## MOTIONS

10. **Need to include the Construction of Flyovers and Pedestrian Bridges Along Kaduna Eastern Bye-Pass and Kaduna Zaria Highway Project:**  
**Hon. Hussaini Mohammed Jallo:**

**The House:**

*Notes* the increasing rate of road accidents and fatalities recorded on a daily basis along the Kaduna Eastern Bye-Pass, currently being constructed by Dantata and Sawoe Construction Company, along the Kaduna–Zaria Highway;

*Also notes* the alarming rate of pedestrian-related road traffic crashes along the Kaduna Eastern Bye-Pass and the Kaduna–Zaria Highway, which cut across densely populated communities, including Rigasa Bakin Ruwa, Danmani Junction, Kurmin Mashi Junction, Mando Motor Park, M/Jos, Unnguwa Gwari, NDC Unguwa Kaji, GDSS Rigachikun, Farakwai, Rigachikun, Jaji, Z/Aya and Kwarau Tasha

*Observes* that these highways effectively divide the communities into two distinct parts, with rapid population growth leading to constant movement of residents, traders, and students across the highways;

*Aware* that the ongoing construction of the Kaduna Eastern Bye-Pass and the Kaduna–Zaria Highway has inadvertently created significant safety challenges for pedestrians and motorists due to the absence of designated pedestrian crossings, bridges, and flyovers;

*Concerned* that the continuous human and vehicular movement across these high-speed highways have resulted in fatal accidents, turning the roads into death traps for schoolchildren, the elderly, traders, market women, and commuters attempting to cross;

*Recognizes* that the Kaduna Eastern Bye–Pass and Kaduna–Zaria Highway projects have become major danger zones requiring urgent pedestrian safety infrastructure, including flyovers and pedestrian bridges;

*Cognizant* that the construction of pedestrian bridges and flyovers at these critical points will not only prevent the loss of lives and property but will also enhance traffic flow, protect economic activities, and support the long-term urban development of Kaduna and its environs;

*Also cognizant* that while these roads are vital economic lifelines, they must not become hazards to the very people they are meant to serve, and that the construction of pedestrian bridges and flyovers is a practical and necessary step toward safeguarding lives and promoting people-centred infrastructure;

*Resolves to:*

- (i) urge the Federal Ministry of Works to immediately review the Kaduna Eastern Bye-Pass project being handled by Dantata and Sawoe Construction Company, as well as the Kaduna–Zaria Highway Project design, and include the construction of flyovers and pedestrian bridges at the following high-risk locations of Rigasa Bakin Ruwa, Danmani Junction, Kurmin Mashi Junction,

Mando Motor Park, M/Jos, Unguwa Gwari, NDC Unguwa Kaji, GDSS Rigachikun, Farakwai, Rigachikun, Jaji, Z/Aya and Kwarau Tasha;

- (ii) also urge the Federal Ministry of Works to liaise with the Kaduna State Government to ensure that safety infrastructure is fully integrated into Federal Highway Projects within the State;
- (iii) further urge the Federal Road Safety Corps (FRSC) and the Kaduna State Traffic Law Enforcement Authority (KASTLEA) to intensify public enlightenment campaigns on road safety and ensure the provision of temporary pedestrian crossings pending the construction of permanent structures;
- (iv) mandate the Committees on Works and Legislative Compliance to conduct an on-the-spot assessment of the Kaduna Eastern Bye-Pass and the Kaduna–Zaria Highway, ensure compliance, and report within four (4) weeks for further legislative action.

**11. Restoration of Suppressed State Constituencies in Ado, Okpokwu and Ogbadibo Local Government Areas of Benue State:**

**Hon. Philip Agbese:**

**The House:**

*Notes* that Sections 91, 112, and 113 of the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, 1999 (as amended), provide for the composition of State Houses of Assembly and empower the Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC) to review and delimit State Constituencies periodically to ensure fair, equitable, and adequate representation

*Also notes* that historically, prior to certain delimitation exercises in the Fourth Republic, each of Ado, Okpokwu and Ogbadibo Local Government Areas in Ado/Okpokwu/ Ogbadibo Federal Constituency had two distinct State Constituencies, specifically known as Ado State Constituency I & II, Ogbadibo State Constituency I & II, and Okpokwu State Constituency I & II in the Benue State House of Assembly. These reflected their significant landmass, population, number of wards, cultural and administrative identities as key Idoma-speaking communities;

*Concerned* that subsequent delimitation and suppression exercises by INEC reduced the representation of these Local Government Areas, resulting in each Local Government Area now having only one State Constituency, thereby forcing large populations and vast territories to be represented by a single member in the Benue State House of Assembly;

*Disturbed* that the suppression of these constituencies has negatively impacted the lives and wellbeing of my constituents who are being grossly under-represented in the Benue State House of Assembly, leading to inadequate legislative voice, inequitable access to developmental projects, resources, state attention, and overall marginalization despite the size and developmental needs of the three Local Government Areas;

*Also disturbed* that the current arrangement runs contrary to the principles of federalism, justice, equity and fair representation, and has led to widespread agitation among the constituents;

*Aware* of the resolution passed by the National Assembly to restore Ukum II, Gboko and Nyamatsor directing INEC to restore the suppressed states constituencies ahead of the 2027 General Elections in compliance with constitutional provisions and judicial precedents;

*Convinced* that restoring two State Constituencies to each of Ado, Okpokwu and Ogbadibo Local Government Areas (bringing the total to six, as historically existed) is necessary to correct injustice, align with demographic realities, and strengthen democratic representation across Benue State;

*Resolves to:*

- (i) urge the Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC) to immediately restore the suppressed State Constituencies in Ado, Okpokwu and Ogbadibo Local Government Areas of Benue State to two constituencies per Local Government Area in line with the 1999 Constitution (as amended), historical delimitation records, principles of equity and relevant precedents;
- (ii) also urge the Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC) to activate the restored State Constituencies and conduct elections into the six restored constituencies (two per Local Government Area) during the 2027 General Elections;
- (iii) further urge the Senate to concur with this Resolution for greater national effect and enforcement;
- (iv) transmit a certified true copy of this Resolution to the Chairman of INEC, the Governor of Benue State, the Benue State House of Assembly, and other relevant authorities for necessary action and compliance;
- (v) mandate the Committee on Independent National Electoral Commission interface with INEC, the Benue State Government, the Attorney-General of the Federation and other relevant stakeholders, and ensure restoration and operationalization of the constituencies.

**12. Need for Mobile Network Providers in Nigeria to Ensure Compliance with the Data Protection Act, 2023 in the Reallocation of Phone Numbers to New Subscribers:**

**Hon. Billy Osawaru:**

**The House:**

*Notes* that Data Protection Act 2023 provides a legal framework for the protection of personal information and establishes the Nigeria Data Protection Commission for the regulation of the processing of personal information;

*Also notes* that Section 70 of the Nigerian Communications Act authorizes the Nigerian Communications Commission (NCC) to make and publish regulations, guidelines, and rules for the communications industry, which would act as legal basis for enforcing industry standards, managing licenses, and prescribing technical specifications;

*Aware* that the said Nigerian Communications Commission guidelines mandate the network providers in Nigeria to deactivate and reallocate inactive SIM card and phone numbers to new subscribers after a period of 180 days and later 1 year of dormancy without the knowledge of the former subscriber, as provided in their new Telecom Identity Risk Management Policy (TIRMP);

*Also aware* as claimed by network providers, that it is not financially sustainable or profitable for them to retain inactive SIM cards on their network despite being registered with the initial subscribers' data;

*Worried* that many innocent Nigerians and other Nationals have been embarrassed, humiliated and extorted, over false allegations resulted from reallocation of SIM cards or phone numbers used to commit a crime by the previous user;

*Concerned* that if not strictly guided and checked reallocation of SIM cards or phone numbers to new subscribers could lead to data breaches, identity theft and financial fraud, especially when the numbers are still linked to the previous owner's sensitive information, such as bank verification number (BVN) and National Identity Number (NIN);

*Resolves to*

- (i) urge the Nigerian Communications Commission to extend validity period of reallocation of phone number to a year and six months; while the six months be used to ensure that inactive sim cards of the said status would be published on National dailies for public information and copied to police once or twice a year to enhance transparency in the process and enable fast resolution of criminal or fraudulent cases caused by sim card reassignment;
- (ii) mandate the Committees on Communication and Commerce to liaise with the Nigerian Communications Commission (NCC), Nigerian Data Protection Commission (NDPC); and other related Agencies to ensure the safety and protection of Mobile Communication Subscribers in Nigeria and report within four (4) weeks for further legislative action.

- (ii) approve the inclusion of the project and it’s financing into the Federal Government’s Rolling Borrowing Plan;
- (iii) approve the financing structure and terms as presented, including:
  - (a) Partial guarantee covers by Islamic Corporation for the Insurance of Investment and Export Credit (ICIEC);
  - (b) Tenor of 9 years with up to 3 years grace period;
  - (c) Interest rate benchmarked at CME SOFR + 5.35% per annum;
- (iv) mandate strict legislative oversight, including:
  - (a) Quarterly reporting by the Federal Ministry of Finance, DMO, and Ministry of Works on project implementation and disbursement;
  - (b) Submission of executed financing agreements to the National Assembly within 30 days of financial close;
  - (c) Continuous monitoring by relevant Committees.
- (iv) ensure transparency and value for money, including:
  - (a) competitive and transparent procurement processes;
  - (b) independent technical and financial audits;
  - (c) periodic evaluation of project milestones and outcomes.
