagwa, Margaret Ekpo International Airport, Calabar, Aminu Kano International Airport, Kano and Nnamdi Azikiwe International Airport Abuja were designated to function with full packaged Medical facilities and Stand-by Medical practitioners for the purpose of healthcare and medical emergencies;

Concerned that the five International Airports are presently operating with either deplorable, little or no medical facilities, while the remaining ones are practically without verifiable medical facilities;

Recalls the sudden death, in December 2019, of a young traveler identified as Mr. Chukwuma Eze, 47, who reportedly slumped and died under questionable circumstances at Murtala Mohammed International Airport, Lagos;

Also recalls the death of one Mr. Jude Oladapo, 44, in October 2019 at Murtala Mohammed International Airport (MMIA) as well as the episode of a female passenger who was reportedly found dead in one of the toilets at the International wing of the same airport, all of which may be attributed to inadequacies in healthcare and medical attention in Nigeria's Airports;

Aware that a transit friendly environment such as an Airport is expected to be equipped with adequate medical facilities and personnel to tackle emergency situations at the airports;

Also aware that such medical personnel should be able to treat sick passengers as well as vaccinate those who may be travelling to Countries that are susceptible to pandemic disease such as Covid-19 or Ebola;

Believes that the establishment of well-equipped health facilities in airports with corresponding engagement of medical professionals who, will in no small measure, tackle issues of healthcare emergencies at the country's Airports;

Also believes that having the option of such medical convenience and affordable healthcare in all Nigerian Airports would bestow confidence in the country's system by people who may want to engage in one business or the other at the Airport;

Worried that despite the initial designation for full packaged medical facilities, the Airports are yet to go beyond the ordinary "First Aid", as a solution for healthcare and emergencies;

Also worried that the absence of substantially equipped Medical Clinics and Medical practitioners in Airports may be a recipe for more avoidable deaths at the Airports, thereby eroding travellers confidence and jeopardizing Nigeria's chances of commensurate interaction with the global world;

Resolves to:

- (i) Urge the Federal Ministry of Aviation to partner with the Federal Ministry of Health and other related Agencies to establish well equipped Medical Clinics at all the Airports in the Country;
- (ii) mandate the Committees on Aviation, and Health Institutions to ensure implementation.

7. Need to Stop the Spate of Maternal Mortality resulting from Caesarian Operations in Nigeria:

Hon. Sergius Ogun:

The House:

Notes the rising rate of maternal mortality caused by caesarean operations in the country and the high number of mothers who lose their lives in the process of child birth generally;

Also notes that one of the primary purpose of government is to ensure the security, health and well-being of its citizens, as provided in section 17(3) (c) of the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, 1999 (as amended);

Further notes that caesarean operation is one of the most commonly performed surgical procedures in obstetrics and one of the oldest operations in surgery, hence a need to ensure that the procedure is conducted in adherence to best practices;

Concerned that the incidences of maternal mortality occasioned by caesarean operations are on the rise, with the latest medical survey revealing that no less than three hundred thousand women die annually in Nigeria as a result of the procedure;

Also concerned that there is no vigorous effort on the part of government to stem the tide of maternal mortality through provision of quality healthcare facilities;

Worried that if the situation is left unattended to, the country may end up losing an alarming number of mothers in the process of childbirth;

Cognizant that when a mother survives the child birth process, the newborn baby stands a better chance of getting the best of maternal care which moulds him into more wholesome individual who in less likely to constitute nuisance in society;

Resolves to:

- (i) Urge the Federal Ministry of Health to provide improved facilities and well equipped medical personnel at all public hospitals across Nigeria;

- (ii) mandate the Committees on Healthcare Services and Health Institutions to liaise with the Federal Ministry of Health to ensure compliance and report within four (4) weeks for further legislative action.

8. Need to Investigate the Budgetary and Extra Budgetary Activities of the Ministry of Niger Delta Affairs:

Hon. Eta Mboru

Hon. Henry Archibong:

The House:

Notes that it is the responsibility of the government through Ministries, Agencies and Parastatals to provide amenities and infrastructure for development as well as provide a conducive environment for citizens to harness their potentials to improve their standard of living;

Also notes that the Ministry of Niger Delta Affairs was established in 2008 with the core mandate to develop the oil-rich Niger Delta Region to curb hostilities and militancy while developing infrastructures to promote diversification and productivity;

Aware that President Mohammad Buhari had, in December 2020, signed the N13.59 trillion 2021 Appropriation Bill into law and that over N500 billion naira have been appropriated for the Ministry of Niger Delta Affairs in the past twelve years without commensurate implementation to that effect, thus the budgetary provisions have not been felt in the Niger Delta Region with regards to capital projects carried out by the ministry;

Also aware that several major projects initiated since the inception of the Ministry are still ongoing while the abandoned ones are still being funded yearly as ongoing projects, for instance, the East-West Road Project; Mbak Atai, Mkpeta, Oku Iboku roads in Akwa Ibom State, and Omelema-Agada II Road in River State which have remained uncompleted;

Worried that some of the projects were awarded without recourse to due process as seen in the over-inflation of contract sums and the non-implementation or non-completion of fully funded projects, an example of which is the award of (N233, 888,287.50) as against the (N24, 000,000.00) that was approved in the 2020 budget for the supply of 10 Nos. of 300 KVA transformers in Itu/Ibiono Federal Constituency in Akwa Ibom State, 2.1km Akim Qua internal roads Calabar Municipal Cross River State, 8.4km Akpap-Oboroko- Okunkang road Odukpani Cross River State, embankment/shoreline protection at Ikoneto and several other projects that have not been completed yet fully funded, which the Agency is considering bringing up as ongoing projects in the 2022 Appropriation Bill;

Concerned that uncompleted capital projects have over the years drained the finances of government, and the non-performance of the Ministry has robbed the Niger Delta of much needed developmental milestones;

Resolves to:

Mandate the Committee on Niger Delta Affairs to investigate the budgetary and extra-budgetary activities of Ministry of Niger Delta Affairs as well as investigate the level of performance of the Ministry with regards to its projects since 2008 to date and report within (8) eight weeks for further legislative action.

9. Need to Honour Frontline Health Workers in the Treatment of COVID-19 Patients:
Hon. Kolawole Taiwo Musibau:

The House:

Notes that the outbreak of the contagious coronavirus and its ravaging effect has infected millions and killed thousands of people across the world and in Nigeria;

Aware of the protocols prescribed by the Nigeria Centre for Disease Control to curtail the spread of the virus, which are washing of hands and often, self-isolate if unwell, maintaining social distance, and avoiding crowded places, wearing of office mask, etc.;

Cognizant that frontline health workers like Doctors, Nurses, Pharmacists, Scientist paramedics are responsible for treating those infected by the deadly virus;

Worried that most of these frontlines workers are daily at risk of contracting the dreadful virus as many of them have died in the course of treating COVID-19 patients;

Also concerned that the despite the contagious nature of the virus and death of some health workers, most of them are still dedicated to treating COVID-19 patients with low income and fringe benefits and as a result, many of them have also become patients of COVID-19 Pandemic;

Resolves to:

- (i) Urge the Federal Government to honour all frontline health workers in the treatment of COVID-19 patients all over the country;
- (ii) mandate Committee on Healthcare Services to ensure implementation.

10. Need to Address the Spate of Kidnappings in Shandam/Mikang/Qua'an Pan Federal Constituency, Plateau State:

Hon. Komsol Alphonsus Longgap:

The House:

Notes that Pandam Game Reserve is located in Namu District of Qua' an Pan Local Government Area of Plateau State which hosts a large number of wild animals, trees and vegetation forest;

Aware of recent intelligent reports that the Game reserve has been invaded by unknown herdsmen who possess dangerous weapons and have been discovered to be bandits who fled from Zamfara and Niger states;

Concerned that the herdsmen who are allegedly non-Nigerians are gradually and illegally settling down within the forest from where they launch gruesome attacks on the villagers, innocent commuters and settlers around the reserve;

Also concerned that the despite the Federal Government's recent claim to have taken over the reserve with plans to upgrade it to a National Park, security in the reserve has continued to worsen and the security personnel detailed to the community seem overwhelmed;

Worried that the bandits have shown a clear sense of desperation as they kidnap both the young and old, the rich and the poor, with the most recent incident being the kidnap of District Heads and Local Chiefs;

Also worried that the nefarious activities of the bandits have created a multifaceted insecurity concern for Plateau State and Nigeria at large as the attacks have become aggravated and almost uncontrollable with the bandits rustling cows owned by members of the communities;

Disturbed that the Game reserve which served as a source of revenue has become a den of robbers, bandits and other criminals, thus crippling economic activities in the area;

Also disturbed that there has been a high shortfall in irrigation farming activities within the communities as farmers, investors and consumers trying to tap into the agrarian wealth of these communities have become discouraged to invest;

Resolves to:

- (i) Urge the Inspector General of Police and Heads of other relevant security agencies such as the Nigerian Military, DSS to deploy security personnel to ascertain the reported invasion in

Pandam game Reserve, intensify community policing and intelligence gathering, arrest the perpetrators of the heinous acts of armed robbery and kidnapping with a view to restoring normalcy in Shendam/Mikang/ Qua' an Pan Constituency;

- (ii) also urge the Federal Ministry of Information and Culture to take over the Pandam Game Reserve and upgrade the Reserve to a befitting and secured status;
- (iii) mandate the Committees on Police Affairs and National Security and Intelligence to ensure compliance;

ENACTED by the National Assembly of the Federal Republic of Nigeria as follows: -

1. **ISSUE AND APPROPRIATION OF ₦982,729,695,343 FROM THE CONSOLIDATED REVENUE FUND FOR 2021**

- (i) The Accountant-General of the Federation shall, when authorised to do so by Warrants signed by the Minister charged with responsibility for finance, pay out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of the Federation during the year ending on the 31st day of December 2021, the sums specified by the warrants, not exceeding in the aggregate ₦982,729,695,343 (Nine Hundred and Eighty-Two Billion, Seven Hundred and Twenty-Nine Million, Six Hundred and Ninety-Five Thousand, Three Hundred and Forty-Three Naira) only, for the year ending on the 31st day of December, 2021.

First Schedule

- (ii) The amount mentioned in subsection (1) of this section shall be appropriated to heads of expenditure as set out in the Schedule to this Act.

- (iii) No part of the amount aforesaid shall be released from the Consolidated Revenue Fund of the Federation after the end of the year mentioned in subsection (1) of this section.
- 2. RELEASE OF FUNDS FROM THE CONSOLIDATED REVENUE FUND**
All amounts appropriated under this Supplementary Act shall be released from the Consolidated Revenue Fund of the Federation only for the purpose specified in the Schedule to this Act.
- 3. VIREMENT**
In the event that the implementation of any of the projects intended to be undertaken under this Supplementary Act cannot be completed without virement, such virement shall only be effected with the prior approval of the National Assembly.
- 4. INTERPRETATION**
For the purposes of this Supplementary Act the term "schedule" includes the detailed estimates of expenditure attached thereto
- 5. SHORT TITLE**
This Bill may be cited as the Supplementary Appropriation Bill, 2021.

A supplementary Bill for an Act to Authorise the issue from the Consolidated Revenue Fund of the Federation the total sum of **₦ 982,729,695,343** (Nine Hundred and Eighty-Two Billion, Seven Hundred and Twenty-Nine Million, six Hundred and Ninety-Five Thousand, Three Hundred and Forty-Three Naira) only, of which **₦ 123,332,174,164** (One Hundred and Twenty-Three Billion, Three Hundred and Thirty-Two Million, One Hundred and Seventy-Four Thousand, One Hundred and Sixty-Four Naira) only is for Recurrent (Non-Debt) Expenditure while the sum of **₦ 859,397,521,179** (Eight Hundred and Fifty-Nine Billion, Three Hundred and Ninety-Seven Million, Five Hundred and Twenty-One Thousand, One Hundred and Seventy-Nine Naira) only is for Contribution to the Development Fund for Capital Expenditure for the year ending 31 December, 2021.
