





BACKGROUND ON THE SPECIAL SEATS BILL SURVEY

A June 2025 nationwide survey, commissioned by the Policy and Legislative Advocacy Centre (PLAC), revealed low awareness of the Special Seats Bill before the 10th National Assembly, but a strong support for its objective – improved women participation in governance. The findings highlight perspectives from Nigerians' on women's political representation, the perceived benefits of the Bill, and strategies for building broader acceptance.

NATIONWIDE (N = 3,083)







METHODOLOGY

- The poll was conducted in June 2025 via telephone interviews using a fully structured questionnaire to capture the required information from respondents.
- A nationwide sample of 3,083 Nigerians aged 18 years and above, representing the six geo-political regions, 36 states, and the FCT, participated in the survey.










PERCEIVED BENEFITS OF THE SPECIAL SEATS BILL - NATIONWIDE




SUPPORT FOR THE SPECIAL SEATS BILL







REASON FOR SUPPORTING THE BILL



REASON FOR NOT SUPPORTING THE BILL




PERCEIVED IMPORTANCE OF WOMEN IN GOVERNMENT





INSTITUTIONS PERCEIVED TO SUPPORT THE BILL




PARTICIPATION AND INFORMATION SOURCES







ORGANISATIONS RESPONSIBLE FOR AWARENESS FORUMS

As of mid-2025, survey respondents overwhelmingly supported the concept and purpose of the Special Seats Bill (92% in favour). However, awareness remained low and participation in conversation minimal. Going forward, sustained public education and stronger institutional engagement will be key to translating this support into concrete legislative action.
