- (a) Rising on Order 41, Senator Patrick A. Akinyelure (*Ondo Central*) drew the attention of the Senate to five (5) petitions received from the Office of the President of the Senate as follows:
 - (i) Jaiyeola B.T. Esq., against Madonna University, Elele over an alleged complaint of high handedness and the act of ineptitude;
 - (ii) Manasseh Ehile, Esq., against Naval Officer Albert Abraham and his team over an alleged abduction, aiding forcible entry, harassment, intimidation and illegal dredging of sand at Fowowawo village, near Magbon-etido, Obafemi/Owode Local Government Area, Ogun State;
 - (iii) Danlami Sule and Emeka Okafor against the Nigerian Incentive-based Risk Sharing System for Agricultural Lending (NIRSAL) Microfinance Bank over an alleged fraudulent administration of the COVID-19 relief facility;
 - (iv) Comrade Dakpos Daniel Damijo and two others against the Acting Managing Director of Niger Delta Development Commission (NDDC) and Senator Godswill Akpabio over an alleged misappropriation of NDDC funds; and
 - (v) Francis Olayemi Adebayo against Nigeria Customs Service over an alleged confiscation and auctioning of his car.

ENSORRATION OF A BILL FOR AN ACT TO AMEND THE FIREARMS ACT, CAP F28, LAWS OF THE FERRATION OF NIGERIA, 2004 TO INCREASE THE IMPOSITION OF FINES FOR OFFENCES; PROVIDE FOR THE DESTRUCTION OF FIREARMS ILLEGALLY IMPORTED INTO THE COUNTRY OR IN POSSESSION OF INDIVIDUALS WITHOUT VALID LICENSE WITH A VIEW TO CURTAILING THE CIRCULATION OF ILLEGAL FIREARMS IN THE COUNTRY; AND FOR RELATED MATTERS, 2021

Clause 1: Amendment of the Principal Act.

The Firearms Act Cap F28, LFN 2004 (in this Bill, referred to as "the Principal Act") is amended as set out in this Bill.

Committee's Recommendation:

That the provision in Clause 1 be retained (Senator Michael O. Bamidele — Ekiti Central) — Agreed to.

Cause 2: Amendment of Section 27 of the Principal Act.

Section 27 (1)(c)(v) of the Principal Act is amended by substituting the words "one thousand naira", with "two million naira" as follows — to a fine of one million Naira or imprisonment for a term of two years or to both such fine and imprisonment (Senator Michael O. Bamidele — Ekiti Central).

Amendment Proposed

Leave out the words "two million Naira" and "two years" in Clause 2 and insert the words "five mailion Naira" and "three years" instead thereof (Senator Matthew A. Urhoghide — Edo South).

Section 28 of the principal Act is amended by inserting the word "thousand" after the word "hundred" as follows —

A new Section 39 is hereby inserted after the existing Section 38 of the Principal Act, as follows —

Power to Seize and Destroy Comiscated and Illegal Firearms

- (1) It shall be lawful for any officer of the Nigerian Armed Forces, Nigeria Police Force, Nigerian Customs Service, Nigeria Security and Civil Defence Corps and officers of other law enforcement agencies to seize and confiscate any illicit and illegal firearms imported into the country without any varie import documents or firearms in possession of any individual, composate basies and other organisations, without a valid licence.
- The head of the seizure, shall create a place for the seizure, shall of the firearms in question and designate an officer who shall record the details of the firearms in question, namely
 - (a) and serial number of the firearm;
 - (b) country of manufacture;
 - (c) commy of import, and
 - (d) person is firearm was found and the country of course.
- After the confiscation or seizure of illegal firearms imported into the country or in possession of any individual, corporate bodies and other organisations, the agency responsible for the confiscation/seizure, shall within Founcen (14) days deposit the confiscated and seized firearms with the Office of the National Security Adviser, who shall act as the Central Coordinating Body for all illicit and illegal firearms confiscated or seized by any law antiprocurent agency.
- (4) Upon receive of the coefficient of illegal firearms referred to in section (3) of this section, the Office of the National Security Advisor shall in collaboration with the Armed Forces assess and separate in the are—
 - (a) of war expectation grades to be deployed to the military;
 - (b) Service has of military grades to be deployed for use by Civile has Task Force (JTF) and Registered Vigilantes under the Adviser.
- In accordance with selection (4) of this section, arrangement shall be put in place of the National Security Adviser for the physical and the unserviceable firearms during a destruction ceremony.
- The Office of School Security Adviser shall fix the date of destruction as the location of the destruction and ensure the presence of the coverage and independent observers at the destruction in compliance with international best practices on destruction of weapons most especially, the International Small Arms Control Standards (ISACS) developed by the United Nations Coordinating Action on Small Arms (CASA).

- (7) The destruction ceremony referred to, in subsection (6) of this section, shall be conducted by the Office of the National Security Adviser within a maximum period of Two (2) manifes after seizure except where there is a valid court order preventing the said destruction.
- (8) The firearms subject to seizure and describing in this Bill includes, small arms and light weapons, ghost guns or homemade firearms, relinquished during
 - (a) Amnesty programme;

Clause 7: Insertion of new Section 40 in the Principal Act.

A new Section 40 is hereby inserted after the new section 39, as follows -

Offences

- (1) Any person who tampers with the firearms seized or confiscated pursuant to Section 39 of this Bill is guilty of an offence and liable on conviction to a minimum sentence of 10 years imprisonment.
- (2) Any person who assists, encourage and a consider with the record keeper or any person in charge of the finances which seized or confiscated firearms is guilty of an offence and liable on conviction to a minimum sentence of Ten (10) years imprisonment.

Committee's Recommendation:

Clause 8: Insertion of new Section 41 in the Principal act.

A new Section 41 is hereby provided for the Principal Act to read as follows -

Recycling and reusing waste materials from the first reasons

- (1) The Minister in charge of Defence said seeing a policy for recycling and reusing waste materials such a series and plastic derived from destruction of firearms seized passes to the provision of this Bill in order to generate revenue and processe objects with practical artistic and symbolic value.
- (2) The revenue generated through recycling and reusing waste materials from destruction of seized firearms shall be paid into the Consolidated Revenue account of the Federation.
