## ORDERS OF THE DAY BILLS

1. A Bill for an Act to Provide for Establishment of School of Hospitality Uzairue, Edo State and for Related Matters (HB.2748) (*Hon. Julius Ihonvbere*) – *Second Reading*.

## MOTION

### 5. **Need to Restore Orolu State Constituency of Osun State:** **Hon. Adewale Morufu Adebayo**

#### **The House:**

*Notes* that in 2004, the Chairman of the Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC), wrote to the National Assembly requesting approval for the reinstatement of the nation's suppressed state constituencies, including Orolu State Constituency;

*Also notes* that the residents of Orolu Local Government Area filed a lawsuit in 2012 at the Federal High Court, Osogbo, seeking the restoration of the Orolu State Constituency, citing INEC's inability since 2004 to complete the ward and unit creation required for the Orolu State Constituency election;

*Further notes* that on 28 May 2014, the Federal High Court ordered INEC to make all necessary arrangements to guarantee Orolu State Constituency would be included in the next General Elections;

*Aware* that INEC filed an application for leave to appeal the judgement of the Federal High Court, Osogbo at the Court of Appeal, Akure, but failed to pursue the appeal, thereby neglecting the constitutional requirement for proper representation;

*Concerned* that Osun State, which has nine (9) seats in the House of Representatives, only has 26 members in the State House of Assembly, as opposed to the 27 required under sections 91 and 112 of the 1999 Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria (as amended);

*Disturbed* that since 2004, INEC has failed to carry out the necessary ward and polling unit creation to facilitate elections into the restored Orolu State Constituency of Osun State, and that this prolonged delay constitutes a breach of the rule of law, denying the people of Orolu Local Government Area their constitutional right to adequate representation in the Osun State House of Assembly.

#### *Resolves to:*

- (i) *urge* the Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC) to comply with the judgment of the Federal High Court in Suit No: FHC/OS/CS/10/2013 by restoring the Orolu State Constituency in accordance with the provisions of Sections 91 and 112 of the 1999 Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria (as amended);
- (ii) seek the concurrence of the Senate pursuant to Section 115 of the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, 1999 (as amended), for the restoration of the suppressed Orolu State Constituency, Osun State;
- (iii) mandate the Committees on Electoral Matters and Legislative Compliance to ensure compliance and report within four (4) weeks for further legislative action.

"That the House do consider the Report of the Committee on Public Petitions on the petition by Kennedy C. Amos and Associates against Airtel Networks Ltd over fraudulent transaction involving the land of Mrs. Juliana Nwikanne of Bianu Town Khana Local Government Area of Rivers State and approve recommendations therein" (*Laid:21/5/2024*).

- (i) *urge* the Managing Director (MD)/Chief Executive Officer (CEO) Airtel Telecom Nig. Ltd to reverse the purported Deed of Conveyance allegedly entered with Mrs. Juliana Nwikanne back to a Lease Agreement which was accepted to her; and

- (ii) Airtel to pay Mrs. Juliana Nwakanne, her dues from the Lease of the Landed Property for the three years that have elapsed for the property.

**Report on the Petition by L/CPL Ordu Odieroke 03NA/54/5588:**

“That the House do consider the Report of the Committee on Public Petitions on the Petition by L/CPL Ordu Odieroke 03NA/54/5588 against the Nigerian Army for unlawful dismissal from service and approve recommendations therein” (*Laid: 6/5/2026*).

- (i) Urge the Nigerian Army to reinstate the Petitioner into the service of the Nigerian Army, with restoration of his career progression, including appropriate rank adjustment where applicable, having regard to his years of service and wrongful dismissal;
- (ii) alternatively, where reinstatement is impracticable
- (a) pay full compensation equivalent to his lost career, including all salaries, allowances, promotions, and retirement benefits due from 2017 to date;
- (b) pay all outstanding arrears of salaries and entitlements owed to the Petitioner from the period of his detention to the date of compliance.
- (iii) ensure that administrative and disciplinary procedures within the Nigerian Army are in compliance with constitutional guarantees of fair hearing.

**Report on the Petition by Wisdom and Grace:**

**Hon. Laori Kwamoti:**

“That the House do consider the Report of the Committee on Public Petitions on the petition by Wisdom and Grace on behalf of Mr. Anthony Onyeabor Against Aso Savings and Loans PLC, on alleged illegal, unjustified, and fraudulent concession of House No SDB. 02, Sungold Estate Galadimawa, FCT Abuja to the Independent Corrupt Practices Commission and approve recommendations therein” (*Laid: 23/4/2026*).

- (i) that the transaction was conducted in bad faith, and is therefore irregular, unjustified, and tainted with elements of fraud;
- (ii) urge Aso Savings and Loans Plc, through its liquidator, the Nigeria Deposit Insurance Corporation (NDIC), in conjunction with the Independent Corrupt Practices Commission (ICPC), to immediately take steps to reverse the transfer of House No. SDB 02, Sungold Estate, Galadimawa, Abuja to the petitioner, thereby restoring his proprietary interest in the property;
- (iii) where restitution in kind is no longer practicable, the petitioner should be fully compensated with the current market value of the property, assessed at ₦250,000,000.00 (Two Hundred and Fifty Million Naira only) as final settlement, in order to remedy the financial loss and hardship occasioned by the wrongful act;
- (iv) urge relevant law enforcement and regulatory agencies to conduct a thorough investigation into the circumstances surrounding the transfer, with a view to determining any criminal liability arising from the apparent breach of trust, misrepresentation, and abuse of process;
- (v) that appropriate sanctions be imposed on any institution found culpable, to serve as a deterrent and to uphold the integrity of mortgage and property transactions in Nigeria.

**Report on the Petition by Human Rights Radio and Television (Brekete Family):**

“That the House do consider the Report of the Committee on Public Petitions on the Petition by Human Rights Radio and Television (Brekete Family) on behalf of eight (8) Senior Staff of Biwater Nigeria Ltd against the Management of Biwater Nigeria Ltd for alleged failure to pay staff pensions and redundancy allowances and approve recommendations therein” (*Laid:6/5/2026*).

- (i) urge the Respondent to immediately pay all outstanding salaries and allowances owed to the affected staff and remit all outstanding pension contributions to the respective Pension Fund Administrators, including statutory penalties and accrued interest;
- (ii) that the redundancy of the affected staff should be declared wrongful due to non-compliance with statutory procedure and non-payment of entitlements.
- (iii) that the Respondent should pay redundancy benefits in accordance with the collective agreement and applicable labour laws;
- (iv) that the National Pension Commission (PenCom) and the Federal Ministry of Labour and Employment be mandated to enforce compliance, including sanctions for violations;
- (v) that while the Respondent's request for government intervention is noted, such intervention shall not operate as a condition precedent to the discharge of its obligations to employees.

***Report on the Petition by Nsisan-Obari Royal Palace Alesa Council of Chiefs:***

“That the House do consider the Report of the Committee on Public Petitions on the Petition by Nsisan-Obari Royal Palace Alesa Council of Chiefs against Indorama Eleme Petrochemicals Limited for alleged violation of PIA 2022 and approve recommendations therein” (*Laid: 27/4/2024*).

- (i) that Indorama Eleme Petrochemicals Limited shall formally recognize Alesa Community as a Host Community in line with the Petroleum Industry Act (PIA), 2021;
- (ii) that Indorama Eleme Petrochemicals Limited shall, within 30 days, establish the Alesa Host Community Development Trust/Committee in compliance with Chapter 3 of the PIA;
- (iii) that Indorama shall pay the sum of ₦35,000,000,000.00 being outstanding 3% Host Community entitlement from August 2022 to February 2026 into the designated account of the Host Community Development Trust;
- (iv) that the Nigerian Upstream Petroleum Regulatory Commission (NUPRC) and other relevant regulatory bodies shall ensure strict compliance with the provisions of the PIA;
- (v) that failure to comply with these directives shall attract sanctions as provided under the Petroleum Industry Act and other applicable laws.

***Report on the Petition by City-Point Global Properties & Investment Limited:***

“That the House do consider the Report of the Committee on Public Petitions on the Petition by City-Point Global Properties and Investment Limited against the Federal Mortgage Bank of Nigeria on alleged non-release and disbursement of the loan sum of ₦479,187,955.20 for the development of one hundred sixty Housing Units along Bende Road, Umuahia North Local Government Area, Abia State” (*Laid: 3/9/2024*).

- (i) that the Respondent shall, in collaboration with the Petitioner, restructure the loan facility to reflect current market realities, updated Bills of Quantities, and project viability;
- (ii) that further disbursement shall be milestone-based, subject to strict monitoring and certification by the Respondent;
- (iii) that both parties shall agree on a clear implementation timeline for resumption and completion of the project under regulatory supervision;

- (iv) that the Respondent shall consider a reasonable interest adjustment (not blanket waiver) to mitigate the impact of delays attributable to both parties;
- (v) that the Respondent shall review the Petitioner's credit status with a view to ensuring fairness, subject to compliance with restructured terms;
- (vi) that the Committee declines the Petitioner's claim for ₦2.5 Billion compensation, same being beyond the Committee's statutory powers;
- (vii) that the Respondent's request for foreclosure is declined at this stage, as it would defeat the public purpose of the housing scheme.

in view of the findings the Committee urges the House to dismiss the petition, as the petitioner could not proof that the scored above 70 percent as alleged, and the purported illegal panel was duly constituted and the examination was monitored by independent bodies, including the civil society organisations and the Bureau of Public Enterprise (BPE).

**13. Committee on Public Petitions:**

***Report on the Petition by Sure-Path Solicitors Hon. Laori Kwamoti:***

"That the House do consider the Report of the Committee on Public Petitions on the petition by Sure-Path Solicitors against DSP Uche Okeke (D.C.O Unity Police Division, Abakpa-Nike Enugu State) and Inspector Romanus Ugwuanyi (IPO) for the Alleged Torture and Murder of Mr. Kingsley Agwuna (Alias Temple), who died on 8 September 2024 and approve recommendations therein" (Laid:29/10/2024).

- (i) urge the Inspector-General of Police to conduct a comprehensive investigation into the circumstances surrounding the death of Mr. Kingsley Agwuna;
- (ii) urge the appropriate authorities to ensure the immediate arrest and prosecution of officers involved in the unlawful killing;
- (iii) mandate the Nigeria Police Force to pay adequate compensation to the family of the deceased.

**14. Committee on Public Petitions:**

***Report on the Petition by Inspector Danladi Kwalpung:***

**Hon. Laori Kwamoti:**

"That the House do consider the Report of the Committee on Public Petitions on the Petition by Inspector Danladi Kwalpung Against the Nigerian Correctional Service for Non-Compliance with Court Order for His Reinstatement to Service and approve recommendations therein" (Laid:20/5/2025).

- (i) urge the Nigerian Correctional Service to immediately reinstate Inspector I.C Danladi Kwalpung (S/No. 61625) to the service without further delay;
- (ii) that the Service should pay all outstanding salaries, entitlements, and benefits due to the petitioner from the date of his discharge and acquittal by the Federal High Court, Jos on 27<sup>th</sup> November, 2024;

- (iii) that the Nigeria Correctional Service should comply strictly with the provisions of the Public Service Rules in handling similar matters henceforth to avoid unwarranted administrative injustices.

urge the Precision Construction and Engineering Projects Limited to pay the sum of ₦182,855,068.00 (one hundred and eighty-two million, eight hundred and fifty-five thousand, sixty-eight Naira) to Advanced Coating Technology Nigeria Limited, being verified expenditure incurred prior to wrongful contract termination.

***Report on the Petition by Rev. Dr. Johnson O. Odii on behalf of Mgbom Na. Achara Development Union in Ohaozara Local Government Area:***

**Hon. Laori Kwamoti:**

“That the House do consider the Report of the Committee on Public Petitions on the petition by Rev. Dr. Johnson O. Odii on behalf of Mgbom Na. Achara Development Union in Ohaozara Local Government Area of Ebonyi State, a cry for government intervention to save their souls and approve recommendations therein” (*Laid: 13/2/2024*).

- (i) urge the Inspector-General of Nigeria Police, the Director-General, Department of State Services and the Chief of Defense Staff to set up a Joint Task Force, including the army, as well as establishing Army Checkpoints at strategic positions in the area that will crackdown and unravel the remote and immediate causes of the security breaches in the area, apprehend and prosecute the perpetrators immediately;
- (ii) mandate the Committees on Defence and Police Affairs to provide effective oversight on the security institutions and to ensure restoration of order, peace and unity in the area.

**Hon. Laori Kwamoti:**

“That the House do consider the Report of the Committee on Public Petitions on the petition by Mr. Bolaji Yunus, Chief Executive Officer of Bolaful Solution Ventures, against Access Bank PLC, 14/15 Prince Alaba Abiodun Oniru Road, Victoria Island, Lagos, whose signage fell on him while he was on official duty, and the bank failed to provide adequate treatment and approve the recommendations therein. (*Laid: 24/10/2023*).

- (i) urge the management of Access Bank Plc to continue engaging the Petitioner by giving him contracts on signage repair to sustain his livelihood;
- (ii) Access Bank Plc has agreed to offset the Medical Bill of the Petitioner Mr. Bolaji Yunus (Bolaful Solution Ventures) as well to compensate him for the collateral damages that he incurred for the period of years that he was unable to work;
- (iii) that the bank should present evidence of payment of Petitioner’s medical bills to the House;
- (iv) discontinue Hearing of the matter as both parties have agreed to resolve the matter amicably.

- (iii) also urge the Nigerian Maritime Administration and Safety Agency to pay all outstanding entitlements, benefits, and arrears of salary, and accord her due promotions up to date, in line with her contemporaries.

**19. Committee on Public Petition:*****Report on the Petition by Funmi Adeogun & co. On behalf of Olatone Abdulsalam Ventures Limited:*****Hon. Laori Kwamoti:**

“That the House do consider the Report of the Committee on Public Petitions on the petition by Funmi Adeogun & co. - (i) that Assets Management Corporation (AMCON) of Nigeria should restore the Petitioner to complete the unexpired lease term;
- (ii) prompt and adequate compensation should be paid at fair market value for Illegal ejection, destruction of property and harassment;
- (iii) Assets Management Corporation of Nigeria’s Management should be queried for corporate negligence, Institutional complicity in illegality and failure to perform due diligence;
- (iv) that the Inspector-General of Police should investigate and discipline officers who participated in the illegal enforcement.

“That the House do consider the Report of the Committee on Public Petitions for Intervention into Matters Arising from Non-Payment of Expenditure incurred by Sej Duc Engineering Nigeria Limited on OML 110 prior to its sale by Cavendish Petroleum to Damas Petrochemicals and Refinery (A Company Owned by Abdul Samad Rabi, Chairman of Bua Group) and approve recommendations therein” (*Laid: 23/7/ 2025*)

- (i) urge the Cavendish Petroleum and Kainos Exploration & Production Company Nigeria Limited to pay Sej Duc Engineering Nigeria Limited the sum of: USD 8,581,015, and ₦18,361,250, for breach of contract and operational liabilities;
- (ii) that the Inspector General of Police should investigate Cavendish Petroleum and Kainos Exploration for fraudulent misrepresentation, breach of contract, and possible economic sabotage;
- (iii) suspend all production activities on OML 110 until full legislative resolution and settlement of outstanding liabilities.

- (i) upholds the position of the Nigerian Ports Authority that the petitioners were duly paid all their entitlements in line with the applicable Conditions of Service as at the time of their disengagement in May 2008;
- (ii) recognizes the 200% one-year total emolument payment as a final and conclusive settlement, arising from the negotiated agreement between the Nigerian Ports Authority management and the union representing the disengaged staff;
- (iii) that there is no legal or equitable basis for any further financial claims by the petitioners against the Nigerian Ports Authority, as all obligations have been fully discharged;
- (iv) that any petitioner who is yet to consider his or her pension benefit should liaise with their Pension Fund Administrator (PFA) to ensure the release and payment of funds already remitted on their behalf;
- (v) in view of the above, the petitioner’s case should be closed, as the matter has been adequately resolved and there are no outstanding claims warranting further intervention.

- (i) Recognize Printer Koko T. Clement as the duly elected and legitimate President and Chairman in Council of the Chartered Institute of Professional Printers of Nigeria (CIPPON);
- (ii) urge Mr. Olugbemi Malomo and Mr. Babajide Salako to desist forthwith from parading themselves as leaders of CIPPON and to comply fully with the judgments in FHC/JAL/CS/4/2022 and CA/YL/83/2024;
- (iii) also urge the Federal Ministry of Information and National Orientation to recover all institutional assets, documents, and financial instruments in unauthorized possession and restore same to the lawful Council;
- (iv) mandate the Committee on Information and National Orientation to strengthen its oversight on the implementation of CIPPON Act 2007 by the supervising Ministry to prevent further internal divisions and ensure strict compliance with the provisions of the Act;
- (v) dismiss Petition No. 496 of 2025 for lack of merit.

- (ii) that the Respondent shall, within thirty (30) days, constitute an independent and transparent panel to reassess the Petitioner's promotion status, considering her performance in subsequent promotion examinations (2019-2022), work record, and available vacancies;
- (iii) that where the reassessment establishes that the Petitioner was unfairly treated or disadvantaged, the Respondent shall grant her appropriate promotion(s), including notional promotion with corresponding financial benefits and seniority adjustments.

- (ii) ensure the recovery and refund of the total contract sum unlawfully appropriated by PCL International Ltd to the petitioner, being the rightful lead technical partner in the Joint Venture;
- (iii) propose the development of a regulatory framework to safeguard Nigerian companies participating in international Joint Ventures, particularly under multilateral and AfCFTA arrangements.
