## MOTIONS

11. **Need for Executive Action to Halt the Ransom Cash Economy, Strengthen Financial Intelligence Coordination, and Enforce Compliance with Anti-Money Laundering Frameworks in Nigeria:**  
**Hon. Ademorin Ali Kuye:**

**The House:**

*Notes* that Sections 14(2)(b) and 33(1) of the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, 1999 (as amended), vest in the Federal Government the primary responsibility to protect lives, maintain public order, and safeguard the economic sovereignty of Nigeria;

*Also notes* that the Central Bank of Nigeria Act, 2007 and the Banks and Other Financial Institutions Act (BOFIA), 2020 confer on the Central Bank of Nigeria regulatory and supervisory powers over monetary policy, currency management, and the integrity of the Nigerian financial system;

*Aware* that the Money Laundering (Prevention and Prohibition) Act, 2022 and the Terrorism (Prevention and Prohibition) Act, 2022 impose obligations on financial institutions, designated non-financial businesses, and relevant government agencies to detect, report, and disrupt illicit financial flows, including ransom payments;

*Also aware* that reports from the Nigeria Financial Intelligence Unit (NFIU), the National Bureau of Statistics' Crime Experience and Security Perception Survey (CESPS) 2024, and independent security research organisations indicate that Nigerians paid an estimated ₦2.23 trillion in ransom between January 2021 and June 2025, thereby sustaining kidnapping and other organised criminal activities;

*Further aware* that investigations by the National Counter Terrorism Centre (NCTC) under the Office of the National Security Adviser (ONSA) revealed that Point-of-Sale (POS) operators and other financial channels have been used to facilitate ransom payments and conceal financial trails, thereby frustrating recovery efforts and law enforcement investigations;

*Concerned* that criminal and terrorist networks continue to exploit formal and informal financial systems, including Bureau De Change operators, hawala networks, cryptocurrency platforms, livestock transactions, and trade-based money laundering schemes to launder ransom proceeds and reintegrate them into the legitimate economy;

*Worried* that weaknesses in financial intelligence coordination and anti-money laundering enforcement expose Nigeria to increased security threats, undermine public confidence, and heighten the risk of international sanctions and continued Financial Action Task Force (FATF) grey-listing;

*Resolves to:*

- (i) urge the President and Commander-in-Chief of the Armed Forces to establish a coordinated inter-agency framework for disrupting ransom financing and strengthening financial intelligence collaboration among relevant security, regulatory, and financial institutions;
- (ii) urge the Federal Government to strengthen the implementation and enforcement of regulations relating to ransom payments and terrorism financing while promoting cooperation between victims, financial institutions, and law enforcement agencies;
- (iii) urge the Federal Ministry of Finance to provide adequate funding for financial intelligence infrastructure, including advanced transaction monitoring and analytical systems;
- (iv) urge the Central Bank of Nigeria, the Nigeria Financial Intelligence Unit and other relevant regulatory authorities to:
  - (a) conduct a comprehensive audit of suspicious POS transactions in high-risk areas and take appropriate regulatory action against operators found to be involved in ransom-related activities;
  - (b) strengthen real-time monitoring and reporting mechanisms for suspicious financial transactions linked to kidnapping, banditry, terrorism, and other organised crimes;
  - (c) strengthen oversight of Bureau de Change operators and other financial intermediaries to prevent their use for money laundering and ransom payments;
- (v) also urge the Attorney-General of the Federation and relevant law enforcement agencies to investigate and prosecute individuals and entities involved in facilitating ransom transactions in accordance with existing laws;

- (vi) further urge the National Security Adviser to convene a stakeholders' summit on financial intelligence and ransom financing with a view to developing a coordinated national strategy for disrupting criminal financial networks;
- (vii) again urge security agencies to ensure that funds and assets recovered during anti-kidnapping and counter-terrorism operations are subjected to proper forensic financial investigation to identify and dismantle criminal financing networks;
- (viii) mandate the Committees on National Security and Intelligence, Banking Regulations, and Financial Crimes to monitor compliance with these resolutions and report within four (4) weeks for further legislative action.

**12. Need for a National Safe Schools Protection and Rapid Response Framework:  
Hon. Olusoji Abidemi Adetunji**

**The House:**

*Notes* that Section 14(2)(b) of the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, 1999 (as amended), provides that the security and welfare of the people shall be the primary purpose of government;

*Also notes* that schools across Nigeria have, over the years, been exposed to attacks, abductions, and other security threats that have disrupted learning activities, endangered students, teachers, and undermined public confidence in the education system;

*Aware* that the Safe Schools Initiative was launched in 2014 following the abduction of 276 schoolgirls from Government Girls Secondary School, Chibok, Borno State, with the objective of strengthening the protection of schools, supporting community-based security arrangements, improving school infrastructure, and ensuring uninterrupted access to education in vulnerable communities;

*Also aware* that the Federal Government subsequently launched the National Plan on Financing Safe Schools (2023-2026), with a projected investment framework valued at approximately ₦144.77 billion to improve safety and security in schools across the Federation with the involvement of the Federal Ministry of Education, security agencies, state governments, development partners, and other stakeholders;

*Further aware* that despite the implementation of the Safe Schools Initiative and related interventions, incidents of school attacks and mass abductions have continued to occur in various parts of the country, demonstrating the need for stronger preventive, intelligence-led, and rapid-response mechanisms;

*Observes* that many schools, particularly in rural and underserved communities, still lack essential security infrastructure such as perimeter fencing, surveillance systems, emergency communication tools, and coordinated response mechanisms.

*Resolves to:*

- (i) urge the Federal Ministry of Education to establish maximum national school security standards covering perimeter protection, access control measures, emergency preparedness plans, security audits, and community participation mechanisms for all public schools;
- (ii) Mandate the Committees on Basic Education and Services, National Security and Intelligence, Defence, Police Affairs, and Interior, to conduct a comprehensive assessment of the implementation of the Safe Schools Initiative and the National Plan on Financing Safe Schools (2023-2026), including the utilization of funds appropriated for school safety interventions and report within four (4) weeks with recommendations aimed at strengthening school security, enhancing accountability, and ensuring the effective protection of students, teachers, and educational facilities across the Federation.

**13. Need to Establish Tubers and other Agricultural Produce Storage Facility in Agyaragu Town, Obi Local Government Area of Nasarawa State:  
Hon. Abubakar Sarki Dahiru:**

**The House:**

*Notes* that farmers in Agyaragu town of Obi Local Government, Nasarawa State, experience post-harvest losses annually on agricultural produce, especially during the yam harvest;

*Aware* that the Tribune Newspaper, on May 19, 2019, reported that Agyaragu town is a major producer of yam and its market is one of the largest in the state where the buying and selling of yam is predominant, attracting buyers from across the 36 states of the nation, including neighboring countries;

*Also aware* that storage facilities are crucial for minimizing significant post-harvest losses, thereby ensuring year-round food security, stabilizing market prices, and increasing farmers' income;

*Concerned* that traditional barns have remained the primary storage facility in Agyaragu; however, the disadvantage of this storage system is that farmers incur heavy losses after harvest due to spoilage and mechanical damage to the tubers;

*Worried* that according to the Food and Agriculture Organisation (FAO) of the United Nations and the Nigerian Stored Produce Research Institute (NSPRI), Nigeria loses up to 50% of its post-harvest agricultural produce, particularly fruits and vegetables, due to the lack of adequate storage facilities, poor handling practices, and deficient transportation infrastructure;

*Also worried* that the only major specialized storage facility in the North Central region is located at Zaki Biam, Ukum Local Government Area of Benue State, with a capacity to store 200,000 tubers of yam, which is far from Agyaragu, causing substantial agricultural produce to perish in transit;

*Disturbed* that post-harvest losses remain one of the biggest challenges for farmers in Agyaragu, which sharply reduces agricultural revenue and worsens food insecurity in Nigeria;

*Resolves to:*

- (i) urge the Federal Ministry of Agriculture and Food Security to establish a modern tuber and agricultural produce storage facility in Agyaragu Town, Obi Local Government Area of Nasarawa State, and include the project in the 2027 budget estimates;
- (ii) mandate the Committees on Agricultural Production Services, Nutrition, and Food Security to ensure compliance.

**14. Revival and Construction of Ohimini, Otukpo Airstrip in Benue State:  
Hon. Onuh Onyeche Blessing:**

**The House:**

*Notes* that Ohimini Local Government Area was formerly part of Otukpo Local Government Area prior to its creation in 1996;

*Also notes* that approval for the construction of an airstrip in Ojali was granted in 1972, with Certificate of Occupancy Plot No. 299/OJ-OT located at Ojali, presently known as Ohimini Local Government allocated to the Ministry of Aviation for the purpose of constructing an airport;

*Aware* that the late Chief Audu Ogbeh, former Minister of Agriculture and Rural Development, and the then Chief of Air Staff, Sadique Abubakar, in 2019 made concerted efforts to revive the Airstrip to no avail;

*Worried* that the air strip land, Plot No. 299/OJ-OT, is a federal government property, laying fallow and bare, thereby encouraging land invaders to encroach;

*Cognizant* that the revival of the airstrip will benefit the host community and the Nigeria Air force to combat the increasing insecurity and banditry activities in the Local Government Area;

*Resolves to:*

- (i) urge the Federal Ministry of Aviation and Aerospace Development and the Nigeria Air Force to
    - (a) embark on a site inspection visit to Ojali, Ohimini Local Government Area in confirmation of the site and submit a revival implementation plan;
    - (b) engage the community to include representatives from Ohimini, Youths and Traditional Rulers to address possible compensation issues, build community support and ensure easy execution of the project;
  - (ii) also urge the Office of the National Security Adviser in collaboration with the Nigerian Air Force to establish an operational liaison desk to integrate the Ohimini, Otukpo airstrip into the National Security, Humanitarian response and Agricultural Logistics;
  - (iii) mandate the Committee on Aviation to include the airstrip revival project in the 2027 budgetary estimates.

“That the House do consider the Report of the Conference Committee on a Bill an Act to Establish the National Assembly Service Pension Board to Administer the Pension Scheme for Personnel of the Service, Exempt the Personnel of the National Assembly Service from the Contributory Pension Scheme and for Related Matters.

**20. Committees on Treaties, Protocol and Agreement and Gas Resources:****Hon. Rabiu Yusuf:**

“That the House do consider the Report of the Committees on Treaties, Protocol and Agreement and Gas Resources on a Bill for an Act to Amend the West African Gas Pipeline Project Act, No. 11, 2005 to Provide for a Licensing Regime for all Shippers on WAGP by the WAGP Authority, Extend the Income Tax Holiday and Revise the Income Tax Rate and for Related Matters (HB.2744) and approve recommendations therein” (*Laid: 9/9/2026*).

**21. Committee on Public Accounts:****Hon. Bamidele Salam:**

“That the House do consider the Report of the Committee on Public Accounts on the consideration of the Auditor-General for the Federation’s Annual Report on Non-Compliance and Internal Control Weaknesses in Nigeria Bulk Electricity Trading Company Plc. for the year ended December 31, 2021 Part 1 and approve recommendations therein” (*Laid: 9/9/2026*).

**22. Committee on Public Service Matters:****Hon. Sani Umar Bala:**

“That the House do consider the Report of the Committee of Public Service Matters on Stagnation of Promotion in Federal Civil Service (HR. 08/07/2024) and approve recommendations therein” (*Laid 2/7/2024*).

- (i) urge the Head of Service to develop a structured mentorship and succession planning program. This would ensure that the skills and institutional knowledge of senior directors are effectively transferred to the next generation of leaders before their retirement, mitigating the impact of brain drain;
- (ii) also urge the Office of the Head of Service to reduce its emphasis on solely creating vacancies. Policies should also be geared towards continuous professional development to ensure that all officers, regardless of their time in a particular position, are equipped with the skills needed to advance and contribute effectively to a modern public service;
- (iii) mandate the Committee on Budget and National Planning and Appropriations to ensure that the Budget Office of the Federation and the Office of the Head of Civil Service of the Federation make provision for annual budgets containing adequate financial provisions for promotion exercises to prevent financial constraints from being an impediment;
- (iv) further urge the Office of the Head of Civil Service of the Federation to fast-track the implementation of reforms such as abolishing the HND/BSc dichotomy and creating a clear pathway for lateral conversion and career progression of all cadres;
- (v) again urge the Office of the Head of the Civil Service of the Federation to formally study the feasibility of the undermentioned proposals and subsequent implementation:
  - (a) creating a “special cadre” or additional directorate posts. This presents a potential compromise that addresses the concerns of both sides;
  - (b) digitalization of the promotion process and the transparent publication of timelines and vacancies;
- (vi) further urge the Office of the Head of Service of the Federation and the Federal Civil Service Commission to create a distinct career path for Education Officers (teachers) especially, including other officers on the Nursing, Protocol and Executive Cadre to advance to Grade Level 17, provided that such personnel have attained requisite and/or higher qualifications.

- (i) also urge the Office of the Head of Service of the Federation and the Federal Civil Service Commission to create a path for Education Officers (teachers) as well as officers on the Protocol Cadre and Executive Cadre to advance to Grade Level 17 upon attaining equivalent and or higher qualifications.
- (ii) urge the Federal Government to approve a presidential waiver to clear the huge backlog of Education Officers (teachers) who are eligible for promotion but are stagnated;
- (iii) equally urge the Office of the Head of Civil Service of the Federation to as a matter of urgency, direct the gazetting, publication and full implementation of the approved scheme of service for Nurses by relevant Ministries and Departments, to enable the progression of suitable Nurses beyond Grade level 12 to 17 in the Civil Service.

### 23. Committee on Public Petitions:

#### Hon. Laori Kwamoti:

“That the House do consider the Report of the Committee Public Petitions on the Petition by Ayia, Ayia George and Co. on behalf of Messrs Habinda Nigeria Limited against the Benue State Government and the Universal Basic Education Commission (UBEC) on allegation of Trespass and Land Grabbing of Plot No. BNA4911 at Km. 8 Adaka along Makurdi–Naka Road Housing (UBEC Model Smart School) and approve recommendations therein” (*Laid: 29/10/2025*).

- (i) urge the Universal Basic Education Commission (UBEC) and the Benue State Government to adopt key safeguards for the protection of property rights in Nigeria and ensure that individuals and entities are not deprived of their property without due process of law and the payment of fair and adequate compensation;
- (ii) also urge the Universal Basic Education Commission (UBEC) and the Benue State Government to ensure compliance with all existing valid court judgments relating to the matter;
- (iii) further urge the Universal Basic Education Commission (UBEC) and the Benue State Government to adhere to all statutory and legal procedures for the assessment of compensation claims and the consideration of valuation reports prepared by independent professional valuers;
- (iv) again urge the Universal Basic Education Commission (UBEC) and the Benue State Government, as a matter of urgency, to liaise with the Benue State Universal Basic Education Board (SUBEB) with a view to paying fair and adequate compensation to Habinda Nigeria Limited at the prevailing market value without further delay; and
- (v) mandate the Clerk to the National Assembly to communicate this resolution to Universal Basic Education Commission (UBEC), Benue State Government, the Speaker of the Benue State House of Assembly and Benue State Universal Basic Education Board (SUBEB) for necessary action and compliance.
